Champion Centralized School Dedicated on November 20, 1915

The first 200 students in grades one through eight attended Champion Centralized School on October 11, 1915. Principal was Professor Ivan C. Meggett. High school-aged children, at that time, had to attend another district. The school then added grades nine through twelve, one year at a time, so that by 1919 students in all grades could attend.

Champion Centralized School was officially dedicated on November 20, 1915 with 400 residents and guests in attendance. Among the dignitaries attending the dedication was Ohio Governor F. B. Willis.

In 1925 four additional classrooms were built. The curriculum was expanded to include music, and the length of the school year was set at eight-and-a-half months. Inside restrooms, steam heat, and a gymnasium were also added at that time.

In 1931 a second addition was built at a cost of \$53,000. Twelve classrooms were added, and four acres of land were purchased behind the building for use as a playground.

A new gymnasium was added in 1939 to the south end of the building (where this Farewell is being held) at a total cost of \$78,000 with \$35,075 of that amount provided by President Franklin Roosevelt's Public Works Administration.

Final construction in 1949 added the two floors of new classrooms at the north end of the building, a new boiler room, and a cafeteria.

Champion Junior High School Dedicated on November 21, 1965

Champion Junior High School was built in 1965 for \$785,000 plus an additional \$100,000 for equipment. In 1965 students in grades seven through nine attended there. Students in grades five through eight now attend Champion Middle School.
