We look forward to serving more young men in 2019 and offering additional programs to **help young men avoid prisons by building better lives** with your help; I am confident that we will be able to achieve much more.



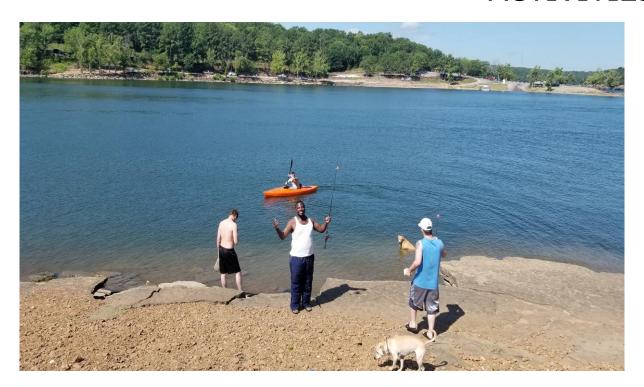

LOOKING BACK

1st Step added essential elements to our program this year. We hired a house manager, allowing a more orderly, disciplined house. The policy and procedures committee completed work on a manual and the manual was adopted by the Board. The program hired a part-time case manager that has helped serve our participants better and to build a more robust program and invested in a case management program. The case management software allows better communication with all of the service providers and better analysis of the data. Finally, we purchased our own sober living house and furnished it. By purchasing a house, 1st Step saved money and created a better environment for its participants.

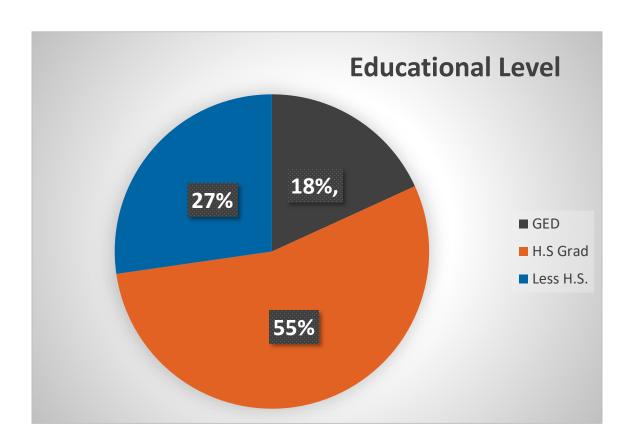

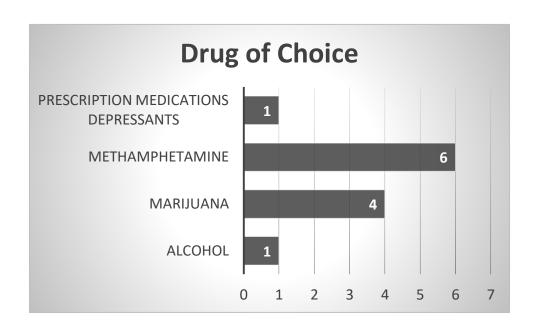
Who Are We?

- Race reflective of general criminal population

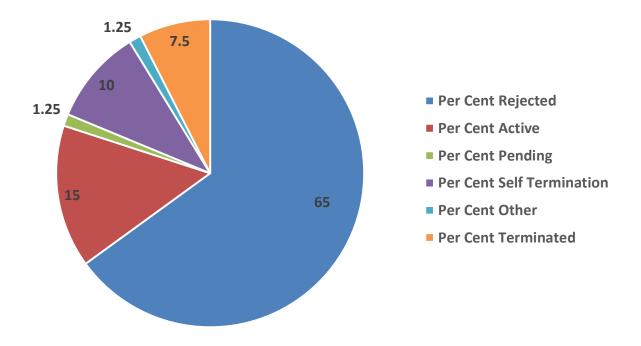


 Generally our population are High School Graduates or have a GED



Methamphetamine is the drug of choice

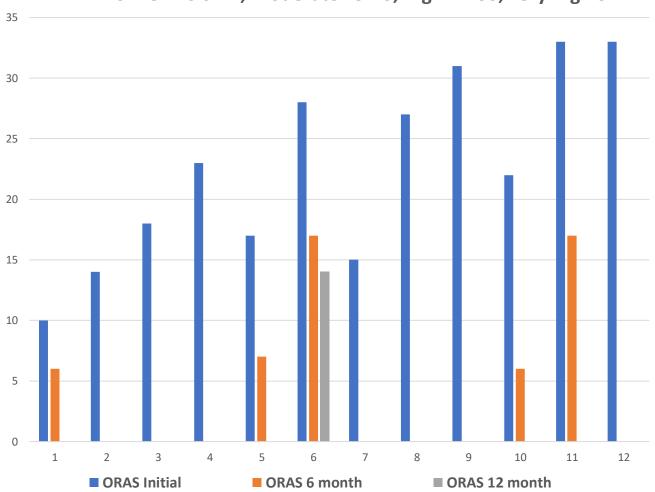
Per Cent Terminated, Rejected, Active All Candidates

Year in Review

- Hired David Phillips as Executive Director in January 2018;
- Increased participants from 4 to 12;
- Increased Board Members from 9 to 12;
- Received \$243,677 in contributions;
- Submitted grant and contribution requests to numerous Tulsa-based foundations;
- Established relationship with Sen. Stanislawski to sponsor "pay for success" legislation;
- Sent solicitation letter to 1800 members of the Tulsa County Bar Association;
- Hired Part Time Case Manager, Tanya Moore, in August;

- Hired Part Time House Manager, Buck West in September;
- Obtained full insurance coverage on all operations;
- Purchased 5 bedroom house at 44th and Joplin to house 7 men and the house manager;
- Drafted, approved and implemented policies and procedures;
- Established website;
- Launched mentoring program;
- Made numerous speeches and presentations to civic and church groups and potential funders;
- Acquired access to TEL library educational system;
- Implemented case management software; and
- Amended and Updated Bylaws.
