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Welcome to our Season One Programme. As you'll know the global changes have had a dramatic impact on our organisation's normal schedules, how we learn and interact. We're still here though and we're very happy to present our programme for the first season of a new year here at Explore.

If you're new to Explore, you will find that this season's programme is primarily focussed on our existing members rather than new joiners—omitting our popular welcome days and public events. Every season, we have a subtle theme and this time it is 'Places and Spaces'.

After the uprooting sense of a breaking pandemic and the immobilising effect of lockdown, our theme of 'Places and Spaces' has acquired a new relevance since it was originally planned earlier in the year. Whether we're looking closer to home for inspiration and discovery, or watching global events unfold at a disorientating pace, debating our individual and shared positions in the world (and beyond) has certainly taken centre stage. In this season's programme we focus on courses that reposition the idea of place, from literature to linear equations, thermo– to acoustic dynamics. We'll learn about setting cinematic scenes and how Earth's history is set in stone and ice. We'll traverse foreign lands and distant times and there'll be plenty of Space for us to explore, from wherever we find ourselves.

How will sessions be delivered? Members will receive additional information about accessing different sessions, but if you're unsure please read all the details provided, then <u>get in touch</u> and we'll try to help. There are various types of delivery method and some sessions use more than one format in combination:

* **Live Zoom Sessions** - these sessions are online sessions using Zoom to create a live classroom environment remotely with a tutor and 'audience'/members actively attending the session. This allows an immediacy of interaction akin to being in the same room (but often with audience member microphones 'muted' during tutor presentation) Details of individual Zoom sessions/courses (invite links and relevant codes) will be sent to members via the members' mailout in advance of the sessions. If you need assistance setting up Zoom on your computer/tablet click <u>HERE</u>. For these sessions you will see this green box in the programme. Some sessions might be a live Zoom of a Face-to-Face session at CU House.

* Face-to-Face Sessions - these sessions are planned to take place at Commercial Union House as a Face-to-Face session, provided that the situation allows. In order to allow for social distancing and room capacity, places must be booked online in advance. If circumstances do not allow the session to proceed on-site, it will shift to a remote Zoom session only. For Face to Face sessions you will see this purple box in the programme.

* **Group CUH Zoom Sessions** - we are planning to trial a new format for one course this season, a group Zoom from CU House. This session will be taught as a remote, regular Zoom, but we can show this live at CUH, for any members wanting to watch the session away from home as a group. This will depend on circumstances at the time and places are to be booked like any other CUH session. For this session you'll see this blue box in the programme.

* 'Paper-based' Offline Resources — these sessions will be distributed by email in the form of written activities, texts and direction, initially provided as a document via the members mailouts, to be enjoyed by members and where appropriate followed up with email correspondence with the tutors and/or group. In recent decades, we have become more aware, and painfully so, of the "crooked timbers" of which our vaunted rationality and cognition is, partly, constructed: fragilities and biases that shape our thinking and choices and which are, increasingly, open to mass exploitation.

This course will provide discussion and reflection around a series of provocative talks and articles that explore and seek to explain the fragility of our evolved cognition in a febrile world.



- 28 Sep **Alesia 52BC** the climactic battle of the Gallic Wars, Julius Caesar defines the world of Rome and earns his place as one of the great commanders
- O5 Oct **Hastings 1066** the end of Anglo-Saxon England and the birth of feudalism, a watershed that changed world history, Duke William mounts the greatest successful amphibious invasion since the Siege of Troy and wins a hard fought battle
- 12 Oct **Waterloo 1815** the denouement of the 'Second Hundred Years War and the end of the road for Napoleon Bonaparte, a clash of titans with the Duke of Wellington and a fight that was a damn close run thing, the closest run thing that you ever saw...
- 19 Oct **Somme 1916** the death of a generation, Britain's Calvary of the Great War, yet a vital part of the painful learning process that would lead to victory in 1918
- 26th Oct **Normandy 1944** the last and greatest crusade, the Allies amass the greatest armada the world has ever seen and break into 'Fortress Europe' key campaign of WWII and Germany's defeat spelt the beginning of the end for Hitler's 'thousand year' Reich.

1830-1900 The Golden Age of Geology

Time: 10.30 to 12.00 possible

Geology rapidly matured as a science during the 19th century, especially in Britain. The rapid expansion of the British Empire, a mania for fossil collecting, and a new understanding of geological processes allowed past stratigraphy to be pieced together. It was also a time when colourful, larger than life figures, could make their mark on an entire subject.



- O3 Nov **Exploration, colonisation and geology**. The mid to late 19th century saw imperial expansion across the globe, including 'the race for Africa'. Professional geologists played a significant role in mapping these new territories, so their geological resources could be exploited.
- 10 Nov **Palaeontology**. The 'invention of evolution' fuelled a surge in interest in past life forms, which in turn led to a boom in the collecting of fossils and rapid revision of the tree of life.
- 17 Nov **Glacial theory**. Observational studies brought new data to the science of geology which radically changed our understanding of planet Earth's systems, including the cryosphere.
- 24 Nov **The Highlands Controversy**. Even the most prominent professional geologists can make mistakes. The fiendishly complicated geology of northwest Scotland was the battleground for one of the most significant scientific controversies of the late 19th century.
- O1 Dec **The age of the Earth**. Kelvin believed that the age of the earth lay between 20 and 40 million years, but geologists felt that the earth was much older. The sciences of physics and geology were at loggerheads


Science Course: 29th September to 27th October

The Biological Universe

Venue/Format: These sessions will be delivered live via Zoom and Face-to-Face at CUH if possible

Time: 14.00-15.00



Wallace explains:

'This course will be based on my book *The Biological Universe*, due to be published by Cambridge University Press on Thursday 24th September 2020. It's basically a course on astrobiology, which is the science of life beyond the Earth.

It focuses on the following three key questions: First, how extensive is the biological universe? In other words, on how many planets is there likely to be life? As we'll see, the probable answer is 'billions of them'. Second, what is the biological universe like? In other words, are alien life-forms likely to be similar to earthly life-forms, or will they turn out to be completely different? As we'll see, the answer may be that the similarities will probably outweigh the differences. Third, how close is the nearest part of the biological universe to Earth, and how soon are we likely to find evidence of it? As we'll see, the respective answers to the two parts of this question are likely to be 'within 100 light years' and 'in the 2020s or 2030s.'

As the greats of the industrial revolution started to build steam engines, physics started trying to work out what was going on. The hope was that with a full theory of how heat flows through a system, it would be possible to build better engines. By the time the physicists got a working theory, the engineers had already increased the efficiency of their engines by trial, error and gut feeling!

Thermodynamics is still one of the most interesting area of physics, and one that is often over looked.





Through excerpts taken from a wide range of films it can be seen that, far from just providing a convenient backdrop to the action and/or drama that unfolds within a scene, the setting can almost become a character in its own right as it engages the spectator - among other things, by expressing character psychology, enhancing emotional impact and providing spectacle.




History Course: 30th October to 20th November AND 4th December (no session 27th Nov)

Coalition, compromise & disruption to the party system in modern British political history

Tutor: Nick Cott

Venue/Format: These sessions will be delivered live via Zoom and Face-to-Face at CUH if

Time: 10.30 to 12.00 possible



We will look at: the origins of perspectives outside the tribal aspects of the developing party system, the impact of political ideologies and imperialism, the impact of the controversies of the day, including the Home Rule crisis, the Boer War, Tariff Reform, the 1910 constitutional crisis, the First World War and its aftermath and we will look at the contributions of key figures, such as the Chamberlains, the Churchills and Lloyd George.

It will be seen how a party system, often designed to exclude opinion outside, was not altogether fixed, and that attempts to change the system from without were often incorporated within the system. One of the major issues is how disruption to the party system often ultimately aided the Conservative party as it modernised into the most dynamic political force of the modern political era.
