We'll meet at the South Shields Ferry Landing, opposite the Word for a walk lasting approximately four miles with dropping out points on route. The walk is on good paths or pavements, with some short flights of stairs up and down. We will walk along the river and seashore, take the art trail, some historical sites and good views along the river and out to sea. We will then return via South Marine park. There is free all-day parking, coffee and toilets available at the Customs House, or there is free but time limited parking at the Word.

Bamburgh Castle & Visit to 'Bole Hole' Archaeology Dig with Graem Young – Led by Kath Smith

Tuesday 23rd July 2019 - Meet 13.00 at Bamburgh Castle Carpark

Graeme Young spoke at Explore earlier this year and we have the opportunity to visit him working at the Bole/Bowl Hole excavation site at the medieval cemetery by Bamburgh Castle. The site is thought to be a royal burial ground and the research being done there is unearthing fascinating insights into how inhabitants of the area lived and died, where they came from and where they went next! Provided it is arranged as a group, there is some flexibility about meeting arrangements for the visit so please make sure to contact Kath to confirm plans. There will be a be charge to enter the Castle Grounds however we may be able to negotiate a reduced rate depending on numbers. (The entrance fee for the castle is £11.25. However, if the group is about 15 then the price is reduced to £9 per person. There is also a small charge for the carpark.) The visit would include a talk and a tour of the dig by Graeme Young assisted by Lauren who is the outreach person for the project. If some people would like to visit the Finds Department then small numbers would be able to do so, perhaps 5-6 at a time, should you want a little hands-on experience. Please contact Kath asap so that she can advice the site of estimated numbers. If you have any transport difficulties she will try to co-ordinate car shares where ever possible.

What on earth is happening in higher education? – Led by Simon Pallett 8th August 2019 – 11.00-12.30 at Commercial Union House

I retire on 31 July after over 30 years work in higher education, and will draw on my experience as a senior manager of learning and teaching at Newcastle University to lead a discussion on "What on earth is happening in higher education?" Recent years have seen massive changes in higher education, especially in its scale, how it is financed, its regulation and its relationship with government. It is also constantly in the news, although rarely for positive reasons. Some of the changes will be well known to Explore members, but there are deeper undercurrents at work, which this session will explore. I appreciate that for most Explore members any experiences of higher education will be in the fairly distant past, but this does affect our grandchildren and also has an impact on the country as a whole.

Visit to Dilston Castle and Chapel, Guided by John Nicholls – Led by Jan Widmer 14th August 2019 – Meet 12.45 (for 13.00 start)

This session is already near capacity for bookings however please still email Jan if you would be interested as there's a possibility of arranging a second group or reserve list.

This is an opportunity to visit a site only open to groups by prearrangement. Dilston Hall, now demolished, was the home of the ill-fated 3rd Earl of Derwentwater who was executed for his part in the 1715 Jacobite uprising. The original castle and chapel, overlooking Devil's Water south of Corbridge, still remain and have been recently restored, the chapel having been returned to its Eighteenth Century glory. John Nicholls, President of the Northumbrian Jacobite Society, which supports and holds the tenancy of the site, will give us a guided tour of the castle and chapel. There are also displays of artefacts discovered during excavation work and original exhibits dating from the 1715 Rising. The cost will be £7, which includes refreshments, and there is parking on site. Our group is limited to just 12 members so book early to avoid disappointment!

IMPORTANT The Castle and Chapel site is within the boundaries of Cambian Dilston College, a residential college for young adults with learning difficulties. For this reason, it is not possible just to turn up on the day, so anyone interested please contact Jan Widmer.
