Message from the Chair of the Redevelopment Committee

We certainly started up the church year with a bang after the summer holidays!

Our congregation voted to proceed with the proposal from the Redevelopment Committee for the sale and redevelopment of our property in our congregational meeting on Sept 16.

A quick recap on the process of how we got to this decision point:

Council created the Redevelopment Committee at the beginning of 2017, after receiving a couple of different proposals for redeveloping our property. The committee's mandate was to evaluate the various proposals and make a recommendation to Council. After gathering input from Affinity group discussions and individual members of the congregation, the Redevelopment committee synthesized the input and summarized it into 6 criteria to be used for evaluating the different proposals. A year ago, on Sept. 17, 2017, the congregation approved that criteria. The Redevelopment Committee used that criteria, and

selected the one that best fit: development of housing with the developer, Options For Homes, along with a new space for the congregation to worship and offer its programs. With Council's approval, the church entered into an exclusive agreement with Options For Homes in January 2018, and the Redevelopment Committee committed to work with Options for Homes to produce a high-level design, a high-level plan and a high-level financial model for voting by the Council and congregation in September.

Council met on Sept. 4th and unanimously approved the proposal. Our Trustees and Treasurer had reviewed and blessed the financial details at the end of August. Five posters were placed in the Sanctuary starting Sept. 9th summarizing the proposal, and many people gathered before and after Worship that day, and dropped in to the sanctuary during the week to become familiar with what the Redevelopment Committee was proposing. At the congregational meeting on Sept. 16th, 76 people voted, with 75 people voting in favour of the proposal, and 1 opposed. There was good participation in the meeting, and the questions raised were helpful for understanding and clarification of the proposal. Our committee also received some good suggestions for future consideration, both at the meeting and afterwards over lunch in the auditorium. A couple of people spoke with passion and eloquence on the need to make this change and to make it now, and one person voiced an idea for a new and different development of our property. There was excitement in the air over lunch together after the vote and lots of questions too!

Now what?

For the congregation, no changes to our worship and programming for the next 2 years, at least. The development process entails many things before a shovel starts to dig!

Now that the congregation has established one clear direction, we can focus our energies and work on that together. If you haven't had a chance to see the posters, come on in and check them out! Still have questions? Let us know! Have some suggestions? Pass them on! Your Affinity group leader will be happy to hear from you, and we plan to meet again in our groups in November once the Fall sale is over and all of our committee are back from vacations.

Through this journey over the last year and a half, the Redevelopment Committee has gotten to know the congregation more deeply, and understand more fully how strong a sense of community and purpose our congregation has. We look forward to continuing to work closely together with everyone in the next step of our redevelopment journey.

Faith in Action

Highlights of an Interview with Reverend Kathleen Buligan, Deacon, at St. Timothy's Anglican Church in Agincourt.

The Vision: "Reaching Out to Those in Need - Here, Near and Far"

St. Timothy's supports the "Out of the Cold" project one Friday evening in December and one Friday evening in March. Church volunteers prepare an evening meal and show a movie with a snack. One volunteer remains with guests as they sleep there overnight. The next morning volunteers arrive at the church at 6 a.m. to prepare breakfast and bagged lunches. At 9 a.m., after guests have left, a person arrives from Knox United Church, Agincourt, to do the cleanup. Dixon Hall is the overall coordinator of this program which involves many churches on a rotating basis.

Every Wednesday, from 8:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m., there is a breakfast, prepared, by church volunteers, for the homeless. Each year an Advent Gift Tree is hung with suggestions for the congregation members to consider such as grocery gifts, gift cards from Tim Hortons, Wal-Mart, socks, mittens, long underwear, etc. Individuals donate as they wish. These gifts are distributed throughout the year. They also collect toys and gift cards at Advent for the Scarborough Boys and Girls Club.

For the last two years there has been a Mothers Day luncheon to support the Stephen Lewis program, "Grandmothers to Grandmothers". Guests are charged \$20 for lunch and the local "Grandmothers to Grandmothers" brings products for sale. Last year they were able to send \$1100 to the Foundation. Two High School students, in Uganda, a boy and a girl, are sponsored by the church. This is a result of one of the church members having taught teachers there. One of her former Ugandan students has started an educational centre "Wide Smiles" with a school, residence and crops on site. St Timothy's donates funds to help the leader purchase more land. The centre sells excess crops, with the funds received going to provide more educational opportunities.

On a pleasant Saturday morning in June the Outreach Committee does a walk-a-thon sponsored by members of the congregation and the community. The proceeds fund some of the programs listed. The church partners with the Agincourt Community Services Association to provide hot lunches for those in need every Thursday. St. Timothy's provides volunteers, space and cooks the food. They also donate food to the Agincourt Community Services Association. These programs have been developed to meet specific needs in the community.

I am grateful to Reverend Kathleen Buligan for her gracious response to my request for an interview.

Why Write About Your Life?

For eight weeks, on Wednesday and Sunday afternoons beginning October 21, small groups will gather every week for two hours in our church living room to encourage each other in "memoir" or "life-story" writing. You might wonder why.

Here are some reasons:

In our spiritual tradition, we believe our lives are part of the greater story of God's life in Creation. Our lives are ways God continues to write "scripture", a testament to God's continued presence in our world. We have the scripture because people in the past knew it was important to write about their lives. Our lives are no less important. We can become so involved in the day-to-day that we don't notice the big themes, like the purpose, meaning, and patterns of our lives. We think we know what happened, but when we reflect with intention, we see things we overlooked. All of us have had difficult times – but when we review these through a different lens, we see there was more good than we thought. This is a hopeful process.

Reviewing decade by decade, we become more aware of how history which came before us was a part of what created us. Did we live through Depression? War? Economic Expansion? Women's Liberation? At the time, we probably didn't think about how society beyond our families shaped us – but looking back, we become more aware of how we are part of larger stories shared by millions of people. As people of faith we can look to see where the "Angels" of our lives were. None of us are "self-made", all of us have had helping hands sustain us. It's good to discover, honour, and perhaps thank those "Angels" (if possible).

When we do structured and intentional writing with others, they can help us see what we might be overlooking. We can see the "holy" in each other's stories. Writing in community with others can be a profound experience of communion.

Please consider being a part of this. Registration deadline with a non-refundable fee of \$25 for church members and \$40 for non-members is due Friday, October 12.

You won't regret it.



Alternative Ways to Donate to the Donway Covenant United Church

In addition to supporting the church financially through weekly envelopes, many church members use a variety of ways to give. Among them are:

- cheques mailed to the office
- one time donations for special appeals
- regular pre-authorized transfers from your bank to the church's bank account
- donation of appreciated securities to the church's account.

These additional methods provide convenience to the donor and in the case of donation of securities, there is an extra tax credit described below.

All donations are very much appreciated and necessary to enable the congregation to carry out our programs and fulfil our mandate.

In order to recognize all donors, we have recently provided a small donation card in the narthex that people can place on the offering plate, along with the weekly envelopes, so that all donations are offered together.

We hope that everyone will participate using these cards for the offering to make it totally inclusive of all methods of financial support for Donway Covenant.

Donation of Appreciated Securities – a "tax smart" way to give

To encourage individuals to increase their charitable giving, there is a tax incentive for donation of publicly traded securities. If you sell a security, you pay tax on 50% of the capital gain. However, if you donate a gift of securities directly to the Donway Covenant, then the taxable capital gain is completely eliminated and you receive a tax receipt for the full market value of the security.

Here is an example:

	Sell Security & Give cash	Donate security "in Kind"
Market value of Security	\$10,000	\$10,000
Cost Base	\$3,000	\$3,000
Capital Gain	\$7,000	\$7,000
Taxable Capital Gain (50%)	\$3,500	\$3,500
Tax due on gain at Marginal Rate (eg: 43%)	\$1,505	\$0
Tax Receipt for Gift Total Tax Credit	\$10,000 \$3,976	\$10,000 \$3,976
Net tax savings	\$2,471	\$3,976

Donating this way increases the tax benefit of your annual charitable giving, and the higher your tax rate, the more benefit you obtain from donating appreciated securities. The Donway Covenant is set up to receive donations of securities, please contact the office for information on how to proceed.

Donation of securities can also be very meaning as part of your estate planning, as charitable deductions from your estate are also tax deductible. This is an excellent way to include The Donway Covenant as part of your legacy.
