Getting to Know You: Kathy Bell




I was born in Quebec, but grew up in Mississauga, Ontario. I lived in an area called Lorne Park which is located between Port Credit and Oakville. It was not, thankfully, as developed as it is today, and I remember having great adventures in the many parks and woodlands in the area. During my high school years I found particular enjoyment in sports such as track and field, rowing, and field hockey.

During my 20s, I attended the University of Waterloo where I pursued an Honours degree in Liberal Studies. I had a wonderful time at U of W both on and off campus. It was at this time that I met my amazing partner, Denise – a fellow student. This was the start of our thirty-year-plus adventure together, which we are still on today.

After Waterloo, I attended Queen's University in Kingston, where I completed my Bachelor of Education. Part of my program requirement included volunteering in the community. I did my volunteer work at Kingston's now defunct Prison for Women. This was an interesting experience, to say the least. Also, while in Kingston, I worked on a horse farm, which further enhanced my love of animals and of nature. I have long since forgiven the nervous horse who threw me off his back and caused me to spend four weeks in a very uncomfortable full leg cast.

After Kingston, I moved back to Toronto and began my high school teaching career. I taught in over seven schools in five years. New teachers were continually being bumped to temporary positons, as they still are today. Mostly, I taught in Scarborough, East York, and North York. I continued to move from school to school after having been hired full-time, as "last in, first out" was the motto. My last few years as a high school teacher were spent teaching in a Young Offender Facility in East York—a one room school house that was located in a detention home. I always tell people that this was the best and worst job I ever had. It was anything but boring.

Faith in Action

Knox United Church is located at 2569 Midland Avenue, which is at the northeast corner of Midland Avenue and Sheppard Avenue East in Scarborough. It is a congregation of 270 members and has been at that location for 170 years, first as a Presbyterian church and as a United Church congregation since 1925.

The first Sunday of each month of worship is conducted in English with Mandarin translation. On the third Sunday of the month there is a Mandarin Christian Fellowship meeting at 12:30 p.m. after the English service, followed by a meal. Richard Wang is the Community Ministry Coordinator. Knox United has a long history of outreach to the community.

Mission and Service is a priority and members donate amounts to the Mission and Service Fund which has surpassed much larger United Church congregations. In cooperation with other churches in the area, they give to the Food Bank through Social Services.

Every Friday night from November to April the area churches provide dinner and a place to stay overnight for those in need. Knox members usually take their turn the first week in November. Approximately 40 come for dinner and 25 stay overnight. The congregation also financially supports about 12 other agencies such as shelters.

An application was made to Doors Open Toronto to be involved in the program to be held on the weekend of May 25 and 26. A representative of Doors Open Toronto (City of Toronto) visited the site, learned of the history of the church and approval was given for the church to be part of the program. Twenty-four volunteers are planning for this exciting event. Half of the volunteers will

The Benefits of Donating Securities

By donating publicly traded securities that have increased in value since you purchased them, you can realize even more tax savings than you would with a cash gift. Now that is 'Tax Time' in April, I have been asked to provide information on this tax saving opportunity.

Many donations made to charities are in the form of cash. However, savvy donors see the benefits of donating publicly traded securities (stocks, bonds or mutual funds) as a more tax effective way to donate versus giving a cash gift.

When you sell the securities and donate the cash, 50% of the capital gain becomes taxable income for the donor. However, if you donate the securities directly to the charity "in kind", the capital gain is avoided, and you will receive a charitable receipt for the full market value of the securities.

You should donate securities that are held in a non-registered investment account. Investments held in a registered account, such as a RIF or RRSP do not qualify for these tax savings. Capital gains on investments held in a TFSA are already



tax exempt, so donating these investments will not generate the same tax savings as donating securities held in a taxable investment account.

Consult with your tax advisor or financial advisor on which stocks, bonds or mutual funds present the best gifting opportunity. Donate the securities that have the largest capital gain to maximize the tax savings for zero capital gains inclusion for the donated securities.

At The Donway Covenant we have the capacity to accept donations of publicly traded securities for regular donations or via a bequest in your will.


