It has been a very busy start to the construction season so far. The Ready Mix Division has been very busy with various projects. I want to thank all of the employees for their hard work and dedication so far this year!

We have a few new drivers scattered around all of the plants, I want to welcome all of you and thank you for your service.

Here is a rundown of the larger projects we have going right now. Cozad is in the middle of the Hwy 30 white-topping project, Canal Bridge, and a hog farm north of town. Lexington is also working on Hwy 30 along with



the hospital expansion, O'Reilly's Store, Volvo Truck Shop, and 6th Street paving. Gothenburg just finished a hog building and have started the NSG project along with the I-80 Overpass job.

Broken Bow is helping with the wind farm and supplying concrete for the Anderson Grain facility and a new housing subdivision. Holdrege is still pouring out at the Cargill job along with the 18th Street paving job. Ogallala is hauling PR to Oshkosh and Lewellen and have just started the new Walmart project. North Platte has started a PR job on I-80 and the two bridges over the river in North Platte. Matt is set up on the wind farm job and is currently about a third of the way done with that job. Jeff is set up at a feed yard north of Broken Bow to do bunk and a large feed storage slab.



This is one of 43 bases we are pouring at the Broken Bow wind farm. Each base pour takes 324 cyds of concrete or 32 truckloads!

We also have the west cement terminal ready to go for the second half of the Hwy 30 job. We can now unload a rail car in one hour, where before it took about 3-4 hours to unload a car.

We are entering our hot months of the year, so make sure you all stay hydrated and as cool as possible to keep from any heat related problems. Have a good productive 3 months and remember to always work safe!

BUILDING

The Building Department continues to be very busy this year with multiple projects underway.

The Lexington Middle School is getting ready for completion by the time the school year begins in August. Interior work is the priority now to complete the spaces by the end of July. Project Superintendent Terry Brand and crew are also completing some exterior work to include paving and sidewalks.

In Ogallala, Project Superintendent Shane Schutte is in the same mode as Terry Brand as preparations are being made for the kids to occupy a portion of the building by the middle of August. There is a lot of activity going on inside and outside the new school site.

Project Superintendent Dan Schwarz has the new structure up and a roof installed in Gothenburg at Pony Express Chevrolet. Interior framing will be completed the first of July and preparations will be made to close in the building by the end of July.

Project Superintendent Clay Otto has completed the Lexington Airport Snow Removal Equipment building. Clay will now be moving around completing various concrete projects we have on the books.

Superintendent Dan Niles has his hands full right now. He is working on the additions to the Brady School, renovating the Gothenburg School and working at a new site for Nebraska Salt and Grain in Gothenburg.

Paulsen, Inc. crews have also been involved in renovations at the Elwood Community Center, Runza in Cozad, Dairy Queen in Cozad, Ash Grove Cement in Cozad, Dawson Tire in Gothenburg and several other locations.

Several other projects are in the works for later this summer and fall so it appears we will continue to be very busy throughout the remainder of 2014.



PAVING

Black, Joe and Don finished up on the Norfolk roundabout this spring and have started doing the mainline paving for the Norfolk Northeast project. This project is about 200,000 sy.

Darrell and Sam did some of the paving at North Platte Birdwood Viaduct this spring for SEMA, and finished up the Lexington 18th Street and Heartland Drive project. They have paved the south half of the Cozad and Lexington Highway 30 white topping project and will start on the north half shortly. This project is about 220,000 sy.

Denny and Glen are finishing the alley portion of the Cozad paving, the bike trail and a street for Pelican Bay at Johnson Lake, and all of the mainline paving on the Kearney Part 1 subdivision project. They are now moving into Lexington to start on the 6th Street to Taft project.

We also have a bike trail at Lake Moloney, a City project at Ogallala, two miles of bike trail at Johnson Lake, the Gothenburg I-80 Interchange bridge and paving that starts next week, and some paving at the Gothenburg Industrial Site to do this year. So, it will be a busy season.

McSafety's Corner

One of the special emphasis programs for OSHA is the effects of heat on construction workers and the effects of heat throughout the summer is of great concern to all of us. Make sure you monitor your condition; get relief when you can out of the sun and drink plenty of water and/or sports drinks throughout the day. We have Gatorade packages available at the office for our crews; contact the Safety Department if your jobsite is in need of them. We can also get neck cooling towels for anyone who would like to try them.

OSHA is doing as many construction site inspections as they can and are trying to make a major impact with each inspection they perform; we need to make sure we are in compliance and that our subcontractors are as well. Hi-VIS vests or clothing must be worn whenever you are exposed to moving traffic, scaffolds must be inspected each day prior to access and identified as safe, trenches must be inspected daily and logged on a trench inspection form, make sure you inspect and wear personal fall protection whenever you are exposed to a fall hazard and remember PPE must be used, cleaned and stored properly. One of the hottest topics for OSHA and MSHA is that all equipment operators are properly trained to operate equipment, never operate equipment unless you are trained and qualified.

Once again it's Truck Safety Month and NSP Carrier Enforcement has been busy. We have encountered a couple of locations where road side inspections have been set up with multiple officers inspecting every truck traveling in the area. This will continue throughout the summer. We need to continue to fill out a brake inspection sheet each week and a daily vehicle inspection sheet. Make sure that you are operating in compliance with DOT regulations and within company safety rules. There have been reports that we have drivers not wearing their seat belt, this is a violation of state law and a violation of company policy which will result in disciplinary action. You need to make sure that you never pass another vehicle while traveling through an intersection, stop at all stop signs, use your turn signals, make sure that you are not speeding.

Be alert when backing up, operate at a safe speed, obey traffic laws and protect your driving record – it is both your and our livelihood. Remember to report all accidents and injuries immediately. Now that we are in heat of the construction season we all need to work safely, follow safe procedures and take the time to do it the right way so that we can all go home safe at the end of the day – have a safe summer!

We have had a tough start to the 2014 season. As of 6-16-14 we have four new Work Comp cases. Three have needed surgery and the one remaining is yet to be determined if surgery will be needed. For the months of April – June we had a total of 38 accidents reported, (14 were hail damage) and 29 injuries reported, giving us a total of 67 cases in a three- month span.

But not all news is gloomy! Our previous MOD rating for 2013/2014 was 1.04 and we have been making steady strides in getting that # to come down every year for the past 3 years. Our new MOD rating for 2014/2015 is .78.

Now is not the time to ease up on working safe. Every day we come to work our goal is to return home at the end of the day still able to do all the things we love to do, play with our children, enjoy the outdoors and whatever it is you enjoy doing! So continue to work as safe as possible. Continue to look out for others that are working around you to ensure that they are also working safe! Lift the proper way, drink plenty of water during the hot summer days. When delivering product, make sure you check the area before backing up and if possible, have someone on the job site assist you in backing up. Do all that you can do to provide the safest work site possible. Our safety signs say it best, "Did you work safe today or were you just lucky"?

By working together and working safe we can make the rest of 2014 a wonderful year! Have a safe and happy summer!
