Al & Kathy Cordova awarded Jean Klein Angel of the Year Award 2018

Commerce City's angels are the very best... the people who keep this community going by doing little things for the community on a daily basis. And you see them, year after year. A great deal of time, you see them at the John Custy American Legion Post 151 on Fairfax Drive. Al and Kathy have been members of the Legion since 1960 and have helped with the operation and maintenace of the Legion all this time.

Every year you see Al and sometimes Kathy participating in the Annual Memorial Day Parade on the American Legion Float. The theme of the first one was the Iwo Jima.

Al Cordova grew up in Brighton, CO as one of 10 siblings of which he is the last survivor; moved to Commerce City in 1960 when he married Kathy Torres. Kathy was born in Roggen, CO, 1954 gradu- ate of Manual High School in Denver and moved with parents to Commerce City on Colorado Blvd. in 1955.

Al Cordova - they built their house on Colorado Blvd in 1962 and, after 58 years, still live there. Together they raised a son and daughter (both deceased). They also have two grand and four great grandchildren.

Kathy joined the American Legion Post 151 Auxiliary in 1960 and has served as President, secretary, treasurer, and director for many years. The American Legion is a family project as both are very involved in the Legion. When you go to the Legion they are always there and they are helping in some way.

Kathy still helps prepare food for the many dinners and events, works the food line and cleans the Legion every third week. She worked for the American Legion for a few years and also worked for the Merchandise Mart and they now call her in to help with big events. The first parade she participated in was the lwo Jima.

Kathy is a kind, happy per-



son and a welcome member to the community.

Al, now 88, spent 5 years as regular army soldier in the Army Ski Division in Alaska and 3 years reserve duty in Korea. Among his jobs has been a structural steel worker that included walking beams way above ground, and driving a cement mixer after retiring as iron worker. He is very involved with local American Legion Post 151, where he has served as its commander for 9 years, junior vice commander, sergeant of arms.

In addition, for many years he's been cook for many Sunday fund raising breakfasts open to the public, helped build and walk/ride with Post's Memorial Day float which earned many category first and/or second place trophies.

Also, for 6 years, he has been part of the Honor Guard at Fort Logan National Cemetery which involved military funeral services 3 times a week.



Event celebrates largest collection of public art in the City

Commerce City celebrated five new pieces of public art and the inaugural exhibition of artwork created by Commerce City school teachers at the new Bison Ridge Recreation Center during a dedication ceremony on June 7.

The new recreation center is home to the city's latest and most extensive sculpture collection. The artwork was created by esteemed regional artists Don Kennell, Josh Wiener and John King. Kennell's three bison sculptures called Trailblazers, each nearly 12 feet tall and 20 feet long and made from galvanized sheet metal and steel, are installed on the south side of the recreation center. He was inspired by the migration paths of the American Bison which were invaluable to explorers and pioneers. Wiener's sculptures, called Steward's Ship, are in the entrance roundabouts. One is of a child pulling a boat with a cloud above it and is meant to evoke a sense of imagination and the need to preserve the environment. The other is a child pulling a boat with a tree and represents the next generation, an inspiration for children. King's sculptures are interactive installations on the inside of the recreation center wheels spinning on the wall and then a mobile handing from the lobby ceiling.

The inaugural exhibition of rotating art, local teachers Elizabeth Castor and Stephen Meyer, were on display last night as well. Castor is a teacher at Prairie View High School and her artwork is made of acrylic paint, colored pencil and watercolor, allowing her to experiment with different layers of color, shapes and patterns. Meyer is a Commerce City resident and art teacher. His artwork shows a wide range, it can take on a cartoony, humorous feel or a serious illustrative feel. These temporary exhibits at the recreation center celebrate emerging artists in Commerce City.

Commerce City makes many different blends of flour including all-purpose, whole wheat, high gluten and is the home of Ultragrain© ultra-fine milled whole wheat. More than 200 finished products are made at this facility for regional and national distribution.



grinds and sends out 40 truckloads each day.

More 90 team members make the magic happen at the mill over three shifts, 24 hours a day/seven days a week

Their efforts result in about 1.8 million pounds of flour produced each day, ensuring that Colorado bakers and chefs always have great flour for their many flavorful food creations.

Ardent Mills Commerce City team members are also active in the community, providing support and engagement with the Tennyson Center for Children, participating in food, tote and blanket drives and volunteering at the SunCor Boys & Girls Club, Denver Rescue Mission and Food Bank of the Rockies.
