Dog track comes full circle

From demolition to breaking ground CCHS watches as history is made

Commerce City and master developer Delwest Development Corp. celebrated the start of construction at the former Mile High Greyhound Park site with a groundbreaking ceremony on Tuesday, Oct. 6.

The event marked a significant milestone in the lengthy process of turning the currently vacant property into a mixed-use development to benefit the entire community for years to come. The 65-acre site will have land devoted to residential, retail/commercial, open space, and educational uses.

"Today is truly a milestone and a significant moment

The renovated

- A nature play area and an all-inclusive playground
- ADA accessible features such as sidewalk ramps and picnic tables
- A labyrinth for reflection and meditation
- New picnic shelters and restroom

The \$3.2 million project was constructed by Designscares

Colorado, Inc. Designed by DHM Design, the new park features a

FasTracks opens N-Line

The N-line is the north spur for the FasTracks connecting the north suburbs with the Denver metro area.

It is 18.5 miles with 13-miles of new line with 6 new stations from Eastlake at 124th Avenue to Union Station in downtown Denver. The trip is 29 minutes.

The N-Line rides on a two-mile bridge that is Colorado's longest bridge at 9,533 feet. It is called the Skyway Bridge.

The North Metro Project had been in its planning stages for many years before voters approved the FasTracks initiative in 2004. In December 2013, RTD and Regional rail partners entered into a contract. RTD was working on the environmental study process but encountered problems with lack of funding because of the recession in 2008, 2009 and 2010.

The Denver



metro region had already identified the north I-25 corridor as being one of several congested corridors and was looking at a transit alternative.

The Denver Regional Council of Governments recommended the I-25 corridor as a region for alternative transportation. This is how the North Metro Rail Line became part of the FasTracks plan.

Groundbreaking took place in 2014-2016. The Commerce City stop groundbreaking was held on March 31, 2016.

The opening day for the N Line was Monday September 21, 2020.

This will transform



Commerce City with development of new homes, new retail, new dining options and it will bring people that do not live in Commerce City into the area and will lean toward revenues coming into the city that would not otherwise. It will also improve congestion taking cars off I-25 which will improve the air quality.

The 6 new stations on this line are

- 48th & Brighton
- National Western Stock Show stop
- Commerce City stop 72nd Avenue
- Original Thornton 88th Avenue
- Thornton Crossroads 104th Avenue
- Northglenn stop 112th Avenue
- Eastlake Stop 124th Avenue

for our community,” said Mayor Benjamin Huseman during the event. “This site is poised to help revitalize the area, strengthen the surrounding neighborhoods, and regain its place as an important community hub in the heart of Commerce City. Thanks to our partners at Delwest for their investment in our community, and to all the elected officials, project partners, staff members and residents who have contributed to this process over the years to help make today possible.”

The Commerce City Urban Renewal Authority (CCURA) purchased the former Mile High Greyhound Park property in 2011 and collaborated with residents and other stakeholders to envision a vibrant, mixed-use development. Despite numerous hurdles and challenges in the ensuing years, the city and CCURA



remained committed to the goals of the project.

Delwest plans to build four different housing types on the property to serve a spectrum of housing needs, including single-family homes, townhomes, market-rate apartments, and affordable housing units. The first phase of vertical construction will include single-family homes on the north side of the property and affordable units near E. 62nd Avenue and Parkway Drive. Delwest is staying with the iconic “Greyhound Park” as the name for the development.

“Thanks to the hard work and tireless commitment of individuals and agencies across the public-private spectrum, Commerce City residents will once again enjoy a vibrant, inclusive and exciting community at Greyhound Park,” said Joseph DelZotto, Delwest CEO and president. “We are thankful for the opportunity to steward this important site and look forward to exceeding expectations at every turn.” Construction will continue over the next several years.

Water and sewer lines, roads, and a regional drainage facility at the northeast edge of the property will be among the first aspects of site infrastructure to be constructed. Delwest expects to build residential units over the next 3-5 years while actively seeking partners for commercial and educational portions of the site. Delwest has partnered with Crossland Construction and Kimley-Horn to oversee horizontal and vertical development and civil engineering, respectively.

Double-fatal traffic crash kills officer, resident

The Commerce City Police Department held a press conference Monday morning to honor the career and service of CCPD Detective Curt Holland, 37, who was killed in Friday's double-fatal traffic crash on Highway 2. CCPD also recognized the loss of local resident Francesca Dominguez, 31, a civilian and Commerce City native who also perished in the crash.

The incident occurred just after 6 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 16, when a southbound vehicle crossed into the northbound lanes of Highway 2 and collided head-on with Det. Holland's unmarked Commerce City Police Department Ford Explorer and a Kia Soul driven by Ms. Dominguez.

The Colorado State Patrol is actively investigating the incident and there is no new information to be released regarding the crash at this time. Details on Memorial services for the victims are still being finalized.

A statement from Commerce City Chief of Police Clint Nichols on Monday, Oct. 19:

Good morning. I'm Clint Nichols, Chief of Police for the Commerce City Police Department, and I want to thank everyone for joining us on this difficult day.

On Friday, October 16,



Commerce City lost one of our dedicated police officers, Detective Curt Holland, who was killed in a traffic crash on Highway 2. For 4 years, Detective Holland served and protected the residents of this community, serving as a patrol officer and a member of the traffic unit before being promoted to detective earlier this year. He previously worked with the Denver Sheriff's Department.

Detective Holland was an exceptional police officer, a devoted husband and father, and a great man. He was an exceedingly bright person with a great attitude. He was one of our most enthusiastic employees and always seemed to have a smile on his face. He was always eager to take on any task handed to him. He brought his "A-Game" every day.

Curt leaves behind his wife, Amanda, and two young children. While our entire community shares in this loss, we especially offer our heartfelt condolences to them, all his family and friends, our CCPD family, and all those who were touched by his service.

In addition to the loss of Detective Holland, this tragedy also left Commerce City grieving for a life-long member of our community, Ms. Francesca Dominguez. "Frannie", as she was affectionately known, was born and raised in Commerce City. She was a 2007 graduate of Adams City High School and a talented artist. Our thoughts and prayers go out to her parents, along with all her family and friends.

We have been overwhelmed by the outpouring of support from Commerce City residents, from surrounding communities, and law enforcement agencies near and far. We are especially grateful to the Colorado State Patrol and the Colorado Fallen Heroes Foundation.

We ask that everyone continue to respect the privacy of the families. Memorial service arrangements are still being made at this time. For those wishing to donate to the families, information will be posted in the coming days on the city's website, c3gov.com.

On behalf of the Commerce City Police Department, we ask that you all keep the families in your thoughts and prayers. Thank you.

Family Histories...

Charlene Kittinger reminisces

I was born in April 1933 in the Barr Lake area to Roland and Mildred Nelson. I had two older brothers. We lived in Barr Lake, Colorado. My father worked for Union Pacific Railroad. He built our house from two railroad box cars. He took windows out of an old car and put them in our house. I remember, on a hot day, rolling the windows down to cool off. Times were hard and he used what he could to make us comfortable.



We moved to Dupont, Colorado in 1943.

Dupont was named after the Dupont de Nemours family and the Dupont Company which stored explosives in the area. We lived on Brighton Road which was the main highway from Denver to Cheyenne.

I went to 5th grade at Adams City Elementary School. I went there until I graduated from the 8th grade. This is where I met my best friend, Ruth Mock. She lives in Mississippi now and we still keep in contact. I went to Adams City High School and we were the last freshman class. During that year, a junior high school was built. So, when I became a sophomore the freshman class went to the new Junior High School. We were the under-class again and we were disappointed that we could not initiate the freshman class. I graduated from high school in 1951. My first job was at Webb's Café, which was next door to our house. I washed dishes and babysat for the owner's grandchildren.

I met my future husband, John Kittinger,

when I was 16 years old. We got married in February of 1952. We were married for 46 years. We had a son, Randy in 1954 and a daughter, Kathy in 1956.

My husband and I owned a black powder gun shop called Kittinger's Gunworks. It was located at 82nd Avenue and Brighton Road. After our children grew up, I went to work for the Dupont Post Office.

Some of the businesses I remember in Dupont were:

- Peterson Grocery
- Ralston's Station
- Webb's Café
- Boob's Creamery
- Friendly Tavern
- Post Office

Mrs. Crawford owned some cabins across the street. She also operated a little store. My mother didn't allow us kids to go in the store. She said Mrs. Crawford was a fortune teller. But I know my brothers snuck over there.

There was a race car track and an airport in Dupont also. It was called the Adams City Airport. Mainly small planes and crop dusters used it. It was located around 80th and Brighton Blvd. Early one morning we heard a crash and then our electricity went out. We looked out the window and saw a plane in the field across the street. It had taken off from the airport, hit some power lines and crashed. Luckily the pilot wasn't injured.

An army plane crashed on 88th Avenue near current the location of the flea market. My husband took pictures of the crash and the authorities confiscated them. They gave it back to him later. I am retired now. I have two grandchildren and one great-grandchild. After 77 years I still live in Dupont. This is where I call home.

He honored his father and mother. In the scriptures, the Lord taught us that in so doing, we can realize the promise of long life. (Exodus 20:12) Louis Edward Jaramillo did just that! He was 9 days shy of completing his 93rd year of life on this earth. He lived and loved well!

Louis was the 6th born of 8 children.

He entered this world on August 27, 1927 in Ft. Lupton, Colorado. His parents were Eloy and Lola Jaramillo. He was preceded in death by his beloved wife, Charlene, his parents, four sisters (Eva, Sis, Jennie, Rose) and two brothers (Chuck, Leo), one grandson (Jacob Louis), one great grandson (Luke James), and one daughter in law (Claudia Marvin.) He is survived by his youngest sister, Betty Jean Richardson, his six children, Vicki (Chuck), Tim, Tom (Susan), Terry (Milvia), Tracy (Lydia), and Ted. In addition he is called "Grandpa" by seven granddaughters and eight grandsons and "Great Grandpa" by six girls and nine boys. nephews, and beloved friends.

Louis' life was marked by a passion for people and a heart to serve. As a child and young man, he served his parents and family by working diligently alongside his Dad on the farm located on county road 21 in Ft. Lupton.

On February 7, 1951 he was inducted into the Army and served his country in the Motor Platoon of the 25th Quartermaster Company in Korea. During his 10 months and 15 days of service on foreign soil, Louis attained to the rank of Corporal and earned the Korean Service Medal with 2 bronze service stars and the UN service medal. After being honorably discharged November 5, 1952, he continued his service to his country for 5 years as an Army reservist but was never called up to active duty.

In February 1953, Louis began working at Gates Rubber Company in the manufacturing division. He served at Gates for 38 years. In those years, he married the love of his life, Charlene Bechtold, on April 3, 1954. Louis and Charlene bought their home in Commerce City off of Highway 2 within the first year of their marriage. They remained in the same house throughout the duration of their lives together, raising their six children and welcoming new family members and grandchildren. They hosted innumerable family gatherings and every Christmas Eve for decades, which became a family tradition. He and Charlene shared 61 years of love, building a family and home, attending and serving their Catholic church, and being active members in their community through politics and the food bank. They loved to travel and he loved to fish.

Louis had a passion for cars and mechanics. Most weekends he would serve the mechanical needs of his teenage sons, their friends, and his daughter's boyfriend in his garage repairing, replacing, or rebuilding carburetors, clutches, and engines from the

ground up. Beyond those years, he continued tinkering with antique cars and maintaining his own personal vehicles. He was a self-taught, highly skilled mechanic, a Ford man!

He often commented that he had lived the longest on his street in Commerce City and was now the Grandpa of the block! As he had wished, he went home to be with the Lord in his own family room in his own house where he had spent immeasurable hours over decades of years with his beloved ones. It was so him; it was so right. Louis lived well and loved life, family, and friends. He fought the good fight, finished his race, and kept the faith. (2 Timothy 4:7) He is already missed intensely by his family and friends, but we have the hope of being reunited once again in his family room in Heaven.

After high school, Curt attended Southern Illinois University in Carbondale. While at SIU Curt participated in the ROTC and played the trumpet in both the pep and marching

bands. Curt graduated in 2005 with a Bachelor of Science in Administration of Justice with a minor in Spanish.

After graduation, Curt moved to Colorado Springs, Colorado

where he took a position at Best Buy. While there, Curt met his future wife, Amanda Richardson. Curt and Amanda lived in Colorado Springs for a few years, then moved to Denver so Amanda could pursue her Bachelor's degree in nursing. They were married on July 22, 2014, just prior to Curt entering the academy for the Denver Sheriff's Department where he worked as a corrections officer.
