

We have partial photos and bios of those present on several pages of this newsletter. Marilyn Krause did most of the calling and put the information together for the short bios.

Call one of these people - most have been here for more than 50 years and hear what they have been through. If they are 90 years old, they have lived through the Great Depression of the early 30s, the drought and then the Dust Bowl, and long recovery from the Great Depression. Most did not have running water at an early age, many did their lessons by kerosene lamps, many had ice boxes before electricity was widespread. All were excited to move to Commerce City and help build our community and schools.

Hog Ranching in (Commerce City)

Hog Ranching in South Adams County, Colorado

The hog ranching business in South Adams County began in 1902 according to the research I have done from the records available to me in Denver, Arapahoe County and Adams County. Most of the areas occupied by the individual hog growers had been owned by George Washington Clayton. Upon Mr. Clayton's death in 1899, his estate was then put into a Trust known as The George W. Washington Clayton Trust with two men by the names of Moses and Hallet as Executors of the Clayton Trust. In 1902, Herbert G. Tiffany purchased large parcels of land from the Clayton Trust North of East 49th Avenue and divided the area into smaller parcels of land and began a small hog feeding operation together with a dairy farming operation on one parcel for a short time. In 1925 this location was sold to a Danish immigrant to continue the hog feeding operation that collected food waste garbage for the animals. Most of the hog growers that purchased additional contiguous parcels of land from Mr. Tifffany were immigrants from Denmark.

In the early 1900's the Hog Ranchers began their businesses in two areas of Adams County in what is now Commerce City, Colorado. One of the locations was located between East 60th Avenue and East 69th Avenue on the West side of Colorado Blvd. The other area became known as the "Sand Creek Area." This area was located between East 52nd Avenue and Dahlia Street, East to Ivy Street and encompassing all of the area laying South from the Sand Creek Channel to East 49th Avenue at the Denver North boundary line. In the early 1900's some of this area was located in part of Arapahoe County and Denver County before Adams County was formed.

In the beginning ,the method hog growers used to collect garbage (food waste), to feed hogs, was using teams of horses or mules pulling wagons with metal tanks mounted on them. The wagon usually had

two men loading the tanks with garbage returning to the hog ranch to feed to live-stock each day.

As the City of Denver continued to grow, the more lucrative the hog business became and the Denver Hog Growers Association was formed and entered into one Contract with the City and County of Denver on behalf of all of the members of the Assoiation. The City was then divided into routes (areas) for each member of the Denver Hog Growers Association to collect the garbage for hog feed. During the existence of the Denver Hog Growers Association, food waste from the kitchens of 1800 restaurants, hotels, and hospitals together with all of the residential areas of Denver were collected on a regular basis. There were approximately 20,000 hogs on feed by the Hog Growers Association at any one time whch amounted to about 10% of Colorado's hog population.

In 1952 a State Regulation was passed affecting the Hog Growers that all garbage (food waste) collected for hog feed must be cooked before being fed to hogs. This was a tremendous expense for the growers to install steam boilers, purchase natural gas, build transporting and feeding equipment to comply with the regulations. The next dilemma to affect the hog ranching business was in 1969 the U.S. Department of Agriculture banned the use of Live Virus Hog Cholera Serum Vaccination to prevent a Hog Cholera epidemic in pigs brought onto their site either by farrowing or purchased from live stock auctions and

dealers. The ban on the use of Live Virus Hog Cholera vaccination was replaced with Modified Hog Cholera Serum Vaccination that did not prevent hog deaths from Cholera.

The final blow to the Denver Hog Growers Association was the City of Denver adopting an ordinance for residential owners to put all household food waste in with their trash to be picked up by the City trash trucks and taken to the landfill. The same ordinance also stipulated that all commercial kitchens must install garbage disposals which used tremendous amounts of water to send the products down the sewer to the waste treatment plant. The actions by the Agriculture Department and the ordinances adopted by the City and County of Denver was the eventual demise of the Denver Hog Growers Assocition and its members were put out of business.
