Minister's Contribution

This issue of the Link will arrive in your email box or for direct pickup part way through this Lenten time and a couple of weeks before Holy Week and the following Easter markings of the Christian calendar. Some of us will already be in to our Lenten practices for this year. I am aware of one of our members cutting back significantly in sugar intake for this period of time. My in-laws gave up dessert for Lent and donated the dollars saved (there were 5 children & 2 adults in the family) to Mission work of the United Church. I once worked with a Roman Catholic who gave up smoking for Lent, which was quite a struggle for him. Some of us will have engaged in prayer and study through the 'Living the Questions' study group. Others of us will have experienced a 'Messy Church' session about 'Change and New Births.' Our Anglican neighbours were invited to "frame an intentional Rule of Life" for their Lenten journey. Whatever it is that we do during Lent, traditionally it has to do with looking inward, remembering Jesus' denial for us, and developing a life-giving practice that we can experience for a focused time.

A Song of Faith was a statement of faith of the United Church accepted in 2006 to sit alongside the other statements of the past. Here is a 'middle' portion of that statement: ... "We sing of Jesus, a Jew, born to a woman in poverty in a time of social upheaval and political oppression. He knew human joy and sorrow. So filled with the Holy Spirit was he that in him people experienced the presence of God among them. We sing praise to God incarnate.

Jesus announced the coming of God's reign---a commonwealth not of domination but of peace, justice, and reconciliation. He healed the sick and fed the hungry. He forgave sins and freed those held captive by all manner of demonic powers. He crossed barriers of race, class, culture, and gender. He preached and practiced unconditional love---love of God, love of neighbour, love of friend, love of enemy---and he commanded his followers to love one another as he had loved them.

Because his witness to love was threatening, those exercising power sought to silence Jesus. He suffered abandonment and betrayal, state-sanctioned torture and execution. He was crucified.

But death was not the last word. God raised Jesus from death, turning sorrow into joy, despair into hope. We sing of Jesus raised from the dead. We sing hallelujah.

By becoming flesh in Jesus, God makes all things new. In Jesus' life, teaching, and self-offering, God empowers us to live in love. In Jesus' crucifixion, God bears the sin, grief,

and suffering of the world. In Jesus' resurrection, God overcomes death. Nothing separates us from the love of God."...

How does this all change anything today (in 2019), some may ask? Though 'egoism' is not a Biblical word, it names a central theme in Christian thought about the human condition, shaped in reading the Bible and reflection upon human experience. Egoism means being centered in the self and its anxieties and preoccupations. We can be about the self in unhealthy ways. Good Friday and Easter, death and resurrection together, are a path to the transformed self. This path involves dying to the old self and being born into a new way of being. The path of Lent is about dying and rising and being born again. "If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation (2 Corinthians 5:17)." There is powerful personal meaning to Lent, Holy Week, Good Friday, and Easter. But there is more to what Jesus was willing to risk his life about.

That passion was for the kingdom of God, and it led him to Jerusalem (which we mark on Palm/Passion Sunday) as the place of confrontation with the domination system of his time, execution, and vindication. The political meaning of Good Friday and Easter sees the human problem as one of injustice, and the solution as God's justice. We are invited to look at where Jesus is being crucified in our day and where do we see resurrection happening in our day?

A message from our Moderator - The Right Rev. Richard Bott

"With the advent of 2019, six years of intense focus on structural and governance change concluded with the implementation of the largest restructuring of our church since its formation in 1925. Thank you for your wisdom in shaping these changes and for your patience as they are implemented. Change is always challenging, but overall the desire to continue to move the church into the 21st century, more agile and ready to minister in our communities and in our world, has motivated all of us.

As we live into a new structure, we are committed to the continuity of the faith of the church as has been expressed in our faith statements since 1925 and, before that, in the denominations from which the United Church came. We continue to be called to celebrate God's presence, to live with respect in Creation, to love and serve others, to seek justice and resist evil, and to proclaim Jesus, crucified and risen. Collectively, the four statements that make up the doctrine of the United Church reflect who we are and the accumulated wisdom and faith of our denomination.

......Inspired by this faith tradition, and because of our commitment to be followers of Jesus Christ, our communities of faith continue a pattern of participating in God's mission in the world. Our ministries support local food banks, sponsor refugees, provide places for the homeless to find shelter from the cold, and participate in Canadian Food grains Bank projects, to name but some examples.

......Confident in the grounding of this United Church of Canada, we give thanks for the privilege, and the call, to serve as members and as leaders in this day. The new name of Region 10 of the United Church of Canada is 'Shining Waters Regional Council'. There was an opportunity to give a name to this region and out of the top 20 names that were presented for final voting, the one that came out on top was actually put forward through Caledon East United Church, that is 'Shining Waters' (with roots in an indigenous name for Lake Ontario).

The initial group of fourteen people who have pulled together the various matters of Policy Governance, Nominations, Commissions and their mandates, Funding, Budgeting, Staffing,

Committees, Granting, etc. has included two people that we know well. Our minister, Rev. Ross and the Rev. Kent Ward have been kept busy with in person and video conference meetings over the last 8 months. Meetings of the Executive Council have been monthly while sub-groups have met in addition. This will all culminate in the First Annual Shining Waters Regional Council meeting this May 24-26 to be held at Georgian College in Barrie.

Our local Regional Council representatives were appointed at a Church Council meeting in late 2018. Our representative is Karen Hilliard, with Dorothy Mazeau as the alternate representative.

Currently the Regional Council is populating its various Commissions and Committees. The new structure is being shaped and populated in new ways with the hope of representing all segments of the reach of our 'Communities of Faith.' If you have some time and talents you would like to offer to the wider church, please speak up or nominate others so that the Regional Council body will be strong and confident as it leads our church in these coming days. You do not need to be a Regional representative to find a role in the wider church. Chairman's Message

As Spring approaches the seeds of the new structure of the United Church of Canada are beginning to sprout. The newly named Shining Waters Regional Council has created their management team and their new website, www.shiningwatersregionalcouncil.ca, and the first Regional Council meeting is scheduled for May 24-26 at Georgian College in Barrie. On the local level, discussions have begun among several local congregations to explore how we might work together as a "cluster" within the larger region. A facilitated workshop led by the Rev. Karen Hilfmann-Milson was held on February 26 at CEUC to begin this exploration. Rev. Ross Leckie, Leone Beck and me, Dorothy Mazeau, represented our church, along with members and clergy from Heart Lake, Mayfield, and Knox, Caledon Village. We shared our hopes and concerns for our congregations moving forward and brainstormed ideas of how we can support each other and what work we can do together. A follow-up meeting was held on Monday, March 18 at Mayfield United Church. If you are interested in joining this initiative, please speak to Rev. Ross.

We are also looking at ways to work together with St. James Anglican Church to increase our outreach into the Caledon East Community. For two years now we have joined with St. James choir to present a Christmas concert, and a shared Good Friday service is in the works. St. James' new pastor, Father Chris Dow, his wife Amy and their three young children are happily settling into our community. Amy brought one of her daughters to Messy Church on Valentine's Day.

Several members of Council and the congregation at large attended the United Fresh Start Workshop on Leading Planned Change, facilitated by Fran Ota and Linda Booty, who have training in presenting these workshops. I was not able to attend myself, but those who did found it very worthwhile. Change is an inevitable part of life and the more we prepare ourselves to guide it, the more success we can look forward to in the years ahead. My best wishes to everyone for a blessed Easter Season!

Finance

We ended 2018 with a deficit of \$ 2,424. As is usual we were in a very large deficit (\$ 16,450) until the waning hours of 2018 when several large donations uplifted the Operating Account to just under break even. It seems that we rely on large year-end donations, when of course we should not.

The 2018 budget estimate was \$119,203 and actual was \$116,779, which is 2 % under budget.

A budget was presented at the Annual General Meeting in February 2019 for the amount of \$121,887. This was voted on and passed.

We would like to keep in the forefront of the Membership's mind that in the 2019 Budget there was attention explicitly drawn to the \$ 5,000 income line item for Fundraising to Local account this year. The Congregation will be required to fulfill this obligation to assist in keeping us out of deficit this year.

The Membership did vote to continue the Mission and Service obligation for 2019 of \$ 4,500. Note this is a like-for-like continuing obligation resulting in the same dollar amount arriving at the Mission Programs as 2018's \$ 6,500 obligation.



It is a tool to help open conversation giving open-minded Christians an opportunity to network and, perhaps most importantly, give them the assurance that they are not alone in their beliefs.



United Church Women (UCW) report

After fellowship we heard from Allan Bracken who shared reflections from his time as a fire fighter and former Fire Chief in Caledon. In 1946 after the war, he was involved in organizing the volunteer firefighting brigade which also eventually involved the Fire-ettes - a group of women including Madeline Norrie and Anne Allengame who would bring food and blankets out to a fire scene. He shared some highs - including helping a cow get out of being stuck in a tree - and some lows - including the horrific Mother's Day crash in Caledon. It was so evident that Allan found his time a "real honour", and he closed his meaningful talk with us by reading the Fire Fighter's prayer.





Our March Meeting featured desserts from Ann Wood and Betty Ward and we welcomed Reverend Leckie and Molly Hutchinson to our table. We were joined by many new faces, Jeanette from Salem United and others from our friends from across the street and one visitor, Lynne Norris! How lovely. We thanked MaryAnn Johnston for agreeing to join the UCW transition team as large changes are enacted within how the United Church is organized. We are now within Shining Waters.

Dorothy Mazeau, a long time expert in shared living, spoke during our program, outlining the benefits, steps and considerations associated with communal living. It is called Golden Girls Living and she's expanding to involve men also. It's intent is to connect older women wishing to share their homes with others for mutual benefit. Loneliness is a real problem, she explained, and outlined the experiences of many others who have tried and are thriving with this new living arrangement later in life. Interfaith Symposium

On Saturday, March 2nd, approximately 500 women of different faiths, had the pleasure of attending the Interfaith Symposium hosted by the Ahmadiyya Muslim Women's Association, Canada. The topic was *The Founder of My Faith as a Role Model in Establishing Peace*. A panel of female speakers representing Christianity, Judaism, Sihkism, Indigenous Peoples and Islam, shared their viewpoints. This event was an opportunity to be open and become aware of the true beliefs of the different religions. Speakers touched on inter-religious peace, social peace, economic peace, political peace and individual peace. Rev. Emma Pipes of Knox United Church in Caledon Village, presented the Christian perspective. She spoke eloquently on the difficulties of achieving individual peace. Emma encouraged us to continue striving for inner peace knowing that we are held in God's love.

After the presentations, the women mingled, talked, asked questions and looked at the displays and resource tables. Rev. Jean Leckie of Heart Lake United Church, kindly brought printed materials and spoke with many who dropped by our Christian resource table. Many thanks to the Muslim women who generously provided delicious foods for everyone's enjoyment.

The Outreach Team recruited Rev. Emma Pipes to be the Christian speaker, provided printed materials from The United Church of Canada, and web links to the Canadian Council of Churches. The team also promoted the event within our church and with local United Churches.

Participating in the Interfaith Symposium, was a wonderful opportunity to deepen our relationship with the Ahmadiyya Muslim women after our Peace and Harmony Sunday Service held on November 17th, 2018. At the Sunday service, their Imam did the meditation, and openly welcomed and answered our questions. Members of their mosque in Maple, Ontario, attended the church service and afterwards, we enjoyed a potluck lunch. Many thanks to all who donated food, helped set up, clean up, and welcomed our guests.

The Outreach Team believes that it is important to continue to build bridges across our various communities of faith. In light of ongoing and the recent violent acts against our Muslim brothers and sisters, connecting, relationship building and open communication will support us as we strive to reach the goal for peace.

Reciprocal Visit to the Ahmadiyyat Muslim Mosque

Another step in relationship building with the Ahmadiyyat Muslim Community, is to make a reciprocal visit to their Baitul Islam Mosque in Maple, tentatively scheduled for Friday, May 10th. Earth Day Canada Challenge 2019: Protect Our Species

Nature's gifts to our planet are the millions of species that we know and love, and many more that remain to be discovered. Unfortunately, human beings have irrevocably upset the balance of nature and, as a result, the world is facing the greatest rate of extinction since we lost the dinosaurs more than 60 million years ago.

But unlike the fate of the dinosaurs, the rapid extinction of species in our world today is the result of human activity (Earth Day Canada Web Site).

Earth Day Network is asking people to join our Protect our Species campaign. Our goals are to:

- Educate and raise awareness about the accelerating rate of extinction of millions of species and the causes and consequences of this phenomenon.
- Achieve major policy victories that protect broad groups of species as well as individual species and their habitats.
