The next board meeting will take place on Sunday, August 11 at Chapman University in Southern California.

I recently attended the leadership workshop at the National Conference in Albuquerque and as before, the need for membership recruitment is at the top of the list. CalASTA Bakersfield Section is maintaining their 21 members by sending renewal requests and inviting all string educators to participate in the planning of events. We are the youngest official section of the California State Chapter; we hope we are serving the needs of all strings educators in the area. We have picked up a few new members, string teachers in Tehachapi. With two orchestras in the Tehachapi area, I hope they are thriving in our ASTA section, as well. Our first official event last year was the Solo Festival and Competition on April 13, 2018.

This fall we had another String Workshop on November 3, 2018 with an emphasis on inviting students from public and private teachers to have four levels of workshops with four clinicians. It was another huge success. We had a total of 65 students, divided into levels; we will have to find a bigger venue next year! Last year we did three levels, this year it was four. Level I was Perpetual Motion, with Clinician Bassist, John Hester. Level II was Rigadoon,

with Clinician Cellist, Heather Walkover. Level III was Witches Dance, with Clinician Violist, Tom Tatton. Our Level IV was La Cinquantaine, with Clinician Violinist Debbie Ellis. All were amazing teachers for these students and the demonstration concert at the end was fun, charming and so educational!

Our next event is May 4, 2019. We are still working on getting the judges for the upcoming Festival and Competition on May 4th We will have four judges, two for the competition and two for the festival participants, with the same format as last year. We expect a great day at the same facility, Valley Baptist Church. We had 4 of the 5 winners go on to the State Competition last year, we hope to send as many this year. I already feel like the students have realized it is a big world out there and there is lots of great competition across the state.


Financially speaking, we would like to thank CalASTA for the \$600 seed money to get started last year. Our balance now as of the meeting on March 29 is \$267.58.

Fresno Section

The Fresno section held it's annual student recital on Saturday, March 23 at Westminster Presbyterian Church. Thirty-nine students ranging from first graders through high school seniors and representing repertoire that spanned from Gossec's Gavotte from the end of Suzuki Violin School Book One to Ysaye's Sonata No. 3 and Sarasate's Zigeunerweisen. Two large groups of around 20 students each played ensemble pieces and the rest presented solos for violin, viola, cello and harp. These young musicians are the students of ASTA teachers Yuliya Hess, Thi guyen, Laura Porter, K.C. Samba, Cynthia Stuart, Valerie Walden and Limor Toren-Immerman.

On Saturday, March 30, the Fresno section will put on its annual Chamber Music Workshop. We will be hosting over fifty-seven students who will be grouped according to age and sight-reading level, as determined by a

sent out with the application that teachers administered to their participating students. This event will be held as it has been for many years, at the Alta Sierra Middle School. The teachers who are sending students to this event are both ASTA and non ASTA members. Students who have signed up include: Accent on Access students (an El Sistema-inspired program that has been going on for 9 years), and private students from the studios of Kelvin Diaz-Inoa, Lianna Elmore, Yuliya Hess, Thi Nguyen, K.C. Simba, Cynthia Stuart, Limor Toren-Immerman, and Judy Robinson. The workshop runs from 8:30AM till 2PM, with an informal recital from 2-3PM showcasing what the students have been working on during the workshop. This is both a big sight-reading day and a first introduction for some students to chamber music and playing one on a part. Coaches who will be teaching, and in some instances playing with the students include: Kelvin Diaz-Inoa, Adam Elmore, Lianna Elmore, Yuliya Hess, Elaine Ikemoto, Gayane Korkmazian, Willard Roberson, Judy Robinson, Caleb Sandersier, K.C. Simba, Matthew Smoke, Cynthia Stuart, and Limor Toren-Immerman.

On Saturday, June 1, the Fresno section will hold its yearly Solo Competition at the Fresno State Department of Music's Walberg Hall. Although we welcome both ASTA and non ASTA teachers to send students and to coach at our chamber music workshop, we limit entries to the ASTA Solo Competition to students of ASTA teachers. The Novice division is for ages 7-12, requiring a 10 minute maximum performance of two selections of contrasting style. Prize for first place is \$50. The Junior division is for ages 13-18, requiring a 15 minute maximum time for two selections—one, baroque or classical, and one from a later period (prize for first place is \$100. The Senior division is for ages 19-25 with a 20 minute maximum performance time of two contrasting pieces that follow the same guidelines as the Junior repertoire requirement (award is \$150 for first place). Winners in all catagories qualify to go on to the ASTA State Solo Competition to be held in October of 2020.

THE CALASTA LOS ANGELES 2019 AWARDS



FUNG HO OUTSTANDING STUDIO TEACHER OF THE YEAR

This award is presented to a studio teacher and member of ASTA who has made outstanding lifetime contributions to the field of string playing, with at least 10 years of successful experience with a reputation that goes beyond their studio.

Mr. Ho is currently on the violin faculty of the Los Angeles County High School for the Arts (LACHSA) where he serves as the Conductor for the String Orchestra and Chamber Music Coach, and maintains a studio of young and talented students. Many of his prize-winning students have gone on to further their musical studies in music conservatories all over the country. As the conductor of the CSULA Orchestra/ Olympia Youth Orchestra, he provides a performance opportunity for our CalASTA Solo Competition Grand Prize Winners each year.



ERNEST SALEM OUTSTANDING SCHOOL TEACHER OF THE YEAR

This award is presented to a school teacher with at least 10 years experience and a member of ASTA who has made a significant contribution to a school orchestra or a university program, epitomizing every facet of excellence in string teaching. Teachers shall have a reputation that goes beyond their classroom, in such areas as mentoring peers, presenting sessions at conferences or for being life-long learners.

Dr. Salem teaches and performs chamber music at CSU Fullerton and maintains a busy schedule giving recitals and concerts across the US, Europe and South America. He's offered master classes at universities, colleges and art schools throughout the United States and his fine studio of university violin students compete in our CalASTA Solo Competition each year.



IRENE KROESEN DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD FOR THE YEAR

This award is presented to a school administrator, music supporter, or music business that has made a significant contribution to string teaching in the Greater Los Angeles Area Section for five or more years. Examples of contributions are: Initiating a string program in a school district, expanding an existing program, creating or expanding a youth orchestra program, or providing exceptional support to a program. Other examples include financial support, advocacy, chairing recital competitions or being a member of the string industry.

Irene Kroesen is the Music Director for the Pacific Symphony Santiago Strings, a premiere youth orchestra in Orange County. From 1988 to 2011 she was an adjunct instructor at Chapman University where she taught String Methods for music education majors.

In Memorium- Viola Margaret (Fuehr) Panman March 11, 1935-March 18, 2019 and ASTA Member

Born March 11, 1935 to parents who had just immigrated from Hamburg, Germany, Viola spent her early years in Arcadia, California. When she was only 7 years old, she lost her dear mother. Her father remarried a year later, and moved to a house with a large one-acre property. Some of Viola's fondest memories were her father's gigantic vegetable garden, and the beautiful camellia bushes that bloomed each spring. This experience instilled in her a lifelong love for plants and gardening. Viola was an incredibly gifted musician, starting to play the violin at the age of 3, before Suzuki teachers even existed. She has very fond memories of participating in the Pasadena Symphony and the Carmel Music Festival every summer. She played in numerous chamber ensembles, and was a violist in a string quartet that won first prize several times in the Coleman Chamber Music Auditions. After graduating with a Bachelor's degree in music from Occidental College, Viola got a position as violist in the Indianapolis Symphony (at the young age of 21) and after auditioning was placed 3rd chair. However, just two years later, she married the love of her life, David, and left the symphony to raise a family. Viola never left music, however. She taught her two young children to play the piano and the violin and she participated in numerous local symphony orchestras. When her children graduated from high school, Viola launched a successful after-school Suzuki music program, that encompassed at least 5 different schools in the Carlsbad school district. She built the program to more than 150 students, preparing them for competitions, performances, and local outreaches. One of her most successful groups was "The Strolling Strings", which performed at local events, strolling around the room as they played. It was quite a sight to see! During this time, Viola was also instrumental in starting the Civic Youth Orchestra. She managed the organization for many years, building it into a successful three orchestra program for young musicians of North San Diego County. In 1999, Viola was diagnosed with Stage 3 breast cancer, but fortunately after treatment her cancer went into remission and she continued teaching in the Carlsbad string program. She even insisted on teaching while receiving treatments of chemotherapy and radiation. Later, after more than 20 years of leading the string program in Carlsbad, Viola retired to spend more time with her husband David. But she just couldn't stay away from teaching music. Instead she started a string program at her grandchildren's school, Oceanside Adventist Elementary. She also started a choir program and a bell choir program at that school. In 2016, Viola was diagnosed with Acute Luekymia (AML) but she responded well to treatment, and the cancer went into remission for two years. She was so happy and grateful for the time she had that allowed her to wee her grandchildren grow up and even graduate from college. Just last November Viola flew to Michigan with the family to attend her grandson Jonathan's college piano recital. Viola's caring spirit and zest for life will be truly missed by so many of us all.


