# Dear Friends:

This year, we celebrated VOC's 35th anniversary! As we look back on another successful season, we are grateful to the thousands of people who make our important stewardship work possible: the volunteers who spend their weekends on the trail, the organizations and land agencies with whom we partner, and our generous donors and funders. It takes a community to care for Colorado.

As we wrap up 2019, however, we're also looking forward. In one of our favorite comic strips, Calvin offers to his best friend, Hobbes, a simple but poignant observation: "You know what's weird? Day by day nothing seems to change. But pretty soon, everything's different!" Indeed, even for VOC, things seem different than they were just a year ago! As we enter 2020, the urgency of our work feels heightened. We recognize how much Colorado has changed over the past five years, particularly in urban areas. There are many indicators that our population, and our use of the outdoors, will continue to increase, leading to inevitable impacts on our natural resources and thus, on VOC's work.

This past July, our Board and senior staff convened in Salida for our annual planning retreat. We invited guests representing funders, land managers, stewardship groups, and the outdoor industry to help us look at the future of stewardship in Colorado. Our goal was to create realistic scenarios of the future by understanding the "critical uncertainties" that will affect how VOC approaches our work in the next decade. Two major uncertainties quickly rose to the top: climate change and technology. In the former, we contemplated whether humans will respond proactively or reactively to the changing climate. In the latter, we considered how the technology of the future could either positively or negatively impact the outdoors. This nexus of technology and climate change, already playing out in our lives today, will inevitably influence how we experience the outdoors—from the technologies and equipment we use, to the places we can go, to the many different types of people who will be able to access remote places. We will keep you informed as we continue to consider these important factors.


In this report, you'll find stories of how VOC has already taken a long-term, statewide approach to stewardship. In the coming year, we will again offer volunteer projects that meet ongoing recreational demands, but we're also planning for new project experiences that will help prepare our state for these "critical uncertainties". These include constructing wetlands to prevent floods; re-establishing natural areas lost to land development; and expanding training in crosscut and chainsaw work to enable volunteers to create healthier, more fire-resilient ecosystems.

## SUSTAINABLE RECREATION

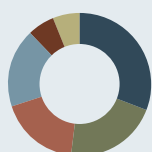
- **Restored 12.5 miles of trail and built an additional 9 miles** – *combined, we worked on enough trail to hike up and down Mt. Bierstadt three times!*
- **Closed and revegetated 1.8 miles** of user-created "social" trails, including the installation of 66 erosion control barriers and check dams
- **Built and restored 315 steps** to mitigate trail erosion and improve trail experience and safety – *enough steps to take you to the top of Red Rocks 2 ½ times!*
- **Constructed and restored 496 feet** of turnpike, puncheon, or elevated tread, allowing sustainable access through sensitive meadows and wetlands
- **Constructed 28 climbing turns and 4 switchbacks**, and built and maintained **1671 sq. feet of rock wall** to support sustainable trail grades and minimize erosion
- **Installed and maintained 391** water drainage and diversion structures to mitigate erosion on trails
- **Built 9 bridges** totaling 130 feet in length
- **Built 1,636 feet of buck 'n' rail fence** and **improved and installed 60 campground pads** to provide camping opportunities that have minimal impact on the surrounding natural area

## HABITATS & ENVIRONMENT

- **Planted 3,498 plants, shrubs, and trees** – providing habitat for wildlife and improving the quality of water resources
- **Planted, harvested, and donated 240 pounds** of produce in urban vegetable gardens
- **1,150 observations** made in iNaturalist app for our new Citizen Science projects, collecting data to inform management of wildlife and natural resources
- **Mitigated 24 acres** (about 18 football fields!) of invasive weeds
- **Thinned 11 acres** of trees to improve forest health and mitigate fire risk
- **Opened up 10 acres** of wildlife habitat by removing a half-mile of obsolete fence

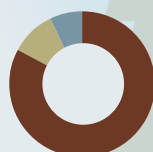

# Wilder: 8 Feet of Fur and Advocacy

*At least 70% of Coloradans play outside, yet less than 1% engage in outdoor stewardship. To adequately care for the outdoors, we need to reach beyond 1% in a big, bold way - a way that only an eight-foot-tall creature can accomplish.*

Over the years, we've had many conversations about the mounting issues facing Colorado's outdoors. With whomever we have spoken – land manager, volunteer organization, retailer – one thing was paramount: the need for a statewide campaign that teaches people how to behave when playing outside.

So, when Great Outdoors Colorado (GOCO) approached us to partner on their "Generation Wild" campaign, it was a natural fit. Generation Wild had already inspired families to get outside and explore nature. Now, VOC would help make sure children and families knew how to care for it.

Enter Wilder: "half-yeti, half-mountain goat, all friend". GOCO introduced him this summer to remind kids and kids-at-heart of the magic in nature. Now, under VOC's leadership, this gentle giant is traveling across the state as Colorado's newest spokescreature for stewardship. As one who calls the woods home, Wilder is sharing his words of wisdom, "You are what you leave behind".

With his tricked-out Wildermobile and jam-packed social calendar, Wilder is here to stay – changing hearts, minds, and ultimately behavior when it comes to how we engage with the great outdoors.

## Long-Term Experience Meets Local

*We've learned a lot in our 35-year history, and we're sharing these lessons through our Stepping Up Stewardship Toolkit. As we expand these efforts, all of Colorado benefits as more groups become better equipped to develop local volunteer programs and meet increased stewardship needs.*



Three decades ago, VOC was one of few stewardship organizations in Colorado. Today, there are many – some large and some small, many of whom are mobilizing local trail users. This is how the Buena Vista Singletrack Coalition (BVSC) started two years ago, formalizing as a nonprofit in 2018.

This year, BVSC and VOC joined forces to strengthen stewardship in the Upper Arkansas Valley. First, as a "Toolkit Tester", BVSC used VOC's Stepping Up Stewardship Toolkit to fine-tune their marketing, risk management, and volunteer engagement efforts, while providing important feedback to VOC to make the Toolkit more effective.

Next, we utilized BVSC's connections with area residents and businesses to rally 70 volunteers to continue BVSC's work in building the Camp Elevation Trail. We also worked

# Expanding Access, Fostering Connections in the San Luis Valley

*In July, volunteers built 550 feet of trail complete with a bridge, drainage structures, and a rock retaining wall. This wasn't just any VOC weekend, however. For the locals of San Luis, this trail was special.*

Nestled near Culebra Peak – one of Colorado's only 14ers on private land – lies San Luis, the state's oldest town. It is a mere half-square mile and home to about 630 people, but San Luis is rich in Hispano culture and heritage. Yet the area is also fraught with a long history of land rights struggles. Today, more than 99% of the county is privately owned.

Rito Seco Park is part of Costilla County's efforts to change that story. Developing the public park is a priority for County Commissioners, and VOC was ready to help! With a grant from the San Luis Valley Conservation and Connection Initiative (SLV CCI) and the guidance of local partners, we trained local area Crew Leaders and recruited Valley residents for the July project.

When the project weekend arrived, volunteers ranging from 17 to 85 years old – several of whom were descendants of San Luis' founding families – joined together to extend the park's hiking and biking trail, traversing past beaver ponds and connecting to historic cabin ruins.

For Costilla County residents, volunteers' efforts will have an impact far beyond the July weekend. As one local volunteer stated, "This is personal. This is my park."

She provided local insights from one of Colorado's rural, outdoor recreation-based communities – an important perspective as we look to advance stewardship across the state.

No one group can take care of Colorado alone. By working together, VOC's proven practices can be applied to better meet local needs. The number of groups working on-the-ground can increase, engaging more people in more communities. Together, we can spread an ethic of stewardship across the state.

# Lockheed Martin Continues a Legacy of Stewardship

*Nearly 25% of VOC's funding comes through corporate sponsors; many businesses volunteer, too. Others, like Lockheed Martin, go above and beyond to have a lasting, positive impact on the land.*

Lockheed Martin has been a major supporter of VOC since the beginning, generously donating each year since 1988. They've also organized several corporate volunteer projects with VOC, often with The Mission Continues, a

veterans service organization.

This year Lockheed Martin took their stewardship commitment even further. On October 4th, 13 employees successfully completed Independent Stewardship for Trails Training through VOC's Outdoor Stewardship Institute (OSI). This training enables them to independently perform trail maintenance in partnership with land managers.

They were taught by VOC's accomplished, jack-of-all-trades volunteer leader, Steve West. A former Lockheed Martin employee, Steve has led hundreds of volunteers on VOC projects in the past 30 years – and trained hundreds more as an OSI Master Instructor.

This training will allow Lockheed Martin employees to “adopt” portions of the Bear Creek Trail and other connecting trails in partnership with Denver Mountain Parks, performing important trail maintenance tasks on their own time. These newly trained independent stewards will soon be trusted partners to Denver Mountain Parks, helping to accomplish important work while also providing the employees with meaningful opportunities to connect with, and care for, the outdoor places they enjoy.
