#### **Upcoming BAS Membership Meetings**

Our membership meetings are held the second Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. at the Jennings Environmental Education Center, 2961 Prospect Road, Slippery Rock, PA. The Education Center is located on Rt. 528 just west of its junction with Rt. 8- about five miles south of Slippery Rock. The meetings are free and open to the public.

#### October 13, 2014-Monday-"Whooping It Up"



Naturalist and photographer Jeffrey Hall will present "Whooping It Up" at our October membership meeting. One of the great conservation success stories of the past 70 years is the wild flock of whooping cranes at Aransas National Wildlife Refuge in Texas, which has slowly recovered from a population low of only 16 survivors in the mid 1940's. This program highlights the recovery of these majestic birds from near extinction and shows many other birds and other natural delights that can be found in the "Coastal Bend" area of Texas including a surprising visitor from even further south. Jeffrey Hall lived in New Jersey for thirty years before retiring from teaching and moving to Franklin. He has given over 100 programs for nature, conservation, and photography groups over the past two decades. Jeff is currently President of Bartramian Audubon Society, and is also active in Seneca Rocks Audubon Society and the Institute for Learning in Retirement at Slippery Rock University.

#### November 10, 2014-Monday-"In the Footsteps of Darwin, Landscapes and Life in Tierra del Fuego and Antarctica." by Dr. Patrick Burkhart, Professor of Geology at Slippery Rock University

Long intrigued by the thoughts of Charles Darwin and the exploits of Ernest Shackleton, Dr Burkhart has set about following in their footsteps. On numerous expeditions to Patagonia, Tierra del Fuego, across the Drake Passage to the Weddel Sea and the Antarctic Peninsula, he has enjoyed the opportunity to explore these vivid landscapes and study their natural history. From whales, to mammals and birds, glaciers, climate, and rocks, he has learned immensely under the inspiration of these great icons. Come enjoy engaging photography, coupled to sometimes troubling thoughts, including one instance where Darwin was flat-out wrong!


#### December 28, 2014-Sunday-Pleasantville CBC

The circle for this count encompasses the area approximately from Titusville in the northwest to Pleasantville to Tionesta in the northeast south to President east to Oleopolis and Rouseville and then north along the western edge of Oil Creek State Park. The count is centered on the historic ghost town of Pithole. Please feel welcome to participate in this count. Assignments can be made for an area easy to get to if you are unfamiliar with this count. Also needed are feeder watchers who live in the area. If you are unsure if you are in the count circle, call and ask. This is a more northern count than the Butler count, so expect some more northern species. Bartramian Audubon Society and Jennings Environmental Education Center will collaborate on two bird-related events this winter. These are ideal opportunities to learn about how individuals can assist researchers in gathering important data about bird population and migration trends, as well as to increase birding skills. - On Saturday, December 20<sup>th</sup> Jennings will provide an indoor observation station for the annual Butler County Christmas Bird Count. Anyone who is interested is welcome to attend this free, informal birding session. Jennings staff and representatives of the Bartramian Audubon Society will be on hand to explain observing and recording procedures and to help identify birds seen at the outdoor feeders.
- On Saturday, February 14th during the annual Great Backvard Bird Count (GBBC), a workshop and observation session will be offered for any individuals, ages 12 and older, who share an interest in birds. Participants will learn from Jennings' staff the basics of bird identification, observe and count birds at the feeders, and be introduced to the use of the GBBC website for submitting data and obtaining information. They will be encouraged to use their new skills to observe birds and submit their own data at home. Representatives of the Bartramian Audubon Society also will be there to help. This event is particularly recommended for teachers, youth leaders, parents or grandparents who want to involve their children in citizen science projects. Preregistration is required. In its 18th year, the Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) is hosted by the National Audubon Society and Cornell Lab of Ornithology in partnership with Bird Studies Canada. #### **Audubon Adventures Available to Teachers**

During the 2014-2015 school year Bartramian Audubon again will sponsor and fund, on a first-come, first served basis, a limited number of Audubon Adventures classroom kits for individual classes in grades 3-5 in schools in Butler, Lawrence, Mercer and Venango Counties. The newest Audubon Adventures classroom kit will be available in digital subscription format, presented exclusively on the Audubon Adventures website, where teachers can access all new student magazines, background information, hands-on activities, and much more! Subscriptions for the upcoming school year will include: "Wild About Birds," "The Buzz about Native Bees," "Birds & Other Wildlife of Our Towns & Cities," and a "Birds on the Move" bird migration poster. A one-year National Audubon Society membership for the teacher also is included. Newsletter issues in sets from past years are also available in print form, including a "Build Your Own Kit" option. Each kit contains sets of 32 student magazine issues, plus lesson plans and teacher resource materials designed to help bring the natural world into the classroom and to connect kids to the environment. The kits can be used across the curriculum and are correlated to national language arts and science standards. Audubon Adventures classes also will be invited to participate in a national citizen science effort (Great Backyard Bird Count) or bird-friendly habitat improvement project.

Each year Bartramian Audubon awards one scholarship for a local teacher to attend the "Sharing Nature: An Educator's Week" session of Audubon Camp in Maine on Hog Island. This session aims to inspire and empower both science and non-science teachers who seek practical approaches for integrating environmental education into their classes. Those who attend the camp become part of a legacy of Audubon education that began in 1936. Instructed by some of the most respected naturalists and environmental educators in the nation, they participate in interdisciplinary workshops and field trips that teach inquiry-based science in the context of the forest, intertidal and ocean ecosystems of the scenic Maine coast. Participants also find time to share ideas with fellow educators, enjoy the camp's delicious home cooking and explore the environs of historic Hog Island during this extraordinary learning adventure. The application period for the Hog Island scholarship for July, 2015 is now open, and will close on February 28, 2015. 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## March 9, 2015-Monday-"The Realities and Opportunities of Using Native Plants"


Mark Brownlee, principal and head propagator of ArcheWild Consulting, Design and Native Nurseries, will present. Gardening with native plants to promote ecological health turns out to be much more complex than switching from mums to asters. Our local birds, butterflies, beetles and pollinators of all sorts have close relationships with the 3,000 plus native plants growing in Pennsylvania. Yet fewer than five percent of Pennsylvania native plants are in cultivation. We'll talk about the unique opportunities for us to help change this and the realities of using native plants.

## April 13, 2015-Monday-"Climate Change 2015: The Science, the Impacts, and the Projections"

Dr. Julie A. Snow will present an overview of the science of climate change, go through current impacts, and offer projections for the future. She will provide a special focus on threatened birds and their habitats. Dr Snow is an Associate Professor in the Department of Geography, Geology, and the Environment at Slippery Rock University, where she has been teaching for eleven years. She earned her B.S. in Chemistry from Wittenberg University and her M.S. and Ph.D. in Oceanography from the Graduate School of Oceanography at the University of Rhode Island. Dr. Snow's current research focuses on trends in mercury deposition levels and their relationships to atmospheric transport over the last fifteen years in the United States.

#### December 20, 2014 -Butler CBC

After the amazingly high count of species in 2012 and the underwhelming low count in 2013, this year's count of 75 species was well – fairly average. Count day with temperatures recorded by compilers as between 25° and 32° was nestled between the first freeze of winter and the deep freeze of early January. The day was generally overcast with no appreciable snow cover and with Lake Arthur still providing some open water waterfowl were tallied albeit not in the greatest of numbers. Food was still present for some of the field observers attracting collections of feeding birds but northern species such as siskins and redpolls had not yet put in an appearance in our area. Owls were fairly represented including this one Gene, Nancy, and I discovered while driving down a country road.

Each year Bartramian Audubon awards one scholarship for a local teacher to attend the "Sharing Nature: An Educator's Week" session of Audubon Camp in Maine on Hog Island. 

# Recognition for Bird and Butterfly Sanctuaries \*Presented to\* GROVE CITY COLLEGE Grove City, Pennsylvania

This new Bird & Butterfly Sanctuary is a model of conservation process at its very best. It is a brief but continuing story of a neotropical species, the Chimney Swift (Chaetura pelagica), which over-winters mostly in South America and breeds throughout Pennsylvania. Originally nesting in hollow trees and cliff crevices, the species today is almost completely dependent upon human-made nest sites: chimneys. In early 2013, an elementary school whose chimney a colony of swifts had used for breeding and migrating purposes for decades was slated for destruction. An artificial nesting tower was constructed on a lower campus two-acre wetland of Grove City College through the combined efforts of Sharon Thompson, John Relihan, BAS, and Grove City College. (See the story in Upland Informer vol 32 issue 3.) Grove City College not only agreed to the tower/kiosk site but also financed the completion of the kiosk itself and will maintain the site under the watchful eyes of Dr. Fred Brenner, Professor of Biology, Grove City College. The award was accepted by Dr. Brenner's wife, Pat, as Dr. Brenner was unable to attend the ceremony.
