1977 C.A.C.B.F. Tournament



The sixth annual C. A. C. B. F. championships were absolutely the most splendid ever: the organization, the venue, the welcoming committee, the visiting dignitaries and experts, the opening ceremony, the gadgetry, the direction, the bilingual daily bulletins, the tournament emblems and flags, the mothers day gifts, the performance by Simadanza, the world press coverage, the stamp issue, the victory banquet and more.

It was Bon Bini at the airport from the welcoming committee and the airport edition daily bulletins in English and Spanish. We were then ferried in tournament-designated taxis to the gorgeous Holiday Inn hotel. It was beautiful. On May 6 there was a splendid gala opening ceremony and cocktail party at the nearby Hilton hotel. We were addressed by Jaime Ortiz-Patiño, the World Bridge Federation President.

Then on May 7 the C.A.C. Pairs championship began. The title was won by our daily bulletin editor, the New York Times columnist Alan Truscott and his expert wife Dorothy Hayden Truscott. Of special interest, it was the first time a pair tournament was conducted with screens. The overall winners:

Only the Truscotts, Risk-DeRivery and the Hellenbergs of Holland reached the best contract of 7NT on these cards:

7NT not only gives you the best match-point score but also has the best percentage chance: you can play the spades before playing clubs and the spade break gives a clue who is more likely to have three clubs. In practice one defender had four spades to the jack onsides and a void in clubs.

On May 9 the premier event began with thirteen countries competing in the national teams. There was a complete round robin with a stake of 20 victory points per match, the top four teams qualifying for the playoffs.

Juan Manuel Nuñez of Colombia produced the best play of the tournament on this hand against Mexico in the fifth round:

South won the club lead with the ace in dummy and finessed the spade ten. Nuñez, who had opened one heart rather than one club because he was using the Blue Club

system, shrewdly won this trump trick with the king instead of the jack. This play could hardly lose, but few players would think of it in the heat of battle.

When South ruffed the next club he was not unnaturally under the impression that East held the spade jack. And if East held the ace as well as the hypothetical jack it was vital to lead the next trump from dummy. So he led a diamond to get to dummy to repeat the spade finesse. But Nuñez ruffed the diamond and got out with another club. Eventually the defense scored the ace of spades and a heart trick to beat the contract one.

Simultaneous with the national team round robin was the open team round robin. Thirteen teams entered. The results:

In the National team semi-finals Mexico beat Panama and Venezuela nosed out Colombia. In the finals Venezuela led by 30 IMPs with 20 boards to go and went on to win 225-97. The champions were: Mario Onorati, Paolo Pasquini, Francis Vernon, Steve Hamaoui, Hector Manrique and Roberto Benaim.

Venezuela made four hearts in one room but found the defense to beat it in the replay on this hand from the finals:

Four hearts made on a spade lead and a percentage heart guess. Venezuela on defense led three rounds of clubs. Declarer led a heart to the jack but now a fourth round of clubs ruffed with the queen promoted a second trump trick for the defense.

The Victory Banquet was exceptional. Besides the entertainment and endless presentations, there were speeches by Johannes Hammerich — lst vice president of the WBF, Alberto Calvo — C.A.C.B.F. Secretariat, Bob Lopez Henriquez — President of the Netherlands Antilles Bridge Federation and chief tournament organizer, and Jimmy Cozier — President of the Barbados Bridge League, the site of this years tournament. There was an eye-catching presentation preluding the wonderful events in Barbados this year.

There was an exhibition match at the end of our tournament between our zonal all-stars and world champions

Torneo Internacional de Bridge de Venezuela

The first annual international bridge tournament of Venezuela was held last year after Aruba. Competition was fierce. Roitman- Cahn-Speyer of Colombia were leading for a while but in the end it was: 1st) Bob Goldman-Paul Soloway, 2nd) Hamman-Wolff, 3rd) Dano DeFalco-Giulio Denna (Italy), and 4th) Eisenberg-Kantar. In the teams the three abovementioned American pairs defeated Alberto Dhers, Joe Amsbury, Alberto Calvo, and Jeff Hand by 20 IMPs in the finals. In the third place playoffs the Argentine national team defeated the Italian squad led by Denna-DeFalco.

The second annual international bridge tournament of Venezuela will be held this year directly after the New Orleans Olympiad.

ITALY SUSPENDED

The World Bridge Federation, by a unaminous vote of its executive council last October, temporarily suspended the Italian Bridge Federation (IBF) from membership. The suspension resulted from the failure of the president of the IBF to fulfill commitments made to the WBF on May 1, 1976. At that time he promised to furnish full documentation and a certified copy of the Burgay-Bianchi tape. The suspension is effective until March 15, 1978, with the WBF management committee having authority to maintain the suspension until June 15, 1978. The Executive Council will meet again on June 15, 1978. A general election of IBF officers is expected to take place before March 15.

The Burgay-Bianchi tape concerns possible cheating in previous Bermuda Bowl competition by Italian players.

JULIUS L. ROSENBLUM

(1906 - 1978)

Julius Rosenblum, former World Bridge Federation president, died at his home in New Orleans on January second. He had a long and distinguished career in the promotion of tournament bridge throughout the ACBL and the world. He was instrumental in the foundation of our federation. He, in company with his wife Natalie, visited our tournaments in Barbados (1971), Panama (1972), and Caracas (1975). In 1975 he presented a "plaque" commemorating the 50th anniversary of bridge to the Panama government. He served an unprecedented three terms as WBF president, where he saw tremendous growth of the WBF. He was a great man, one whom the bridge world will always miss.

News Bits

The 1977 Maccabiah games (Israel Olympics) bridge tournament was competed by 12 teams last July. 1st) Israel 79%, 2nd) South Africa 75%, 3rd) USA 74%.

India easily won the Far Eastern championships 1ast November. The winners: S. Ganguly, S.K. Ghosh, S.R. Ghosh, K. Mukherjee, G. Singha, and M.C. Mitter (n.p.c.). Australia won the womens teams.

The 1978 Sunday Times Pairs was won by Per Olof Sundelin and Sven-Olov Flodquist of Sweden. In second place were Gabriel Chagas and Pedro Pablo Assumpçao of Brazil, third: Jorgen Lindquist and Anders Brunzell of Sweden, and fourth: Giorgio Belladonna and Pietro Forquet of Italy.

Brazil defeated Argentina in the finals of the 28th South American champions by 7 IMPs. Argentina won the womens teams.

The United States Invitational Bridge Classic with a \$100,000 first prize to be held last November in Las Vegas was cancelled.

Israel, represented by their 1975 European championship team, won, followed by USA, Canada, a tie between Italy and Brazil, and then Argentina. Voted the most effective pair were Gigli-Consalvi of Italy.

The 1978 Cavendish invitational tournament had two events this year: an IMP pairs and an IMP individual. Competition was fierce, with four reigning world champions and six former world champions competing. Many countries were represented: USA, Canada, Panama, Venezuela, Colombia, Brazil Scotland, France, and Italy. The pair from Scotland, Michael Rosenberg - Barnett Shenkin were leading the pairs competition until the last board.

North America won the 1977 Bermuda Bowl held 1ast October in Manila, Philippines. The winners (Eddie Kantar-Billy Eisenberg, Bob Hamman-Bob Wolff, Paul Soloway-John Swanson), who had qualified by winning the North American championships, defeated another North American team in the finals (Hugh Ross-Erik Paulson, Fred Hamilton-Mike Passell, Ira Rubin-Ron Von der Porten), who had qualified as defending champions. It was the last year the Bermuda Bowl defending champions automatically qualify. In the future only one team per zone will play in the Bowl. The defenders qualify only if they win their zonal championship.




PLAY ANSWERS



CONTRACT: 64

West leads the five of hearts, you play the queen from dummy which holds. Plan the play.

You have received a very helpful lead but you still have very few entries to dummy. Obviously you need the club finesse to be right, but ideally you need three entries to dummy (for two spade finesses and one club finesse) and you only have two (the queen of hearts and ace of diamonds). The solution is to play a small spade to the eight at trick two. Win the return, cross to the ace of diamonds and lead the ten of spades. If this is covered you can then cross to dummy with the nine to take the club finesse. If it is not covered you can now take the club finesse, taking care not to block them in case they are 4-1.



CONTRACT: 3NT

LEAD: ♥6

You must win the first heart because if you duck it the defence may just kill you dead by switching to a spade. You must be careful to win it in dummy and lead a club, hoping that either East has the ace or that they break 3-3. If the king of clubs holds you can now duck a diamond, and play for them to break 3-2 (better odds than playing for a 3-3 club break). If you lose the first club trick you will have to hope that that suit comes in.
