#### College Visits:

Planning any upcoming college visits during winter break? Attached is a good handout for college visits. If you have been in contact with the admissions representative, then make sure to let them know you will be visiting. Some admissions counselors are based on campus and others are based here in California. If college classes are in session it is OK to ask about sitting in on a class, talking to a current student, meeting a professor, eating in the dining hall, etc. <a href="Daytripper University">Daytripper University</a> is a great resource for recommendations for hotels and restaurants around some colleges.

#### Local College Visit Options:

We understand that everyone does not have the opportunity to travel and visit colleges. We encourage you to investigate the 5 local colleges here in San Diego, even if you are not necessarily considering them. They are great examples of large public universities, medium sized public university, small private college and medium sized private college. The chance to learn the difference between the UC and CSU university systems and the private college experience is time well-spent. Use your school holidays to visit San Diego State, UCSD, Cal State San Marcos, USD, and Point Loma Nazarene.

#### Baylor University Freshman Academic Scholarships

Baylor University in Waco, Texas offers generous merit scholarships to incoming freshman based on academics and test scores. A private Christian university of 14,000 students offering over 100 majors. Applicants are automatically considered for scholarships if they apply by February 1.

Regent's Gold Scholarship

National Merit Finalists who select
Baylor as their first choice. The
scholarship is augments with
additional funds depending on the
applicants test scores.

<u>President's Gold Scholarship</u> \$19,000-\$22,000 per year for four years

#### College Financial Aid Myths

Myth: My friend says they didn't qualify for all financial aid, so I shouldn't bother. Fact: Your friend may not have filled out all the required forms or maybe they didn't receive anything at a UC, Cal State School or out-of-state public university. This is one of the biggest mistakes families make when they listen to friends and neighbors tell them about money for college. What was true in their case, may not be true in your case. Did you know that you must be Pell or Cal Grant eligible to receive need-based grants from Cal State or UC schools? Did you know that there are few merit scholarships awarded at those schools? Did you know that out-of-state public universities give little or no need-based aid? Maybe your friend applied to one of these and didn't get anything, so they assume you won't either. Always calculate your EFC and your best family financial fit colleges to receive the most aid

**Myth:** Those outrageously priced private schools with a price tag of \$65,000+ are too expensive to even consider.

**Fact:** Depending on a family's EFC (Expected Family Contribution) an expensive private college may actually be LESS expensive than attending a California state school. It is always a good idea to determine your EFC before you begin your college list, so you can make sure the colleges on your list are financially friendly to your family. Expensive private schools often have large endowments and generous scholarships.

Myth: My student needs to stay in California to get the best deals. Fact: If California students are willing to travel out-of-state, they are often generously rewarded with merit scholarships based on geography. Out-of-state schools are looking for California students to diversify their campuses.

**Myth:** The estimated family contribution (EFC) number is the exact amount I have to pay.

**Fact:** It's just an estimate; you may owe more or less. "The biggest misconception we see is about estimated family contribution," says Joseph Trentacoste, assistant vice president of student services at Mercy College in Dobbs Ferry, New York. "Although the EFC is based on dollar figures, it is not the exact amount you will have to pay for college, and it is only used as an index to determine your eligibility for federal awards and institutional aid. Other factors, the largest being the cost of your school, play in to the amount and type of aid you can receive," he explains. Additionally, each school has its own formula for determining aid.

Myth: The FAFSA is only for grant money and scholarships.

Fact: It's also a requirement for loans, and it awards work-study programs.

Rosemary Ferrucci, associate dean of financial aid at New York Institute of Technology in New York City, says there's a lot more to the FAFSA than just free grant money. "Financial aid actually includes utilizing federal money to pay part of an expense now (tuition) but not paying any interest while in school or even not having to pay that full amount of money back until after graduation," she says, as is the case with Subsidized Stafford Loans. She adds that others are "awarded federal college work study — working at school, around your schedule and getting a paycheck for it." If you don't fill out the FAFSA, you aren't eligible for these types of aid, either.

#### FYI Column:

#### Majors/Programs of Study

Choosing a program of study in college produces a great deal of angst, even fear, for both students and parents. Let me assure you that choosing a program/major does NOT lock you into a career. A specific major could lead to several careers and several programs could lead to one career. Two thirds of all college freshmen change their major at least once! And if a student is "undecided", all doors will be open for exploration. The good news is that college campuses have career service departments to support a student's needs with interest inventories as well as career preparation.

But what can a student do now to explore college majors/programs? First, pick an "area" of study that interests you the most - right now - then research! Mine college departmental websites and understand the mission and learning outcomes. Drill even deeper by reading the actual courses required for programs of interest. This is a wonderful way to understand what academic content will be required, and, whether or not it is truly the material that excites you! Continue to scour college websites for specific clubs and organizations, activities, and experiential learning opportunities that support your academic interests. When possible - visit and meet with students and departmental faculty. Because not all programs are created equal, if you ask focused questions either on a visit or by phone or email, you will be able to begin discerning the strength of each college's departments.
