OCCHC/SteppingUP transitioned 43 families on the brink of homelessness in 2018 including three families, in collaboration with Illumination Foundation who were identified as homeless by the children's schools in the City of Anaheim and once living in the Santa Ana Riverbed. The stability and affordability of housing now offers an opportunity for each family to rebuild their lives.

Move in day was an especially joyous occasion for the Antunez Family, as not only was this one of the daughter's birthdays, but they were also able to celebrate finally having a place to call their own. After losing his wife a few years ago, Mr. Antunez tried his best to provide for his daughters. Increased rents and stagnant wages led to homelessness for him and his girls, who now live in their own 3-bedroom unit and have a place to call home.

MEET LIZBETH...

Lizbeth came to OCCHC with her family after living in a one bedroom apartment with two other families. Their family always dreamed of having their own place to call home. Her father shares that today, "We live with a peace of mind that we have our own safe home where our children can do their homework and live comfortably. The SteppingUP Program has helped us parents understand the educational system in the US so we are better equipped to help our children."

This year, Lizbeth, became the first generation in her family to step up to college. shares "SteppingUP has given me the opportunity to see a variety of colleges, have weekly academic sessions and a better understanding of our complex educational system."

Her parents dream is for their family is to graduate high school and college, be someone in life with a successful career and in the future, own a home. Lizbeth will attend CSUF in the fall and would like to be a Spanish teacher. She is paving the way for her younger siblings and their future. Next up, homeownership!
