Trail Blazing By John Lampkin

Everyone knows that honeybees make honey from nectar, most know that they collect pollen to feed their babies, but relatively few know that bees also collect plant sap! Back in the hive, the bees mix the collected resins with saliva and beeswax to make propolis which among other things, is used to seal gaps in the hive. It is a kind of super glue and caulk all in one! Beekeepers report that it is often difficult to separate hive components that have been "glued" together by the bees.

Man has nurtured and exploited honeybee creations for millennia. Today, propolis is touted and available online to treat everything from diabetes to sore throats to hair loss. Take that with a grain of salt, so to speak, scientific research supports only some of the claims.



In addition to nectar and pollen, honeybees collect plant sap to manufacture propolis.

Bulltongue Arrowhead grows along the canal banks in the SCC Nature Trails and is a great resource for our iconic busy bees. *Sagittaria latifolia* flowers in cycles throughout the year and the stunning white blooms provide nectar and pollen. Like all members of the water plantain family, it produces copious amounts of sap, and this white goo can be seen at every floral stage, even when the plant looks withered and brown. So, if you are wondering why bees are visiting dead looking plants, there's a resin for that!

The Nature Trails is an ongoing project of the SCC Audubon Club in cooperation with the SCC CA. The trailhead is located opposite North Lake on Del Webb West between Vincennes and Seton Hall. Join us for interpretive walks and bad puns on the first Tuesday of the month at 9 am. Busy we be.

December Zoom Meeting Focus on Habitats Saturday, 12/5/20

Our December meeting will again be a virtual presentation via Zoom. On Saturday, Dec. 5, Master Birder Ray Webb will talk about different Florida habitats, including pine flatwoods, swamps, wetlands and scrub.

Although we are all familiar with local "suburban" birds that are comfortable around human habitation - Eastern Bluebirds, House Sparrows, Northern Mockingbirds, Rock Pigeons and the like – there are many more habitats that are characterized by different plants, trees, environments and birds. Ray will discuss these habitats and their associated flora and fauna.

Ray currently serves as Field Trip Chair and Master Birder for the club. He grew up in northern New Jersey, and his passion for birds eventually led him to the Highlands Audubon Society in northern New Jersey in 1975. He moved to Florida in 1990 and to Sun City Center in 2004, while developing skills in bird identification, leading field trips and presenting programs for Audubon along the way.

Socializing begins at 9:30am. Mary will begin the meeting at 10:00am followed by Ray's presentation. Details on signing into the ZOOM meeting will be emailed to you this week.



<u>6 Holidays This Season Besides</u> Christmas

Hanukkah - "This holiday commemorates the rededication of the holy Temple in Jerusalem following the Jewish victory over the Syrian-Greeks in 165 B.C.E." People celebrate Hanukkah by lighting their menorahs, spinning dreidels and eating delicious foods!

Kwanzaa – This is a seven-day holiday that celebrates African culture. It begins on December 26th and ends on January 1st. On the sixth day of Kwanzaa, there's a Kwanzaa Karamu, which is a big feast. Gifts of Kuumba (creativity) are given to loved ones.

Winter Solstice - For Pagans, December means the holiday of Yule is coming! It falls on December 21st, which marks the winter solstice; which is the shortest day and longest night of the year. The winter solstice celebrates the rebirth of the sun, because days get longer from then on out.

Las Posadas - From December 16th through December 24th, Las Posadas is celebrated by some Hispanic families in the United States. It's a nine-day celebration before Christmas, beginning with a procession with candles, songs and sometimes even people playing the parts of Mary and Joseph who lead the parade.

Diwali - While this holiday falls a little bit before the rest, Diwali, or the Festival of Lights, is a five-day long Hindu holiday celebrating life and the victory of good over evil. The date of Diwali is determined based on the Hindu lunisolar calendar.

Chinese New Year – This is celebrated for 15 days, beginning on the first day of the lunar new year. The 15th day of the new year is the Lantern Festival, which is celebrated at night with a parade. The Chinese New Year marks the end of winter and the beginning of Spring and is a time to be spent with family and loved ones, eating and enjoying time together.
