"Forest Bathing"

I was going to write more scientific information about the need for seniors to get outdoors into nature. In any case, wasn't sure I could find any terms as poetic as the Japanese study that referred to it as "forest bathing". Instead, I want to write of my own experiences this month. I have been having back issues and often in a considerable amount of pain. (So "what else is new with us seniors", you ask.) On the field trip to Felt's Preserve, I walked back to the blind with another member so we could sit for a while rather than continue walking. When my son was here, I said no to going to the Little Manatee River State Park on our way back from the Outlet Mall but then turned in at the last moment. On both occasions, I had to take some breaks to sit...but, the bottom line is that, even though my back still hurt, I felt so much better for having been out in nature amongst the trees and bird song.

As seniors, our aches and pains seem to be part of our lives; but I urge you to still get out in nature. It is easy on our own Nature Trail as there are benches all along the trail. And one of my favorite benches is the one almost at the entrance and facing the canal. So, Just Do It.

Conservation

As part of my Just Do It theme today, I want to talk more about conservation. I was unaware of the role that methane gas plays in warming our atmosphere. I did a little research after our last speaker. It does indeed have a worse effect than carbon emissions – but does dissipate more quickly than carbon so cutting down on methane production would have a timely effect. One of the major sources of methane gas in the atmosphere along with fracking and cow manure is the amount of food waste that is sent to our landfills. I hadn't even thought of that.

So, my conservation goal this month is to shop and eat wisely so that I am not throwing as much food into the garbage. This is especially true with the buy one, get one free offerings of salad. Living alone, I often don't get through the second package before it is wilting and needs to be tossed. There is no savings if food gets tossed – and apparently, we toss a lot of food in the United States. So, I'll shop more carefully and often…and consider "what do I need to eat" rather than "what do I want to eat" when I look in the refrigerator.

Trail Blazing By John Lampkin

How does she do that?! That is the question that comes to mind when watching a turtle excavate her nest and fill it with eggs. Once she selects a suitable site in open sandy or loose soil free from large roots, she can't see what she is doing because she does all the digging with her hind legs and feet and never turns around to assess her progress. After the eggs are laid, she covers them up, flattens the soil with her bony belly and leaves the site looking much the way she found it. Presumably, she could do it all blindfolded!

Several turtle species populate the SCC Nature Trails particularly along the central canal. Pictured above is a Peninsula Cooter, *Pseudemys peninsularis*, which is called by other similar names both common and scientific depending on who is doing the calling. She digs one deep central chamber and two or three shallower satellite chambers and fills each with leathery eggs laid one at a time. This may help deter predation by raccoons who are expert sniffers-out and diggers-up. Often, the eggs emerge without a clear unobstructed view so capturing the moment was cause for photographer joy. As she worked away, I could imagine her paraphrasing a Beatles' classic, "I am the Cooter. You are the Eggman. Goo goo plop."

News from our Master Birder

We are now on the upside! Each day is now longer than the last, and soon those of us who like warmer weather will get their wish. But for the present, we are in winter. The purple martins should be arriving any day now; I haven't seen any yet.

But what I have seen, is our great horned owl back on the nest at the corner of Pebble Beach Blvd. N. and La Jolla Ave. Remember last year, the Saga of Sonny? One owlet fledged from this nest, and we had to rescue it. Then he was released on July 5. Mrs. owl didn't learn her lesson about where she should nest, and she is right back there again. We may have to revisit that scenario!

I am seeing a roving flock of mostly pine warblers at my feeder, trying to eat black oil sunflowers from it. I am also receiving visits from bluebirds, checking out my nest box. I doubt they will use it though, but I can only hope. On the West Campus Nature Trail, I have seen a pair of wood ducks the past two weeks, on the canal near one of the nest boxes we put up. Will they use it? Stay tuned.
