

Interview with Joyce Schaaf

October 8th, 2008 - 15h00 Goodwin Parlour - Mountainside United Church

Q: Twenty-five years! How would you describe your quarter century of service to St. Andrew's, St. Andrew's -Dominion-Douglas and Mountainside United Churches?

A: It's been a big learning experience. It's been wonderful knowing all of the people, getting to know them, and being involved in their lives... from baptism through to perhaps illness and in some cases death. We visited the little children that I helped baptize in their family homes. They were babies and now they are in their 20s. When I look out at them now, it's wonderful, why, they are young men and women!

Q: Is there a story around how you became connected with St. Andrew's in the first place?

A: Yes, it's really quite funny. An advertisement was placed in the paper by Dominion-Douglas looking for a Christian Education person. I don't know how many applied, but Martha Nell Thomson and I both made application and Martha Nell got the position. When Alex Farquhar called to tell me, he said that St. Andrew's was also looking for someone and he recommended that I call them. So I did and went for an interview with Mr. Bearce Campbell and the Executive... and I was hired!

The fun of all that was when St. Andrew's and Dominion-Douglas amalgamated, Martha Nell and I became colleagues and worked together. And we are still friends.

Q: How long did you and Martha Nell work together in this building?


A: I think it was about four years. We had both been hired to do the same thing, so we split up the work. Berneice Fielding had just taken a course in Pastoral Care and she and the Rev. Don Burns became very interested in starting Pastoral Care Group. I was asked to concentrate my efforts in this new area of outreach.

I would say that probably our most wonderful accomplishment at the church is starting the Pastoral Care Programme and the Pastoral Care Team. Those who came to the first P.C. workshop we had with Don Burns came from all across the United Churches in the Presbytery. 62 people were interested at that time.

O: Is this Pastoral Care Team

for which vou are responsible unique?

A: What's happened is that we've kind of become the standard and when Presbytery or a



Q: You have been responsible for the ideas for pastoral care "happenings" over the years. Which of these have been most satisfying to you?

A: I think the Pastoral Care Lunches. So many of our members who have come over the years don't get to church...they don't get to see their friends. So this is how it began. We thought, "If they could come to church that one day of the year it would mean a lot to them". And all of us felt that if, for instance, you saw someone like Claire Van Bommel and how she loved the experience, it was worth it all, just for her. And the time we had the Welsh Choir, Lewis Pugh came racing in to see the choir members, his old friends. If he had been the only one there, it

would have been worth all the work that went in to it...to see him enjoy himself so much.

I remember we did one lunch on a

birthday theme. The ladies danced, and we had to memorize a script written by Mary Coppin. We flipped up our skirts at the end and had the 'frillies' on. I will always remember one of the gentlemen

sitting in the front row – it just made his whole day...his whole year! He couldn't believe that this wonderful thing had happened in church.

Q: What other programs or events that started with you and others do you remember fondly?

A: Well, the Interest Groups. They started a long time ago, not just as they are now. In the early days we did Chinese cooking – mostly because Red (Martin) was doing Chinese cooking! I remember one little story: Mrs. Fenwick came to the Chinese cooking class. (She was living at the Manoir). We were all given chopsticks, and the next week when we all came back, we were asked, "How are you doing with your chopsticks?" She very proudly said, "I've found a use for my chopsticks...I use them to hold my plants up!"

One of the funniest stories I always tell in all of my workshops is about Karen Dunsmore. When we had just started the programme, she went to visit one of our members at the Manoir. This lady's memory was beginning to fail. On her first visit, Karen chatted with her, and at the end of the visit the lady excused herself. Karen pulled on her boots and coat readying to leave. When the lady reappeared from the washroom she



said, "Oh, you're the lady from the church come to visit. Take your boots off and stay for a while." So Karen did – all over again!

Q: Going back to the Pastoral Care luncheon, there are many of us who appreciate the event because of the Volunteer Lunch that comes before it. What a wonderful idea!

A: It's helpful...we started out by just having the people who volunteered to do pastoral care and then it expanded into Meals on Wheels and other volunteers. You know, many of those helpers wouldn't get a real "thank you" for all they do and the lunch was a way of doing this in a meaningful way.

Q: I think the invitations that you've created over the years have been so warm and friendly. You've learned to do so much with your computer and to create some really wonderful pieces.

A: Berneice (Fielding), Cathie (Duckworth) and I hand-coloured our first invitations – this was before we had a computer. I'd paste them up and then we'd attack the pile and colour them so they looked nice. Today the computer does it; the Xerox machine runs them off in colour...it's changed so.

It's nice when we have an event like the Advent Wreath-making. We'll get people like the Martins to come, along with families with young children: two and even three generations all working together.

Q: Why have you decided on this time to retire?

A: It's timely. Norbert is semi-retired, and Heidi has great flexibility. It seems like this is the time to be with the family and to be able to do things we'd like to.

Q: And what do Norbert and Heidi think of this?

A: Norbert said it's entirely up to me to make the decision. Heidi has a little harder time grasping what it will

mean. "We won't be going back to Mountainside, Heidi." "But what about all my friends?"

Q: We all hope that you will come back often so that you can see all of your friends. What are going to be the hardest things to give up?

A: Oh, don't ask me *that*! The people. Yes, the people. It's very emotional on both sides: I've been through so much with so many members, it's hard.... They expected that I'd be here forever!

Q: What about exciting travel plans in your future?

A: Well, we are taking Heidi on a cruise to the Mediterranean to celebrate her 40th birthday which is on March 31st. She is very excited. We board in Barcelona, and end up in Istanbul.

The next plans are for 2010 when we will go to Oberammergau to the Passion Play, and then do some travelling around Germany and visiting Norbert's family. Heidi won't be with us on this trip; she will probably stay at the Griffith.

Q: One thought that occurred to me is that you'll have more time to visit your grandchildren.

A: I will...that'll be another fun thing that I'll be able to do more often.

Q: We've already touched on our hope that we will see you back here among us from time to time. Would you consider being a guest preacher?

A: Certainly that would be very nice. One of the things I'd like to do is continue to do some of the worship services at the Manoir. I've informed them I won't have the affiliation with the Church, so it will be totally on my own. Apparently, this is fine; they are happy to have me carry on.

Q: What other projects are you going to undertake?

A: I haven't made any distinct decisions yet. Certainly I'll continue

to lead workshops in pastoral care, and give marriage preparation courses for the theological college.

I am still on the Board of Directors of the Griffith McConnell Residence for another year or two until my term is up. Once I am off the Board, I might like to do some volunteer work there. I have been asked a couple of times if I would like to do something for the Women's Canadian Club. I have always said 'no' but next time I might say 'yes'!

Q: Are there other elements of your work that we haven't touched on?

A: We've done a lot of workshops at the church; several featured speakers from outside, including the six-part workshop on *Aging*. We've done several small seminars on topics like grief, mental illness, stroke, and the VON.

Most people will know how the team is set up: there are those who visit, those who telephone, and people like Virginia Carlyle who sends cards to people over 80. And we hold services at the seniors' residences. Visiting and listening are the keys to the work we do.

We've held several retreats: two for our Mountainside members at Villa Maria in Pierrefonds, and two in pastoral care.

It's fun to look back through the photo albums we've compiled. Some go back as far as St. Andrew's or Dominion-Douglas days, but most date from the amalgamation.

Q: Any final thoughts?

A: It's been a wonderful 25 years. I have loved getting to know so many people, in good times and difficult times. I have learned a great deal, and I have grown personally and spiritually. I want to thank the congregation for providing me the opportunity to be part of their lives and I will always be grateful.

From the Minister

I attended a conference at Queen's Theological school a few weeks ago. It was entitled **Christianity Under Construction** and the theme speaker was **Diana Butler Bass**.

Monday evening, Diana spoke to us very clearly and directly. "The world has changed. If our churches are stumbling it is not because we have failed. The world has changed." But she didn't stop there. She moved on with story after story, example after example of vital, active congregations all across the United States. This information was coming from a three-year Lily Endowment study of mainline Protestant congregational vitality between 2002 and 2006. Her book, Christianity for the Rest of Us: How the Neighborhood Church is Transforming the Faith was published soon after.

Diana began the project with the **hypothesis**: Congregations that intentionally engage Christian practices will find new vitality. The key word here is "intentionally".

We all engage in practices. We are very busy people in the church. But are we intentional? Do we know why we are doing what we do? Do we see the bigger picture of the Christian way of life? Maybe. Maybe not.

When the church doesn't remember the **tradition** or know the **wisdom**, then the critics have a point. The church/the people may be seen as **hypocrites**. They may be experienced as **phony**. The church becomes **irrelevant** to many people.

So Diana Butler Bass takes the inverse of these criticisms to observe **spiritual vitality**.

The inverse of hypocrisy is **coherence:** Our words and our actions match.

The inverse of phoniness is **authenticity**: Practices emerge from the life and experiences of **real people** in community.

The inverse of irrelevance is a **relevance** that **leads to transformation**. The Church is called to lead people into greater **love** of God and neighbour, which **transforms** lives.

To back this up, let's think about Jesus. Whenever Jesus meets people, he expects them to **change**. He expects everybody to change and be **transformed**. Everybody, that is, except children. And we all know they just change on their own.

A Stewardship Reminder

Stewardship for the 21st Century must embrace the *spiritual principle* of *ministry anywhere, anytime, by anyone*. Nothing defines a healthy congregation better than **how much love they give away**. As Bruce Sanguin, in his new book *The Emerging Church*, puts it, "When a congregation 'gets it' that it's not about them – not about meeting budget, or providing programs for members, or making sure they all get a visit from the minister... – its chances of survival increase exponentially."

Instead of emphasizing committee participation this year, we ask you to consider your own gifts for ministry. Suggest to us where you feel the Spirit is *lighting you up* from within and how it might lead to a ministry through our church that **gives love away**.

Like caring for our bodies we all know our life in Christ requires attention. Thus, we regularly *celebrate* God's presence in **worship**; *give* generously and regularly of our **financial abundance** and of our **God-given gifts**. We *take* time for **prayer**, *keep* the **Sabbath**, *care* for the **earth**, and *make* **justice** a reality. These aren't meant to be a burden. These are the joyful fruits of life in Christ, a response to the grace of God, not a means by which we attain it. When we combine these *intentional spiritual practices* with the *spiritual principle* of **Ministry Anywhere**, **Anytime**, **by Anyone**, we embrace the culture shift of **bringing Christ to the world**. This is stewardship for the 21st Century.
