Mountainside United Church New Canadians Project 2008

Beginning in September!

Our mission area as a member of the Cote des Neiges Council of Churches is a multi-cultural, multi-lingual corridor to the north and east of our church along Cote des Neiges Blvd. between Westmount and Town of Mount Royal, with a high population of new Canadians, be they landed immigrants, refugees or visa students. These new Canadians are often isolated from the wider community because of linguistic and cultural barriers.

The decline of English language education and services in Quebec for newcomers to Canada offers us an opportunity to begin sharing our heritage and fellowship to the growing population of new Canadians in our mission area interested in learning English in a community setting.

Are You a Coffee Drinker?

Did you know that the Outreach
Committee started selling fair trade
coffee in mid-May? We were pleased
with the congregation's response and
hope to continue in the fall. There
are many varieties of coffee available
(including decaf), in one-pound bags,
as beans or ground to suit your coffeemaker. This
coffee is being used at Sunday coffee hours now.

Why are we doing this? It is a fundraiser for Montreal City Mission and Saint Columba House. Look for our table at coffee hour in early September. A tasting session will be organized for October.

Your Outreach Committee

With joint funding from the Montreal Presbytery and in conjunction with the Montreal City Mission refugee program we are beginning in September to share our community gifts of fellowship, language and faith with those interested in this kind of cultural integration. English as a Second Language instruction will be offered Tuesday evenings in the Sunshine room for twelve weeks from Sept. 16 to Dec. 2. A community barbeque is planned as a 'get to know one another' startup event. The exact date has not been set as of writing. People are asked to sign up to share fellowship and discussion on the theme of each lesson. Some sort of soup or muffin and coffee is envisioned as part of the sharing time of each evening.

Mr. Richard Asare from the Montreal City Mission will coordinate the new Canadians' side while we will be responsible for hosting, fellowship and underwriting the E.S.L expense.

More information will be forthcoming shortly. Sign up sheets will be up soon.

Money for Myanmar

On May 2–3, Myanmar (Burma) was struck by the worst Asian cyclone since 1991, triggering a storm surge and flooding in highly populated areas. More than 100,000 were killed and one million displaced. The United Church immediately launched an emergency appeal for donations.

Mountainside United Church raised \$430 which was then forwarded to this fund. The United Church has assured congregations that 100% of donations received will be committed to relief and reconstruction in Burma.

- and **ALL** the programmes and activities outlined in other areas of Rapport in which we look forward to participating with renewed energy, support and spirit.



HENRY AUBIN, MOUNTAINSIDE AUTHOR

Many of you will remember Henry Aubin's fascinating book, *The Rescue of Jerusalem: The Alliance between Hebrews and Africans in 701 BC*, which was published in 2002. Now Henry has written a new book for the 12 to 15 age group entitled *Rise of the Golden Cobra* which has just won two awards: it has been named an Africana Book Award Honor Book, and has also won the Silver Nautilus Award. It is published by Annick Press in Toronto.

The book tells the story of the conquest of Egypt in 728 B.C. by King Piankhy of Kush or Nubia, a territory that is now northern Sudan, and it is the first in a series of novels based on Henry's earlier book.

Henry says, "I got hooked on this little-known period during my stint as a Sunday-school teacher. An allusion to a Kushite military expedition in 2 Kings 19:9 piqued my curiosity to know more. I'll always be grateful to Julie Dawson for talking me into teaching!" Congratulations, Henry.

The Saint Andrew's Chapel at Mountainside United Church

A Brief History

In September of 1984 the decision to amalgamate Dominion-Douglas Church with St. Andrew's Church was made by both congregations. A new name was chosen and Dominion-Douglas' building was selected to be the home of the new congregation. There were extensive renovations to be done and worship took place during that fall in the St. Andrew's building. One of the key renovations was the construction of the chapel, which was to be a



symbolic part of the amalgamation. It very closely duplicated the existing chapel at St. Andrew's.

The chapel was constructed at the Lansdowne entrance from rooms formerly used as the crib corner. Jim Girvan, a member of St. Andrew's, was instrumental in the design and was closely involved with the completion of the work. The chapel was designed to reproduce as closely as possible the appearance and spirit of the chapel at St. Andrew's.

When St. Andrew's was rebuilt after a devastating fire in August 1965, the style was distinctly contemporary with the one large 30 foot high stained glass window dominating the south wall of the sanctuary. The "Angel of Peace" window was designed and executed in the Montreal studio of Theo

Lubbers, a wellknown stained-glass artist. The theme of the window, "Victory of Good over Evil," was portrayed by the Angel of Peace holding the cross of victory and a dove with a palm branch in its mouth. A giant sunburst symbolized life and rebirth while the lower panels of flowers and vegetables

represented life persistently seeking light and truth. Although these beautiful windows were not able to find a home as an entity after the church was sold to Selwyn House School, many of the panels were sold off individually. The windows from the chapel, also by Theo Lubbers, were reinstalled in the memorial chapel at the Dominion-Douglas site.

Most of the furnishings of our chapel were brought from the St. Andrew's Chapel. Many were memorials to various dedicated members of the congregation. Some are identified with plaques which note these contributions. The stained glass



windows were given in memory of Irene Preston Gilbride, the altar cross in memory of Mrs. Thomas McIntosh and the communion table in memory of Mr. F. J. Tait. Hanging on the walls



the original chandelier moved from the first chapel. The red carpeting was chosen to be reminiscent of the St. Andrew's decor.

The dedication of the new memorial chapel took place on March 3, 1985. It marked a special occasion in the young life of the amalgamated congregation. It was seen as one of the conclusive steps in uniting the two churches. The former minister of St. Andrew's, Rev. Bob Hussey, returned to dedicate the chapel, calling the occasion "a momentous moment." He also said, "I don't know where else a merger has worked so creatively and joyously." Rev. A. J. Farquhar,

minister of the new congregation, said, "the chapel was one of the conclusive steps in our pilgrimage together."

As we gather in the St. Andrew's Chapel for worship throughout the year, take time to look around you. Gaze at the windows, look at

the ceiling, take a close look at the wall hangings and remember one of our heritage congregations.

Erskine & American Building Sale to Museum Completed

After literally years of negotiations involving the vendor, purchaser and the three levels of government, it is gratifying to announce that the sale of the Erskine and American (E&A) building, on the corner of Sherbrooke Street West and de Musée, to the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts (MMFA) was completed on June 30th last and the proceeds of the final payment from MMFA distributed to (a) Montreal Presbytery (\$1,161,600), (b) St. James United (\$871,000) and (c) Mountainside United (\$871,000). There remains in the joint bank account for the E&A proceeds approximately \$29,000. These monies will be held until year end for any unforeseen expenses, after which they will be distributed to the three recipients mentioned above.

At the Closing, attended by representatives of Montreal Presbytery, St. James and Mountainside churches and MMFA, Fred Braman, on his last day in office as Secretary of Presbytery, expressed on behalf of The United Church thanks and appreciation to MMFA for their inventive and far-sighted vision in acquiring the E&A building for the purpose of enlarging and turning it into its Center for Canadian Art. The key roles played by the late Brian Clarke and Messrs. Bernard Lamarre, Chairman & Paul Lavallée, General Manager Administration of MMFA in initiating and carrying through this significant project were acknowledged.

Mountainside's share of this distribution has been added to its Endowment Funds that are invested with Letko & Brosseau Inc., Investment managers.

The Canadian International Organ Competition

Between October 8 and 19, 2008, the Canadian International Organ Competition will welcome sixteen competitors to Montreal to play on three of the major pipe organs of the city: the Casavant instruments of Notre-Dame Basilica and St-Jean Baptiste Church and the von Beckerath organ of Immaculée-Conception Church. The competition jury, nine renowned specialists, will present a total of \$65,000 in prize money, as well as other important awards.

This triennial competition will promote the organ as a major instrument in our country's musical heritage and stimulate the careers of young organists. It is the only international organ competition to be held in the Americas in 2008.

REPORT FROM THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

With the days getting shorter, a hint of fall in the air, and our return to the Sanctuary, it is once again time to think of our congregational needs and our future. We have been blessed with a sizable increase in our Endowment fund, thanks to the purchase at the end of June of the Erskine & American building by the Museum of Fine Arts. The income from this will help to offset our operating deficit. As I reported on the last Stewardship Sunday, our goal is a balanced budget, which in our case

means that the expenses relating to our ministry and church programs should be fully funded by the contributions from the Congregation plus all other sources of income, save for the investment income generated from the Endowment Fund. This income is earmarked for all expenses relating to our church buildings and capital improvement programs. Unfortunately, for the past few years we have not been able to balance our budget and thus have continued to draw down on the principal balance in our Endowment Fund. Continuation of this trend will ultimately result in the same situation faced at Erskine & American where we had no choice

but to sell the building.

Our Stewardship campaign for this year is still a month or so away. We have some time to reflect on what Mountainside United means to each of us as we consider how we will support its activities, both financially and by volunteering our time.

Also, did you know that donation of marketable securities such as stocks and bonds can give you an attractive tax reduction? This is because Revenue Canada allows a tax deduction for the market value of the security without having to report a Capital Gain.

It's hard to believe that I'm already starting my 5th year directing Teen Music Mountainside! The last year has been a transition and a bit of a bumpy ride, but we made it and we're stronger than ever. To give a little background and reflection on where we've been and where we're



going from here, I'd like to begin by thanking the original founding members of TM2; they started as a group of young teenagers, at what was then "St. Andrews Dominion-Douglas

United Church," who had a very strong connection to each other, as they had grown up together here through Children's Church and confirmation. In the four years I spent with them, I watched them mature as musicians, both as individuals and as an ensemble; we took part in many church activities and services and had the experience of performing and representing Mountainside United at other churches and venues, in Montreal and in cities as far away as Toronto and Boston.

The original TM2 members are now adults with commitments such as work and study. Though we will no longer be rehearsing them every week, they have expressed the desire to continue playing and spending time together as a group as time permits. They have already continued their musical pursuits in various capacities. (Many of them have been playing in other groups and have even formed their own bands over the last couple of years. Also, special congratulations to Sade James who tried out for Canadian Idol last March.) This group is now known as the TM2 Senior Band, and as was done this past year, they are planning to host the annual Spaghetti Supper next spring.

So again I thank the TM2 Senior Band. Before these young people took the initiative to start their band, there was no official musical group for teens at Mountainside. Now, TM2 is a very strong part of the music program

here, and our youth today see TM2 as something the church has to offer that they will be welcome to participate in. (At this point I would also like to thank Laura Dizon for her active contribution to the entire program throughout this transition.)
