Activities for the Lenten Way

In the next six weeks we are exploring various forms of spiritual practices to help us enter into the Lenten way. On **Tuesday, March 3rd**, a group within the church that gathers to read and discuss books, the most recent one being "The Emerging Church," is planning with me "**A Day Away**" right here at Mountainside. Using our sanctuary as a spiritual cell in which to journey by the heart, we will offer various forms of guided and quiet meditation, contemplation of the symbols in our stained glass windows and a labyrinth walk. We hope to offer many and **different points of access** to enter into the presence of God. Like any journey that usually begins from home, the inner journey begins at our spiritual home. **Starting at 10:30 a.m.** we will disconnect from the technological world to enter the sanctuary world of attending to God. **A light lunch will be provided.** Hope to see you there.

Our In-Ministry-Year student Philip Read and I will be leading **two Sunday evenings of chanting the Psalms and the Scriptures** in our sanctuary. For the first 1600 years of our Christian tradition in the West, the scriptures were sung or chanted in worship. The Protestant Reformation, which led to the translation of the bible into the various languages of Europe and the British Isles, contributed to the eventual end of chanting the scriptures, except for the psalms. In



time this too was lost in mainline denominations.

However, a liturgical renewal begun some thirty years ago has brought this practice back in part. Our present hymnal has reintroduced sung responses for the Psalms. The Presbyterian Church has issued a new Psalter and the Anglican Church has also re-appropriated the old tradition. It is time that we experience again the spiritual con-

nection of chanting the scriptures, which for centuries shaped the faith formation of millions. It is another point of entry for the Lenten journey. The simplicity and rhythm of the evenings promise to release tension and connect with the inner resonance of the soul. As Philip believes, it will be like polishing a mirror so as to see more clearly the way through Lent. Part of this seeing is seeing into other religions and their traditions of chant. The second evening we will have the opportunity to welcome and experience a Buddhist congregation and its chant tradition.

The first evening is **Sunday, March 8th**. The second evening is **Sunday, March 15th**. Both begin at **6 p.m.** and end at **7 p.m.**

Part of Philip's learning experience includes designing and putting on a workshop for our congregation. Building on our New Canadians Project, he has chosen to develop, "Hosting the Stranger: Opportunities for Radical Hospitality." Philip will lead us through scripture reflection and introduce guest speakers who will share their knowledge and experience of a refugee coming to Canada. **Sunday, March 29th, after church**, there will be a **Potluck lunch** followed by the presentation. Please support Philip in this endeavor.

As you can see there are lots of **different points of access** to enter into the **Lenten** way this year at Mountainside United.

Cuba

Report from Philip Read, our In-Ministry-Year student

My story of my trip to Cuba is a story of being a hosted stranger in a foreign land. With my suitcase three-quarters filled with medicines, vitamins, creams and toothbrushes that many of you generously gave, I arrived in Cuba with the rest of the motley Montreal School of Theology (MST) crew. In total, eleven In-Ministry-Year students and two theological faculty members embarked on this journey. Dr. Phil Joudrey, our fearless leader on this expedition, reassured us that it was normal to be held up at the Havana Airport. Arriving in the middle of the night, we ventured out into the muggy darkness of a pre-dawn Havana. Greeting our weary mugs were Moraima González Otiz, our host, and Hilda, our translator. We knew we were in for a different kind of trip when our transportation arrived—a wonderfully painted school bus.

For the next ten days this was our ride. Prominently posted just below the driver's mirror was the now famous "*HOPE*" image of President Obama. It had been donated to the *Seminario Evangelico de Teologia* (SET), our sister seminary, by a group of American Christians in an act of solidarity with the Cubans. Beside the mirror there hung a mini-globe. Remembering this globe also reminds me how I felt humbled every time we gathered with Cuban Christians for worship: they prayed for other parts of the world, for the suffering of other sisters and brothers, and for the environment itself. I had assumed that they would be cut off from the rest of the world because of repression and being consumed with their own problems. (Why else would I be lugging fifty pounds of pharmaceuticals?!) Generosity abounded. We attended home Bible studies, sometimes outnumbering the hosts. I can recall

the small living room where our group took up all the space so that some Cubans were in the hallway. We were introduced to various people: from an HIV/AIDS awareness advocate (who has been living with AIDS for thirteen years); to an official government economist, Lourdes Regueiro; to a retired Baptist minister at the Martin Luther King centre; to a women's sewing circle. We also met a thoughtful 94-year-old Quixotic theologian, Rev. Dr. Rene Castellanos. He taught us—along with his regular group of local high school kids—folk dances from around the world. When we

were meeting with the rest of the faculty of SET, this theologian asked us, "There are liberal and conservative, evangelical and liberationist, there are feminist and socialist and individualist theologies, and now narrative and contextual theologies, yet maybe there needs to be a theology of the child. Can you imagine what a theology of children might look like?"

There are many stories that I have about Cuba: some I am ready to share now and others I still want to keep a little longer, but they all connect back to the overwhelming sense that the Spirit is truly working in Cuba. I had had assumptions going to Cuba—most of them now shattered. I had expected to see the

gospel suppressed. Instead I saw it lived. It is true that "it is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35), yet I had presumed that I would be the one giving. I had assumed that I was coming as one of the privileged of this world to offer charity in needy context.

But in their generosity they shared with us. This was their radical hospitality of providing for the strangers in their midst. It is what I will always remember most.

CONCERTS PLUS 2009

Concerts Plus 2009 got off to an exciting start on the afternoon of Sunday, February 8th. In a concert arranged in coordination with the Montreal Centre of the Royal Canadian College of Organists (RCCO), the prize winners of the College's 2008 Lynnwood Farnam Organ Competition presented works by Bach, Mendelssohn, Part, and Sweelinck. Nikolas Fehr, first prize winner, and Leora Nauta, second prize winner, were awarded their prizes by Scott Bradford, Chair of the Centre.

At a post-concert reception, Margaret de Castro of Mountainside presented the performers with additional gifts from the church. Mountainside also welcomed many members of Les Amis de l'Orgue, the major francophone organists' association in Montreal.

Concerts Plus will continue in March with a concert on March 22nd by the Yoel Diaz Trio. On April 26th Mountainside Choir will join with the FACE chamber orchestra to present works by Pergolesi and Schubert. Tickets, available at the door, are \$15, \$12 students and seniors.

News Flash: Michael Radulescu of Vienna will present an evening concert on Tuesday, July 7th, at Mountainside United as part of the 2009 McGill Summer Organ Academy. Radulescu is an organist and conductor who is known internationally as a specialist in the works of Johann Sebastian Bach. This will be an excellent opportunity for us to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the arrival of our Beckerath organ in Montreal and its installation at Queen Mary Road United Church in the autumn of 1959. This installation was a pivotal one and heralded the classical organ revival across North America. This summer we will be able to mark this occasion with visiting organists from around the world.

>>> OUR CHURCH'S HISTORY PRESERVED <<<

Safely deposited in the vaults of the National Archives on Viger Street are several cartons of records (dating from 1875) which document our history.

A box labeled *Douglas Methodist Church* contains such treasures as the minutes of meetings of the Trustee Board (1875-1943), and those of the Official Board (1875-1906). The register of Church members from 1881-1905 would, no doubt, reveal some well-known names.

Contents of the *Dominion Methodist Church* carton include the Sunday School roll books, listing children enrolled between 1887 and 1918. The agreements and correspondence covering the sale of the Dominion Square property in 1912 are preserved, as are a good many of the annual reports from 1888 to 1924. It's interesting to note that two ladies of this congregation are credited with founding the Old Brewery Mission in 1889. Their names are Mina Douglas and Mary Adams.

Extensive records from both St. Andrew's and Erskine and American are also stored in the National Archives. They can be examined by the public from Tuesday to Sunday at the building on Viger Street.

The volume of records increases beginning in 1925, following the amalgamation of Dominion and Douglas Methodist Churches. Preserved for posterity are, for example: minutes of the Board of Stewards meetings (1925-1961); minutes of Session meetings (1926-1956); and correspondence relating to the building of Dominion-Douglas Church (1925-1927). Of great interest are several historical pamphlets dealing with the unveiling of the memorial tablet on December 2, 1923; the laying of the cornerstone on April 24, 1926; the dedication of the new church building on April 17, 1927; and the bulletin from Dr. Lloyd-Smith's first service on March 8, 1931.

The history of the Dominion-Douglas Ladies' Literary Society is documented in the annual programmes which outline their activities from 1905 to 1965. The record books of the Women's Missionary Society Recording Secretary date back to 1915.

Recently, documents collected in our church have been organized in acid-free file folders, and conserved in archive quality cartons. In time, these too will be sent to the National Archives. They reveal more of the history of the Ladies' Literary Society: e.g., the minutes (1945-1963), beautifully handwritten by the secretary, indicate

that the guest speaker at their October 1945 meeting was Charlottle Whitton. She must have made a hit, because she was invited to return twenty years later. The topic of her speech then was "Ottawa's City, Your Capital." A seasonal membership to the Ladies' Literary Society cost \$3.00!

Two service orders are of particular interest. One

outlines the service celebrating the 50th anniversary of both Dominion-Douglas and the United Church of Canada in 1975. The second details the 100th anniversary service, dating from the founding of Dominion Square Methodist in 1865.

A recent acquisition is an article from the *Westmount Examiner* describing the dedication of the St. Andrew's chapel on March 3, 1985.

The handsome memorial to those who lost their lives in the Second War was dedicated on October 14, 1943. The order for this solemn service is included.

In the carton containing memorabilia from St. Andrew's Church, Westmount, we find their Constitution and By-laws, and the architect's drawings and notes for the new sanctuary, rebuilt in 1966. A service order from 1975

includes a history of the church from 1900. There is a bundle of newsletters describing the life of the church and its members during the years 1967 to 1980.

Among the treasures relating to Erskine and American, there is a copy of the Act of Incorporation of American Presbyterian Church dated 1864. The trustees of Erskine Presbyterian Church negotiated the purchase of property on Sherbrooke St. in the St. Antione Ward on which to build their new sanctuary. The purchase agreements are included in our collection.

The advice of United Church Archivist Beverly Anderson-Levine is to now track down the minutes of all meetings of Session and all committee meetings from as far back as we can. She also recommends including bulletins from all Sunday services and copies of our newsletter, *Rapport*. Our photocopier will be put to serious use over the next few months as we attempt to bring our proud history up-to-date.

There may well be some among us who have memorabilia significant enough to warrant conservation in the archives. If this is the case, and if you are willing to part with them, please take them to May Chan. We want our history to be as full and accurate as possible...you can help!

OLD BREWERY MISSION VISIT

Mountainside members contribute food, clothing and financial donations to several charitable organisations. But it is direct help to people in need that is most rewarding. Such was the case when a group of volunteers from our church went down to the Old Brewery Mission last November to help serve supper. We were told that there were 28,000 homeless people in Montreal. The mission could provide beds for 280 and meals for 336. It was a cold night to be lining up outside for food and shelter. The meals were hot and included almost half a

chicken. Having served so many meals daily through the years, the mission has a very organized system of setting tables, serving meals and clearing up. Clients line up and enter in an orderly fashion. We wore our Mountainside aprons and were given plastic gloves to wear. Two of us served coffee while the rest of our group formed a line to pass meals from the kitchen to the tables. Our \$1000 cheque, bags of clothing and new blankets were very gratefully received. A big thanks to those who contributed to this project.
