PROJECT: ENGLISH FOR NEW CANADIANS

Are we proud??!!

This project ran for 12 weeks in the fall and 12 weeks in the winter. The second phase was a great improvement over the first, as we had learned a lot.

Refugees, through Montreal City Mission's Project Refuge, were invited to supper at 6:30 p.m. and then one and a half hours of English lessons. We hosted an average of 30, mostly Haitians and Africans, each evening.

As our confidence and admiration for these young people grew—mostly young men in their 20s and 30s—and their trust in us grew, these conversations became easier. Also the meal became simpler—a hearty soup, bread and cookies for dessert.

What did we learn from them?

- That our oranges and mangoes just don't taste as good as those back home—off the tree in their back yard.
- Salad wasn't popular—they don't eat leaves.
- They are not used to a big dessert—perhaps that is why they have such beautiful teeth.
- Their favourite traditional meal is "journoux", a mixture of rice, beans, corn and squash.
- How important their grandmother is—she is the one who raised them. They can never go home. They hope to bring some family members to Canada if they can, but they regret they will never again see their grandmothers.
- They want to stay in Quebec even though Quebecers don't understand their mother tongue—Creole—and they have trouble with the French Canadian accent.

- 85% of the population of Haiti is illiterate, 100% speak Creole. Parisian French is only learned at school by the 15% who attend.
- They want to learn English to broaden their job opportunities.
- How lucky we are to be Canadians.

As political refugees many had bribed their way onto planes and boats to escape imprisonment and the danger of being killed. They arrived in Canada with nothing, including no identity papers. After a few weeks in refugee detention they had to find other individual accommodation. They are given a government welfare allowance while their case is reviewed. Our evenings provided them with a chance to meet friends as well as learn English.

Henry Aubin added, "The teaching experience brought home to me how ragged Quebec's system of orienting newcomers is. Many of the refugees did not know Montreal was on an island, where the rest of Canada was (they marveled at a map I brought in) or what this passion called hockey is. I think that in addition to the language training and socializing that the program offered, it also provided some badly needed orientation."

By the end of March we felt very connected. Sheila McDonough summed it up on the last evening by saying, "I just want to adopt them all and take them all home."

Student in Ministry — Philip Read

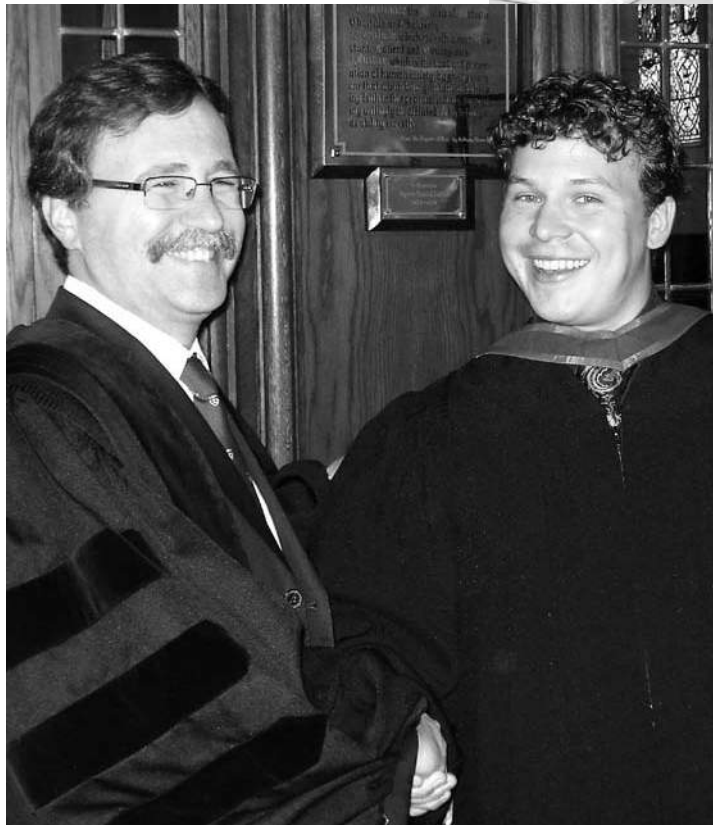

Report from Session: Discussion Helps to Make Decisions

Have you, as others in the congregation have, read “The Emerging Church, A Model for Change and a Map for Renewal” by Bruce Sanguin? For some, the take away message is not about following his ideas slavishly but to read the book and allow the ideas presented to form a basis for discussion in renewal at Mountainside United.

On January 29th at the meeting of Session, the members divided into three groups and devoted the time to imagine a Mountainside of the future. The discussions were interesting and revealed that the core values of the congregation would remain but aspects in areas of our present and future programmes, social and welcoming, inclusiveness, community connections, becoming technologically savy, all needed to be reviewed and examined.

As a follow up on April 23rd, having reviewed the data from January, the Session approved a small committee to meet and describe a job description for a position to be called “Congregational Coordinator”. Coordinator would be defined as a person who will coordinate Activities and Ministries within and beyond Mountainside through personal contact, the use of modern technology and other appropriate resources.

To broaden the discussion, take a few minutes to imagine one possibility. Fewer Committees and more Ministries where someone is willing to say:

I will offer my expertise/talents/skills/time to contribute to the work of the Church if I do not have to attend Committee meetings and I could do:

- a Ministry in phone calls to shut-ins
- a Ministry in cards, notes for follow up of Baptisms, Anniversaries
- a Ministry in kitchen inventory

Broaden the list from your imagination. Imagine a Mountainside in 2012.

The school's chamber orchestra accompanied the choirs of Churchlands High School and Mountainside Church in an anthem presentation of the Gloria from Schubert's *Mass in G Major*. The congregation was also treated to part of a Bruckner string quartet during the offertory and an Australian folk song at Coffee Hour.

The final concert of the Concerts Plus 2009 season took place on Sunday afternoon, April 26th. The chamber orchestra of FACE School joined the choir of Mountainside to present the *Mass in G Major* by Schubert and the *Pergolesi Magnificat*. Solo and orchestral repertoire completed the program. The concert was well received by our congregation and by families of the visiting FACE musicians. The Concerts Plus committee hopes that we can welcome this ensemble back to Mountainside again next year.
