Christmas Creche



It is the first Sunday in Advent and the sanctuary is beautifully decorated in anticipation of the Christmas Celebration of Music concert and the forthcoming Christmas season. The trees are lit, the wreaths hung and the crèche is set up on the table in the narthex. How many people know how the crèche came to be a part of the traditional decorations at Mountainside?

The year was 1983 and Alex Farquhar was minister of Dominion-Douglas Church. Dawn Hosein was serving on the Executive Committee at the time and when the idea of having a crèche was suggested, she promptly and enthusiastically volunteered the services of her husband Esau to construct one, which he did in his basement. (Esau also made the wooden cross which we hang in the sanctuary in Lent/Easter and the cross for the Children's Church). The lovely stable was in place-but it was empty.



Coincidentally, that same year marked the death of the mother of one of the most faithful, long-standing members of our congregation. Beatrice Mary Armstrong Tees, mother of Miriam and Fred Tees, died on July 2, 1983, in her 100th year. Beatrice was baptized at the Dominion Square Church and attended worship at Dominion-Douglas every Sunday until January 1983, when her health was in decline. She was active in all of the groups of the church and in particular the Women's Missionary Society.



As is the normal practice of the United Church the congregation stands for the vows, since they also sponsor the child and assume with the parents the responsibility for his Christian education and spiritual growth.

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Advent in Every Moment

The prophet, Isaiah, expresses the frustration that many of his fellow believers feel after years in exile. They are longing for God to reenter their lives in tangible, thisworldly ways. It's been a long time since God sent pillars of cloud by day and fire by night. It's been a long time since God rained manna from heaven or sent plagues upon Israel's enemies. It seems to these Judean refugees that God is no longer minding the store.

Isaiah refuses to pretend anymore. Too many years have come and gone without a sign of God's presence. In blunt and violent terms, the prophet begs God to come out of retirement, "Tear open the heavens and come down", shake up the landscape with forest fires – enough to boil water. Make the mountains quake. Isaiah seems to be saying, "Don't just stand there silently, God. Do something!"

Have you ever felt like Isaiah or the people of his day? Have you ever wondered where in heaven or on earth God is? And don't we sometimes think to ourselves, "With all the biblical proportions we read about at this time of the year, wouldn't it be nice if God just gave us a little Divine dazzle to push the scoffers back on their heels."

Have you ever felt like this? If so, you've entered Advent, when we, like Isaiah, cry out to God to "tear open the heavens and come down." We challenge God to come down, to enter the public squares of life, to embarrass our enemies, to shout into our existence with a cosmic bullhorn. We want a loud Advent, a visible Advent, a tangible Advent.

But then, we know better than

this. Isaiah also knows better.
After acting out, he laments. He laments that in their waiting, the people are emotionally withdrawn from God. They have lost their will to stay in touch with God. They fail to walk any more in God's way. And so Isaiah laments, "There is no one who calls on God's name anymore."

Isaiah 64: I-9

Unfortunately, we as a society always want someone or something to blame when things are not going right. We want to say that God has left us high and dry. But that is not the truth about God. We want to excuse our wandering away. But the problem isn't God wandering away. As Isaiah recognizes, reluctantly, it is not that God is absent; it is that we have tuned out or turned away from God's presence.

So in Advent, we as a society suddenly get religious again. We as a society also start paying attention to just how dark and dismal it is in November. We want God back in our lives right here, right now. We want the shining star and the glowing warmth. We want the glory back. Truth is, we have to readjust ourselves to where God is in the world.

God is always here. God is always the constant, creative, life-giving force.

The problem is not with God. It is with the darkness that we have turned towards. And so what happens? Our society over compensates. We want bright lights and flashy signs and

loud music. We want the wholemeal-deal to guide us as we grope in the darkness. And we can get more than a little indignant with God about how deep the darkness appears around us, especially in November! But we are the ones who are out of step. We are the ones who have turned to other things. Other interests. Other concerns.

Isaiah finally recognizes his or our place with God. There is still hope!

The faithful are the clay in the Divine potter's hands. We haven't hardened into brittle misshapen lumps. We are still a workable material. We can be turned toward the light. We can be fashioned into vessels of God's grace.



Stewardship

The theme of this year's campaign is "Do what needs to be done, give what needs to be given, 2010".

In past years we have asked you to be generous with your financial resources, and, of course, we again ask for your continued support, especially in light of our growing deficits, and to volunteer your time to serve on the various committees which form the governance of Mountainside.

This year, however, we are shifting our emphasis to more of an individual stewardship. By this I mean that all of us are stewards of the Spirit and thus we ask you to suggest to us where you feel the Spirit is urging you to do what needs to be done, and how it might lead to a ministry through our church.

I have watched with concern our dwindling attendance at Sunday services to the point where on most Sundays we would be hard pressed to fill the Chapel let alone the Sanctuary.

Why is this Happening?

Clearly we are not alone in this trend as it is being experienced by most mainline churches in Canada, but we can take no solace that we are not alone in this. We must ask why this is happening and what can we do about it.

The beginning of any rebirth in Spirit comes from individuals who have a passion and motivation to change the status quo and try new things.

Each of us must ask ourselves what we need to do differently to not only fill the pews on Sunday morning, but also to bring new life into Mountainside on a 24/7 basis.

I'm sure some of you are asking yourselves if this is possible?

Well I'll give you an example of the impossible becoming a reality.

There is a non-denominational congregation in Florida by the name of Calvary Chapel. If you look at them today, they are a 24/7 congregation providing everything from Bible studies to a skateboard facility for the youth, and they pack in a few thousand every Sunday.

This congregation is less than 20 years old. It all started with a minister from California who loaded up his family and took off to Florida. Their first services were held in a chapel in a funeral home, because the owner let them use if rent free. Over the years they have continued to grow and are an example of our Stewardship principle of "Do what needs to be done, give what needs to be given and check to see if it was

possible only after you have done it."

So it may be possible for us to accomplish what others have done but only if each of us is prepared to do it because to be successful we must believe that Stewardship is doing what needs to be done, giving what needs to be given and checking to see if it was possible only after you have done it.



THE EXECUTIVES OF SESSION

met for a planning meeting on Sunday October 25 from 1pm -5pm. We shared a light lunch before settling down to the business of the day.

As an opening exercise each executive was given an assigned role to imagine a scenario where they came to Mountainside for the very first time to a Sunday morning service. The roles covered ages from 15-75 years, and the individual reasons for coming were varied and specific to the individual. The ensuing interactions of the "new comers" within their group produced some interesting interpretations on the notions of "welcoming".

You may have noticed that the recent Order of Service has included a responsive printed version of The United Church Creed as well as the Lord's Prayer. Members new and old may find on reading these inclusions it is a renewal process of United Church beliefs and a way of welcoming strangers unfamiliar to the service.

The opening exercise was followed with a presentation by Rev. John based on the text of the Diana Butler Bass book, "Christianity for the Rest of Us", demonstrating the characteristics of a vital congregation which should include practice, wisdom and tradition.

Then it was time to test our creativity and imagination against the reality of the work of the Committees and planning for 2010. Some sobering issues emerged which need to be a concern to all the congregation.

Presently, resources at all levels are diminishing. Membership numbers are decreased, the availability of volunteers is diminishing and revenues are down.

Yet the spirit of optimism was high. The reason: ideas and suggestions were proposed as possible solutions and while such ideas may be at an early stage they are positive and point in the direction of moving forward. A good beginning for renewal.
