Advent/Christmas/Epiphany

The lectionary readings for this Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany focus on the prophesies of Isaiah and the nativity story in Matthew. "The nations shall go up to the mountain of the Lord... and hammer their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more." These prophesies and the process that leads to the birth of the Christ Child intensify and draw us in each Sunday. Six weeks later Matthew once again announces the gathering of the nations who bring gifts to the One who is the light of the world.

We begin the Christian year with the prophetic announcement of the global in-gathering that will be formed into a

multilingual gospel people by Pentecost. We begin in a world of ethnic hostility and culture wars, then as now. The plot of our story will be the gospel drama of the world's peoples learning war no more. It is the gospel in-breaking of the new human culture that Jesus both announces and embodies — the culture of the kingdom of God.

Living in the Christian year places us inside this drama in which all cultures learn the way of the odd culture that is God's kingdom come,

Outreach Springs from an Attitude of Gratitude

As Church historian Phyllis Tickle has pointed out in her book "The Great Emergence," about every five hundred years the Church has a giant rummage sale. The first was the fall of the Roman Empire and Gregory the Great's (510 C.E.) establishment of a new ecclesio-political coherence for Europe and the monastic tradition that carried the church intact through the Dark Ages.

The second giant rummage sale was the great schism that divided the church East from West in 1054 C.E.

The East had Constantinople, the Greek language, used leaven bread for mass and believed the Holy Spirit descended from God the Father. The West had Rome, Latin, used unleavened bread for the mass and argued that the Holy Spirit descends equally from God the Father and God the Son. Rome excommunicated Constantinople and Constantinople returned the favour. (There was a little more to it, but these were the core issues.)

The last one was five hundred years ago (1517 C. E.). In northern Europe, under the control of the Holy Roman Empire and the serfdom of the waning Medieval Age, Christians again searched the scriptures for signs and prophecies that expressed the new thing **God** was doing in their midst. The Protestant Reformation was established. Freedom from serfdom was achieved, as visions of the kingdom of **God** emerged in new Protestant churches and denominations.

Over the past seven years our Montreal Presbytery has approved the sale of seven church buildings, so one a year on average representing 14% of our inventory. Presbytery has three buildings being sold right now, with another one soon to be on the market. This means 20% of our buildings could soon be sold. So we are well into the latest giant church rummage sale. How we *reach out*, in this time of transition

will affect the next five hundred years of our religious tradition.

The new *outreach* must be **Spirit** led and **Spirit** fed. The new focus will be on *individual outreach*, *individual practice*, *and individual witness*. Yes, we continue to be called to do *outreach* together. There continues

to be strength in numbers and economies of scale, as our outreach events and activities highlighted in this issue reveal. Buildings remain important, offering space for wider community and youth activities. One of the secrets of *outreach* is a humble heart

connected to a good program as seen in our church activities. But society no longer comes to church, society no longer looks to the church, society no longer even cares about what the church is up to, so individually in our everyday lives is the new mission field, the new outreach opportunity to practice our faith, the new place to engage outreach. And this leads us to another secret of outreach. A good intention connected to a strong commitment generates a faithful future.

The Application for Outreach

When the **Spirit** is poured out anew, into receptive hearts, it leads to an **attitude of gratitude**. An **attitude of gratitude** must be shared person to person, every chance we have. Outreach for today is a humble heart connected to a good program, a good intention

connected to a strong commitment. It is an **attitude of gratitude** where sharing and caring make life changing connections through everyday living.

Outreach

Old Brewery Mission Visit



n a sunny autumn day in October, volunteers from Mountainside visited the Old Brewery Mission's Webster Pavilion to learn about what goes on there and to help serve a meal. We were given a tour of the second floor's three dormitories, which accommodate about 175 men. There has been a significant rise in demand for these beds over the past couple of years. Showers are mandatory. So far, our guide said with a smile, bed bugs have not appeared. Breakfast and supper are provided for all. Lunches are available for residents of rental rooms on the third and fourth floors. A special residential program on the fifth floor offers clients solutions to homelessness through dynamic transitional programs. A total of 400 men sleep at the Mission each night.

Donning our Mountainside aprons and plastic gloves provided, we soon got into the rhythm of setting tables, serving meals, and cleaning up. The meals were hot and included a vegetable ratatouille, big sausages and boiled potatoes. Decadent cheesecake was the dessert. After serving some 356 clients we sat down to enjoy the same supper. Our \$1050 and bags of clothing were gratefully received. This was an excellent opportunity for us to get directly involved within our Montreal community.



Stewardship Sunday

Did you hear the story about old Bill Jones? Poor man was recovering from a major heart attack.

One day the phone rang and his wife Edith answered. It was Reader's Digest announcing that Mr Jones just won the \$5 million jackpot prize. All those years of buying magazines paid off for Bill. The caller said that the check would be coming by registered mail the following week and that Mr Jones would have to sign for it.

Oh dear, Edith thought. Such good news may be a shock for my husband. It just might kill him. So she called Pastor Brown for advice. The good Pastor said he would be right over to break the news gently to Bill. Love and care for his flock was in the Pastors heart as he sped over to the Jones'.

Bill, Pastor Brown said, one of the people in the congregation has just won five million dollars, and has asked me to advise him on its use. I am gathering ideas. I would just like you to think for a moment—what would you do if you won five million dollars."

"That's easy," Bill said. First, I'd give half of it to the church."

Hearing this Pastor Brown clutched his chest, fell to the floor, and died.

Now I do not want to kill anyone this morning . . . but it is my job today to talk to you about money.

I realize I am preaching to the choir. You understand perfectly well that all we have and all that we are given comes from God.

Everyone here this morning has been a good and faithful servant of this church, community and to God. Whatever the need has been asked for in the past, you have helped. 

We're making some changes!!

While I was Chair of the Finance Committee I was always concerned that we did not have an approved budget for almost one-third of the year that it covered. This was the result of submitting the budget to the Annual Meeting which is normally held in mid- to late February. Added to that problem was the situation we faced this year where the Executive Committee was requested to revisit the budget. This led to the Faith Challenge and a final budget not being available until June.

In order to remedy this situation we are trying something different this year. We will have two Congregational meetings, the first of which will be held on November 21, 2010 and will have one item on the agenda, the discussion and approval of the budget for 2011. The remaining items, such as approval of

the year-end financial statements, approval of officers, Committee reports, etc., will take place in the second Congregational meeting to be held in early spring 2011.

Splitting the meeting in this fashion provides us with a number of advantages, including having an approved budget for a full year, allowing additional time for auditors to complete their year-end review, providing additional time for the Committees to complete their reports, and preparation and reproduction of the Annual Report.

Please help us in implementing these changes by attending church services on November 21 and participating in the Congregational meeting to follow.

Rev. Raymon T. Vicente 1912–1989 Ancestor and Friend

He is remembered quite vividly by some members of Mountainside United Church because of his friendly and outgoing personality, and not only by his children and grandchildren who have made the Montreal area their home. It is surprising to hear

that he stayed in Montreal only from 1976, when he was sponsored by Amor Casia as an immigrant to Canada, until his departure in 1979. It was then when he decided that his church in the Philippines needed him. That need was not just in his imagination. He wound up doing four Sunday services every week.

The Reverend Vicente was born in Puerto Princesa, Province of Palawan in 1912. He did his religious studies at the Union Theological Seminary of the Philippines. Early on it became evident that the churches he served with enthusiasm were too poor to support him and his growing family. As a result he studied life sciences sufficiently to work as an agronomist in the Bureau of Plant Industry. His work involved farm visits where he taught pest control and other agricultural skills. He served most of the churches gratis, including pastoral emergencies such as death and serious sicknesses. The churches in return shared their harvests with his family.

Angelita, one of his daughters, writes from Vancouver: "We lived a humble life. We were poor, and yet my parents felt rich with love and caring for others. I can still vividly remember when my mother would cook lots of food and share it with our even poorer friends and neighbors."

When Rev. Vicente retired as an agronomist, he and his wife, with some like minded others, started a program for unemployed youths, which offered free vocational courses. This program became integrated into the regular educational system after the government recognized its merits.

He was married to FORTUNATA, and they had six children, all born in the Philippines. Numbers in parenthesis indicate the number of grandchildren and an asterisk(*) the greater Montreal area as place of permanent home.

MINERVA (6)*; AMEURFINA (3)*; ANGELITA (2); ZENAIDA (2)*; RAMON, JR (4)*; RAMON III (deceased, 2).

Most of the persons marked "*" are members or adherents of Mountainside United. Here they form an informal but lively group, admired for its friendliness and musical talents. Indeed they have become essential to the survival of a Christian community whose roots go back into the first half of the 19th century.
