Sabbatical Leave

Just a note to remind most or inform some that I will be away on sabbatical from May 1st to September 1st. Vicki and I were granted a Montreal Presbytery-funded joint sabbatical for 2012. We chose to wait until after Easter and connect our time away with our summer vacation. So three months sabbatical and one month vacation covers May to September 1st.

Joyce Schaaf has graciously agreed to come out of retirement to cover our pastoral care needs for May through July, leading most of our Sunday services for that three-month period.

The travel component of our sabbatical involves a journey to some of the great cathedrals of nature, preserved in the national parks system in the United



States. We begin at Masa Verde, travel through Monument Valley en route to The South Rim of the Grand Canyon. Then on through Joshua Tree to Sequoia. From there we go to

Yosemite, and on to Yellowstone and the Grand Tetons. Back down to the plains we reach the Black Hills Mount Rushmore, Jewel Cave, and stop at the Bad Lands.

We hope not just to see these wonders but also connect and commune with these places and the living world within them. It is a Celtic thing we are trying to do, a peregrination (journey) to the heartbeat of God on our own continent. There will be time for rest and reflection, and writing.

By September we trust that our batteries will be recharged, inspiration will be flowing, and clarity of vision for future years of service to our churches.

Did I mention that a first grand child is due to arrive two-thirds of the way through our sabbatical, cutting out our Eastern swing through Cape Breton and Newfoundland? All the more to celebrate and reflect upon.

Soon the parking lot was paved, a bright nightlight installed, a wheel chair-accessible washroom created. Then there was the lift built into the cloak room that took some getting used to and even longer to get the timing mechanisms adjusted for the great height and duration of operation involved. It's fine now, but we are all still a little leery of it.

Some time later we entered amalgamation talks with Erskine & American United Church. We celebrated our Jeremiah moment as we placed our membership rolls and amalgamation documents into a ceramic jar. "Churches and faith communities will continue to thrive in Montreal." Our first post-amalgamation project was to refurbish the main kitchen. When we hosted a weekend Jean Vanier event, the name St. Andrew's-Dominion-Douglas, Erskine & American United Church seemed a little too long. So we


Baptism of Dario James Lorenzetti

TUESDAY STUDY GROUP



In the fall of 2003, five Mountainside women formed a group with the

intention of reading and discussing the Bible. We met over muffins and coffee in each others' houses, and each bought the scholarly Harper-Collins Study Bible, chose certain sections to study, and off we went. Each week we assigned the book and chapter or chapters to be read, and at 9:30 on Tuesday mornings we got together and discussed what we had been reading, and what it meant to us. We thought we would read some of the lesser known sections of the Bible, and we did read all the minor prophets, and some of the epistles among other sections. We used whatever commentaries we could find. Sometimes we assigned one person to introduce the reading, but often we just struggled on our own.

In time, we decided to branch out

to read other books with a bearing on our church life. We have read many of Karen Armstrong's books, and a number of the works of Marcus Borg, John Crossen, and other modern thinkers. We even tried to digest Bonhoffer, but this was perhaps beyond us. Some books we loved, others we detested, but we usually found that the ones we disliked engendered the most discussion. All in all it has

been an enlightening experience.


In addition to our reading, we discuss Mountainside and its joys and needs, and all of us have been very active, not only as Sunday worshippers but as choir members, Board members, chairs of committees, cooks, shoppers, tidiers, etc., etc. Most importantly, we have become very close friends, and feel that this small group has given us enormous interest and support.

We have decided to include this article to encourage other people to form small house groups to study and read the Bible and other books. Eight people is as large a group as fits comfortably into most living rooms, and we have been reluctant to add to this group, but we are sure that this is a good thing for church women to do, and think you might like to try it. Any of us would be happy to talk to you about it.



A COLLECTING CHURCH

A big thank you to Dorothy Sutherland for her years of participation in the UCW (celebrating its 50th anniversary in 2012) and being Quebec coordinator for the collection of Campbell's soup can labels. At age 90, she is now stepping down from these responsibilities.

A new coordinator has been found, Joyce Patenaude of Huntington. So please continue to bring in your labels – including the bar code as well as the name and picture of the product. Nancy Walkling will continue to take the labels to Pathways, in Sarnia, Ontario. This Rotary-sponsored organization offers many services to children in the area. Our labels help provide materials for their Early Childhood Education program. They are grateful and amazed at how many Quebecers collect Campbell's soup labels to help them out.

What else do we collect?!

On the counter in the little kitchen by the Roslyn Street entrance to Mountainside, there are containers for many items that we collect to benefit others. Besides the soup labels, there is space for...

Used eye glasses which Operation Eyesight can pass on to people needing them. Ester Vicente is our contact person.

Aluminum tabs from the tops of pop cans are taken to the Grey Nuns by Kiki and Jim Tremain. Sister Regine loves to tell of the many wheelchairs which have been purchased for overseas, all from the collection of these little tabs.

Used postage stamps are trimmed by the ladies' group and sent to the Bible Society which sells them to buy Bibles.

Plastic bread tags: we have lost track of who our contact is and where these go. Do you know? Please phone the church office to tell us!

Good used clothing is collected, sorted and sent to various organizations to be used by those who need it. Grace Hodgson organizes this. We only have room to accommodate clothing appropriate for the upcoming season. Ask around if you don't know where the little collection cupboard is located.

Non-perishable food is collected in the grocery cart outside of the chapel, by the stairs on the Lansdowne side of the church. John Fraser takes it to Saint Columba House in Pointe-St-Charles when we have enough for a delivery.

In April you will be hearing from Outreach about the Summer Camp Appeal. Thanks for your generosity.



became Mountainside United. Great choice, although St. John's on the Hill spoke to me as well.

We still had the manse next door back then. However, it made more sense to sell it and add the proceeds to the endowment fund. Ten years ago the fund was under \$1,000,000 but earning 11%. With the proceeds of the sale of the manse and our portion of the money from the sale of the Erskine & American Church building, the fund now is over \$2,000,000 in spite of the recent collapse of stock prices and negative returns on the market.

Three of the four large stained glass windows in the sanctuary were removed, refurbished, re-installed and re-glazed. The Resurrection Window was finished just in time for another Easter celebration.

Major repairs — most notably to our aging steam heating system — have been ongoing, and the moisture mystery in the sanctuary finally solved. Our latest repairs promise to reduce our heating bill.

TM2 (Teen Rock Band) began around seven years ago and now is in its third iteration. We continue to enjoy their gift of music in our worship and at special events.

Over the years there have been staff retirements. Joyce Schaaf and Joseph Francis each retired after decades of service in our church.

A new adventure began in the summer as we agreed to rent part of our church to another Christian congregation, Montreal Korean Methodist Church. We enjoy the added life and worship they bring.

You know, there is something coming up soon. Although our founding congregations reach back in some cases nearly 200 years, we are approaching one hundred years in this location. 2014 will be our one-hundredth year of worship and service in Westmount. With all the developments of the last ten years I'm sure we will find a way to celebrate and make plans for the next one hundred years.


