All youth must be enrolled in a 4-H project in Franklin County during the current year to be eligible to compete for various county awards. Each project or contest has its own guidelines. Consult the 4-H index to find project, contest and demonstration information. Please follow the instructions for entry and checkout. Late projects cannot be accepted due to the judging schedule. However, late projects may be exhibited in Junior Open Class.

4-H members must turn 9 years old within the calendar year.

Traditional Project:

Follow Member Manual and complete the 4-H Project Record Sheet and all project requirements.

*A list of most project requirements is available at the Extension office.

Self-Directed Project Guidelines:

- 1. The leader and/or 4-H member decide as a group what subject or skill to teach or learn and decide on a project outline for reaching specific goals during the club lessons.
- 2. The leader completes a "Leader Contract" listing the project outline and lesson goals.
- 3. The leader sets self-directed requirements & decides what to make or do for a fair or another type of public exhibit.
- 4. Self-directed project exhibit requirements must meet or match the pre-set 4-H contest or show requirements and/or rules to enter. For example, the Market Animal Show has weigh-in days and weight requirements to participate in the Market Animal Show.
- 5. Use 4-H Project Record Sheet.

***********Horse Rules*******

- 1. County Fair Horse Show entry forms and record books must be turned in to the Extension office by **Monday, August 8, 2016, by 5:00 p.m.** Late show entries will be charged a \$10.00 late fee.
- 2. Class Division for Franklin County Fair will be:

Junior A 8-9 years old (8 years old as of December 31, 2015).

Junior B 10-11 years old as of January 1, 2016. Intermediate 12-14 years old as of January 1, 2016. Senior 15-19 years old as of January 1, 2016.

- 3. 4-H exhibitors and parents will act as ladies and gentlemen at all times. **Politeness is mandatory.** Exhibitor will keep his/her horse under control at all times. **NO exceptions.**
- 4. To be eligible for either 4-H Horse Show or Sho-Deo, member must have entered their record book. To be eligible to participate in the Sho-Deo, member must show in at least one (1) class in the Horse Show or Working Ranch Horse Show.
- 5. 4-H members may use more than one horse as long as a supplement form is completed for each additional horse the 4-H member is using.
- 6. No stallions over 12 months of age may be shown.
- 7. Pony class will be horses under fourteen (14) hands (56 inches).
- 8. Multiple rings shall be used as needed. Classes may not be held in order, so exhibitors must be ready and on call for each class.
- 9. Plain long-sleeved white shirt with collar, blue jeans, western hat and western boots with heel will be the <u>only acceptable attire</u>. A 4-H patch needs to be placed on the left shirt sleeve. Patches are available for purchase at the Extension office. "Participants in 4-H equestrian must wear an ASTM-SEI approved helmet whenever mounted on an equine or are in a vehicle (cart, wagon, buggy, etc.) being pulled by an equine." There will be no exceptions to the helmet rule. If a youth chooses not to wear a helmet-they will be immediately dismissed from the event or program.
- 10. Spurs are permissible, but rowels must be dull and free moving. Spurs are allowed in all classes except halter showmanship. **No** tiedowns, side-pulls, quirts or bats are allowed. Horses cannot be

- shown in any performance class with a snaffle or hackamore, except in the snaffle or hackamore classes.
- 11. There will be no chains used over the horses nose, only under the chin in Halter Showmanship classes.
- 12. The judge's decision is final in all class placings.
- 13. If a horse is a known kicker, it must wear a yellow ribbon on the tail head at all 4-H events.
- 14. Horses will be ridden with grazing, snaffle, curb, half breed, bar, spade bit, or hackamore. Either leather curb straps or curb chains are allowed in all classes, as long as either type of curb is flat, at least 1/2 inch in width and fits flatly against the horses jaw. No bridles with a nose band may be used. Hackamore bits are not permitted in performance classes.
- 15. Snaffle bit or hackamore class will be for horses 4 years old or under, and in the 1st or 2nd year of training. They are not eligible to enter other riding/performance classes. Horses are not to have been ridden or shown in a bit, other than a snaffle bit or hackamore. Horses must be ridden with two hands on reins. Bridles with loose ring, D ring, or egg butt snaffle or hackamore conforming to Rule 11 are the only ones permitted to be used in the class. A hackamore must have a rawhide braid or leather braid, or rope bosal. Snaffle bits must not have shanks.
- 16. Use of behavior modifying drugs is prohibited. A veterinarian may be on the grounds investigating alleged violations. Suspicion of drug use will be investigated by the show committee. A test may be required and the exhibitor disqualified.
- 17. 4-H projects will be judged on the Danish system. Ribbons will be given for all classes. Payment will be made for one class in showmanship and one class in performance at the County Fair 4-H Horse Show.
- 18. Exhibitors wishing to exercise their horse may ride in the warm-up arena. No horse shall be ridden in the parking area or by the livestock sheds. Exhibitors not complying with this rule may be dismissed from further competition by the show committee.
- 19. Eastern Idaho State Fair participants: Showmanship classes, Junior, Intermediate and Senior, will be limited to one entry from each county Horse Show. Contestants in all classes will be county blue ribbon winners. Each county will be allowed to send two (2) entries in each performance class. In addition, one entry will be

allowed for each ten (10) contestants participating in the class at the county horse show. (1 to 10=2, 11 to 20=3, 21 to 30=4).

20. Good sportsmanship shall prevail at all times. Unnecessary roughness, abuse of horse, or animals that pose a danger to others may result in dismissal of the 4-H exhibitor from further competition. The judge may advise ring steward to dismiss violators.

********Market Animal Rules********
Franklin County 4-H & FFA Market Animal Sale

The annual 4-H/FFA Market Animal Sale will be held on Friday, August 19th, in the livestock auction arena at the Franklin County Fairgrounds at 4:30 p.m.

- 1. To be eligible to sell an animal at the Market Animal Sale, members of 4-H clubs and FFA Chapters of Franklin County MUST reside in Franklin County for 6 months prior to the fair. The market animal must also be housed in Franklin County after the beginning weigh-in.
- 2. There is to be **NO DRUG USE** in Market animals; this includes tranquilizers. If antibiotics are needed, they should be used according to label directions. Any antibiotic use must be recorded in the 4-H record book. Growth implants for beef cannot be implanted after weigh-in.

Animals may be inspected for drugs. Exhibitors are responsible for ensuring that all drugs administered to any market animal meet the withdrawal period prior to sale day. Sale animals and carcasses found to have recent injection sites and/or to have violated medical withdrawal times will be investigated, and if condemned, will result in forfeiture of sale check by seller. All market animals sold will remain the responsibility of the seller until passed by the USDA inspector for edible consumption.

Steer - grade Select or better

Swine - U.S. No. 1 or 2

Lamb - Grade Choice minus or better.

Lambs must follow national scrapies laws.

Care of all livestock animals will be consistent with production practices and accepted standards. Exhibitors must observe withdrawal periods and be aware of penalties associated with offlabel use of all drugs.

- 3. Each 4-H/FFA member whose animal does not make weight is encouraged to show their animal in the fitting and showing class and turn in a completed record book. This will complete their project and make members eligible for boost money.
- 4. Each 4-H/FFA member who wishes to participate in the Market Animal Sale is required to show his/her animal in the Fitting and Showing Class and Quality Class and be present to sell his/her animal at the Market Animal Sale

In the event an animal dies, the member should contact the Extension office to determine what is required to finish the project.

- 5. 4-H/FFA members must wear a plain white button-up shirt with a collar and a 4-H patch on the left shoulder or an FFA jacket and nice jeans or slacks at the shows and sale. Patches will be available for purchase at weigh-ins and at the Extension office. No shorts or tank tops will be allowed.
- 6. Record Books: 4-H members are required to submit their record book to the species superintendent on Wednesday at the final weigh-in. After review, the record books will be returned to youth. Record books must be completed and returned to the Extension office by the following Friday. No sale money will be awarded unless they are turned in.
- 7. A member may only sell one market animal, whether steer, swine, lamb or bucket calf at the Franklin County fair. Members need to declare what animal they are selling 2 hours after the last

quality class of the day. The grand and reserve champions are required to sell and will be sold first. In the event a member wins grand or reserve champion in multiple species, that member must select which animal to sell. Their other champion animal will be recognized during the sale, but will not be allowed to sell

- 8. 4-H members ages 8 to 18 years (as of Jan. 1st) may show/sell an animal. Individuals older than 18 years of age who have special needs are also eligible to show/sell an animal provided they are still enrolled in high school.
- 9. Each 4-H/FFA member is required to have a brand inspection slip or bill of sale for each beef animal at the final weigh-in. The Extension office will hold the brand inspections until the Market Animal Sale or termination of the project.
- 10. All steers must be secured with substantial halter and ropes in assigned stalls. No pens will be available for steers. Other market animals will be assigned pens by club and chapter at the fair. Clubs and chapters are encouraged to decorate their area.
- 11. Exhibitors are to furnish their own feed. All animals must be clean and well groomed. Members and their parents are responsible for cleaning in and around the stall area, as well as exhibiting and caring for their animals until they are removed from the fairgrounds on Saturday. Stalls must be kept clean and livestock must have sufficient food and water provided at all times. Violation of this rule will result in a \$30.00 fine for each occurrence.

12. No one will be allowed into the stall area to clean until all animals have been removed from the fair grounds; no earlier than 5:00 p.m. NO EXCEPTIONS!

- 13. Leaders responsibilities:
 - a) Assist with club and fair activities.
 - b) Assure that record books are completed and returned to Extension office by the Friday following the sale.
 - c) Make sure club members have cleaned stalls/pen after animals are removed from fairgrounds.
 - d) Make sure thank you notes to buyers are written and taken to the Extension office with postage for verification. The thank you notes will be sent from the Extension office.
- 14. **Enrollment and Beginning Weigh-In:** Yearly 4-H enrollment fees will be paid by members prior to, or at entry weigh-ins. There will be a \$7.00 fee, per animal, charged at each species beginning weigh-in. There will be an additional fee for record books and

manuals. Leader and member enrollments are due as soon as possible but no later than <u>JULY 1</u> of the current year. Unless the Extension office has your enrollments, you are not considered a 4-H club or member and are not covered by 4-H for liability purposes. 4-H members are required to attend a minimum of 6 hours of club instruction.

Steers must be born after January 1 of the preceding year. No older animal can be entered.

For safety reasons, it is strongly recommended that all steers be halter broken at the beginning weigh-in.

Only one spare animal per individual can be weighed in. Spare animals may be used by immediate family members only.

Suggested weight at beginning weigh-in:

Steer - 675 lb. to 850 lbs. (maximum weight 1000 lbs.)

Swine - 60 lbs. to 80 lbs. Lamb - 80 lbs. to 90 lbs.

Standard Feed Periods:

Steer - 159 days Swine - 117 days Lamb - 68 days

Each member must indicate which animal is his/hers at weigh-in. All animals must be tattooed and ear tagged at entry weigh-in.

15. FINAL WEIGH-IN

Weight eligibility will be established at final weigh-in on Wednesday of the fair. Lambs must be slick sheared, dry and unblanketed at weigh-in. Pigs, steers and bucket calves must also be clean. Reweighs must be done immediately—before being taking back to the pen. Tattoos may be checked with a light on the evening of weigh-in by the livestock committee.

The Market Animal Committee reserves the right to limit number of animals in the sale. White ribbon animals will not sell.

WEIGHT LIMITS:

Steer - minimum weight of 1070 lbs.
maximum weight of 1300 lbs. is recommended

Swine - minimum weight of 220 lbs.
maximum weight of 285 lbs. is recommended

Lamb - min. weight of 107 lbs.

maximum weight of 140 lbs. is recommended

16. Floor price for each division will be established before the sale according to bids received by the Market Animal Committee. A commission fee of \$18.00 will be deducted from the sale price of each animal to enable the Market Animal Committee to pay for sale expenses. Also, those members who receive boosts will have a 3% fee assessed on the total boosts to help offset expenses. A brand inspection fee will be deducted from beef checks.

- 17. Livestock checks not cashed after 90 days from issue will be voided.
- 18. All entries are accepted with the understanding that neither the fair board nor the livestock committee shall be held responsible for any damage or loss that may occur to personal property or livestock on exhibit or for sale. Checks will be distributed at the Awards open house in September.

Any deviation from the rules will be referred to the Livestock Superintendent and committee.
