Here is an episode in the ministry of Jesus which will not fail to shock us. His mother and his cousins come to Capernaum in order to take charge of him, convinced he was out of his mind'. Is his family blind at this point? Does it realize that it is standing in the way of the Messiah and is trying to stop him from accomplishing his mission? To understand, one must realize that the first thirty years of Jesus were passed among the common places of an ordinary life. How could they suddenly accept the fact that the one they had known at close quarters was now going round the country making exorbitant claims for himself and correcting the law and various venerable institutions? In truth, this zeal for his Father's house had nothing reasonable about it, and it was understandable that his family should feel worried. He was to disconcert his neighbors and friends more and more. In the end it would be the supreme folly, that of the cross, into which he would draw them all.

Mary and some close companions will be at Calvary: they would have needed time to accept what was happening, and even more time to understand. The scribes cannot be excused so easily: their peremptory judgment is grave and disquieting. There is no doubt in Mark's mind: he sees it as blasphemy against the Holy Spirit, the gravity of which derives from the fact that in this case it is not lust an error with regard to the person and quality of Jesus, but a positive and deliberate refusal of grace and revelation. To call the Son of God Satan is to exclude oneself from salvation. Today the dilemma is posed again: for or against Christ? One needs to be a little mad to follow him, not too reasonable if one wishes to be counted among his true kith sod kin: such a relationship finds family and home in him.







OUR HOLY FATHER POPE FRANCIS PENS PREFACE TO BOOK ON HOPE IN THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Pope Francis writes the preface to a new book entitled "Communion and Hope", and encourages everyone to rediscover solidarity amid the ravages of the coronavirus pandemic.

In a book preface released on Tuesday, Pope Francis reflected on the lessons Christians have learned from the Covid-19 pandemic.

"Communion and Hope" was prepared by Cardinal Walter Kasper and Father George Augustin, and contains theological reflections from various authors about "witnessing the faith in times of coronavirus".

"Like a sudden breaking storm, the coronavirus crisis has caught us all by surprise, abruptly changing on a global level our personal, public, family and working lives," he wrote.

Many people, he lamented, have lost loved ones, as well as their jobs and financial stability. In many places, even Easter was celebrated in an unusual and solitary manner, and people were left unable to find solace in the Sacraments.

Finding roots of happiness

"This dramatic situation," wrote Pope Francis, "highlights the vulnerable nature of our human condition, limited as it is by time and contingency."

The pandemic has also forced us to question the roots of our happiness and to rediscover the treasure of our Christian faith, he added.


"It reminds us that we have forgotten or simply delayed attending to some of the key issues in life. It is making us evaluate what is really important and necessary, and what is of secondary or only superficial importance."

Solidarity in times of trial

The Pope called this "a time of trial" which gives us the chance to reorient our lives toward God.

"The crisis," he said, "has shown us that, especially in times of need, we depend on our solidarity with others. In a new way, it is inviting us to place our lives at the service of others. It should make us aware of global injustice and wake us up to the cry of the poor and of our gravely diseased planet."

Easter victory over death



Pope Francis went on to reflect on the meaning of the unique Easter that many Christians were forced to celebrate alone.

The Easter message of Christ's victory over death, he said, showed Christians that we cannot remain paralyzed in the face of the pandemic.

"Easter brings us hope, trust and encouragement. It strengthens our sense of solidarity," said the Pope. "It speaks to us of overcoming past rivalries so that we may see each other, above and beyond any differences, as members of one large family, where we bear each others' burdens."

Contagion of love

The risk of contagion from a virus, added the Pope, should teach us how the "contagion" of love passes from one heart to another.

"I am grateful," he said, "for the spontaneous acts of altruism and heroic dedication shown by carers, by doctors and priests. In these past weeks we have felt the strength which comes from faith."

Eucharistic fasting

Pope Francis said the initial phase of the pandemic forced governments to ban public Masses, leaving many Catholics to undergo a "time of painful Eucharistic fast."

"Many found the presence of the Lord wherever two or three gathered in His name."

He said livestreamed Masses were an "emergency measure" for which many were grateful. "But virtual transmission is no substitute for the living presence of the Lord in the celebration of the Eucharist."

The Pope expressed his gratitude that Catholics in many parts of the world can return to a normal liturgical life.

"The presence of the Risen Lord in His Word and through the celebration of the Eucharist will give us the strength we need to resolve the difficulties and challenges that we will face after the coronavirus crisis."

Renewed hope and solidarity

Pope Francis concluded the preface expressing his hopes that the book will help people discover "a new sense of hope and solidarity."

"Just like the disciples on the road to Emmaus, the Lord will also accompany us in future through His word and through the breaking of bread in the Eucharist. And He will say to us: "Do not be afraid! For I have overcome death.""

About the book

"Communion and Hope" was published by the Vatican Publishing House (LEV) in the original German in June. The Italian version was released last week.

Cardinal Walter Kasper is the president emeritus of the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity.

In 2005, Fr Augustin founded the Walter Kasper Institute, which is part of the Philosophical-Theological University of the Pallottines at Vallendar. He also serves as a consultant for the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity, as well as the Congregation for the Clergy.

CATHEDRAL REOPENS IN SYRIA: 'A SIGN OF HOPE AND REBIRTH'

A Catholic cathedral in Syria, repeatedly struck and gravely damaged during the country's almost nine-year war, reopened this week, following its restoration.

The Maronite Cathedral of St. Elijah in the northern city of Aleppo was bombarded with missiles on at least three occasions between 2012 and 2016 and suffered extensive damage when jihadists entered the city's Christian quarter in 2013.

The restoration was financed largely by the pontifical foundation Aid to the Church in Need (ACN).

Maronite Archbishop, Joseph Tobij of Aleppo told Vatican News the restoration and re-opening of the cathedral have both a symbolic and practical meaning.

"It's a sign of hope and rebirth, not only in a material sense but for the entire community, despite the fact that the numbers of Christians continue to dwindle, due to extreme poverty linked to the sanctions imposed on the defenseless population," he said.

The reopening on 20 July of the 19th-century Cathedral celebrates a new lease on life for the Christians of Aleppo as the building had been devastated in 2013 by a group of jihadists Archbishop Tobij said there have been no liturgies or other whose aim was to destroy all signs of Christianity in the celebrations in the cathedral for eight years. 

Impact of sanctions

However, he said, the people are now subject to violence that is worse than the bombs: the economic sanctions and their direct consequence on poverty.

He is referring to the recent "Ceasar Act" economic sanctions imposed by the US that aim to deter foreign business activity with President al-Assad's government.

He said people today find themselves not being able to afford even the basics, including medicines. "This gives people a sense of sadness and darkness for the future. We do not know what will happen to our future, and so many are aiming for the Western dream — to escape from here and hunger."

Archbishop Tobij concluded with an appeal for prayers for the people of Syria "because prayer does a lot, it goes beyond the human and there is the Lord who acts."

WHAT IS THE **SIGNIFICANCE OF** THE **TRANSFIGURATION OF JESUS CHRIST?**



"After six days Jesus took Peter, James, and John with him and led them up a high mountain, where they were all alone. There He was transfigured before them. His clothes became dazzling white, whiter than anyone in the world could bleach them. And there appeared before them Elijah and Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Peter said to Jesus, 'Rabbi, it is good for us to be here. Let us put up three shelters - one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' (He did not know what to say, they were so frightened.) Then a cloud appeared and enveloped them, and a voice came from the cloud: 'This is my Son, whom I love. Listen to him!' Suddenly, when they looked around, they no longer saw anyone with them except Jesus. As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus gave them orders not to tell anyone what they had seen until the Son of Man had risen from the dead" (Mark 9:2-9).

The account of the transfiguration of Jesus Christ as recorded here in Mark (parallel passages are found in Matthew 17:1-3 and Luke 9:28-36) is a demonstration to three witnesses that Jesus Christ was who He claimed to be. In all three accounts of the transfiguration of Jesus Christ, we are given the names of the three disciples who accompanied Jesus and who stood as human witnesses to the glory that was Christ's. There were also three heavenly witnesses, Moses, Elijah, and the voice of God from heaven. Therefore, the Old Testament law of three witnesses required to attest to any fact (Deuteronomy 19:15) was satisfied both in earth and in heaven.

The word "transfigured" is a very interesting word. The Greek word is "metamorpho" and it means to transform, literally or figuratively to metamorphose, or to change. The word is a verb that means to change into another form. It also means to change the outside to match the inside. The prefix "meta" means to change and the "morphe" means form. In the case of the transfiguration of Jesus Christ it means to match the outside with the reality of the inside. To change the outward so that it matches the inward reality. Jesus' divine nature was "veiled" (Hebrews 10:20) in human form and the transfiguration was a glimpse of that glory. Therefore, the transfiguration of Jesus Christ displayed the Shekinah glory of God incarnate in the Son. The voice of God attesting to the truth of Jesus' Sonship was the second time God's voice was heard. The first time was at Jesus' baptism into His public ministry by John the Baptist (Matthew 3:7; Mark 1:11; Luke 3:22).

Therefore, the transfiguration of Jesus Christ was a unique display of His divine character and a glimpse of the glory, which Jesus had before He came to earth in human form. This truth is emphasized for us in a passage in the Apostle Paul's letter to Phillippi. "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus: Who, being in the form (morphe) of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God: But made Himself of no reputation, and took upon Him the form (morphe) of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men: And being found in fashion as a man, He humbled Himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross. Wherefore God also hath highly exalted Him, and given Him a name which is above every name: That at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth; And that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2:5-11)

The Son of God came to earth in the form of a man to be the true servant of God and to gift mankind with the greatest gift ever given, eternal life. The transfiguration of Jesus Christ was a visible sign in the presence of reliable witnesses of the reality of the power of God and the glory, which is Christ Jesus.

ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY (AUGUST 15)

The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary into Heaven at the end of her earthly life is a defined dogma of the Catholic Church. The Feast of the Assumption, celebrated every year on August 15, is a very old feast of the Church, celebrated universally by the sixth century. It commemorates the death of Mary and her bodily assumption into Heaven, before her body could begin to decay--a foretaste of our own bodily resurrection at the end of time. Because it signifies the Blessed Virgin's passing into eternal life, it is the most important of all Marian was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory." As a dogma, the feasts and a holy day of obligation.

The feast was originally celebrated in the East, where it is known as the Feast of the Dormition, a word which means "the falling asleep." The earliest printed reference to the belief that Mary's body was assumed into Heaven dates from the fourth century, in a document entitled "The Falling Asleep of the Holy Mother of God."

The document recounts, in the words of the Apostle John, whom Christ on the Cross had entrusted the care of His mother the death, laying in the tomb, and assumption of the Blesse Virgin. Tradition places Mary's death at Jerusalem or at Ephesu where John was living.

On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII, exercising papa infallibility, declared in "Munificentissimus Deus" that it is dogma of the Church "that the Immaculate Mother of God, t ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly lif Assumption is a required belief of all Catholics; anyone wh publicly dissents from the dogma, Pope Pius declared, "has falle away completely from the divine and Catholic Faith While the Eastern Orthodox believe in the Dormition, they obje to the papal definition of the dogma, seeing it as unnecessar since belief in Mary's bodily assumption, tradition holds, go back to apostolic times.





POPE FRANCIS GIVES 7 DATING TIPS FOR SINGLE CATHOLICS

One area everyone seems to have advice to offer in is dating. You've gotten dating advice from your single friends, from your married friends, and even from your mom. But have you ever gotten dating advice from the Vicar of Christ, His Holiness, The Pope?

In a general audience, Pope Francis gave a catechesis on dating and engagement that all single Catholics need to hear.

Here are some of the tips he gave:

- 1. "The freedom of giving oneself to another is a decision that requires a conscious harmony. It's not about a simple mutual attraction, an emotion, a moment or a phase. It's a journey."
- 2. "[Dating and engagement] are the time when the two are called to perform a real labour of love, an involved and shared work that delves deep. Here they discover one another little by little, i.e. the man "learns" about woman by learning about this woman, and the woman "learns" about man by learning about this man."
- 3. "The covenant of love between man and woman a covenant for life cannot be improvised. It isn't made up one day to the next. There is no marriage express: one needs to work on love, one needs to walk."


