Italian Market's Bid for a BID Rejected

he proposal for a South 9th Street Business Improvement District (BID) was rejected during the 45 day objection period following a September public hearing on the plan in front of City Council's Rules Committee. Almost 34% of the business owners in the proposed BID filed formal objection letters with Council's Chief Clerk. That percentage exceeded the one third threshold required to squash the proposal. As a result, legislation to officially establish the BID was not brought before City Council.

The BID would have encompassed a rectangular area along South 8th, 9th, and 10th Streets from Federal to Fitzwater Streets. The BID, a legally designated area where property owners jointly plan, fund, and manage commercial district enhancement services, would have funded street- and sidewalk-cleaning crews, parking directional signage, a parking validation pilot program, marketing, and additional lighting and security

ers started discussing the creation of a BID over five years ago and spent the last two and half years trying to make it a reality. The South 9th Street Business Association received a grant from the city's Commerce Department to conduct a BID study in 2014. Since then, the association worked with two consultants on the BID process and held a series of public meetings to discuss the plans. The BID process included outreach to property owners to determine the area's needs and what services would be most beneficial.

Opponents to the BID did not think the services would be worth the money they would be required to pay. The BID's proposed first year operating budget was just over \$300,000 with the majority of the funding coming from an assessment levied on commercial property owners inside the BID service area. Curb stands would have paid \$200 per year and commercial property owners would have paid a sum based on the portion of the value they hold

compared to the total value of the district. For the first two years of the proposed plan, this amount would have been capped at \$200 per \$100,000 of assessed property value. The median amount property owners (excluding curb stands) would have paid was \$601 per year.

For BID supporters, there is still hope. Michele Gambino, the association's business manager who led the efforts to create the BID said, "We are planning to resubmit a new plan based on the locations of the objectors and updated plan feedback." The Magic in Bella Vista

philadelphia's Magic Gardens, a visionary art environment and gallery, is the work of renowned mosaic muralist Isaiah Zagar. It serves the community as a center for art exploration. Filling half a city block, this colorful, quirky landmark is as integral to South Street as the artist is to the history of the neighborhood.

Isaiah Zagar began creating this installation in 1994 as an outgrowth from his studio. Adjacent to his property were two abandoned lots owned by a Boston investor. Zagar fought the blight in his way, expanding his art and planting tomatoes. In 2002, the Boston investor took legal action to remove the artwork. Well . . . South Philly wasn't having that! The community raised \$300k to save it from demolition, and established a non-profit to protect the work.

This brand of audacious community activism was honed by Isaiah and his wife, Julia decades earlier. In the late 1960s they

joined other artists and grassroots entrepreneurs in restoring South Street storefronts to reinvigorate the downtrodden business district. Isaiah's mosaics began appearing on storefronts, including Julia's Eye's Gallery at 4th & South. Contemporary with this urban counter-culture DIY movement was the era of government urban renewal and expansion of the federal highway system.

Imagine for a moment: Interstate 676 cutting through this neighborhood from Route 76 to New Jersey; interchanges funneling traffic into the city grid of narrow one-way streets; South Street gone - no shops, groceries, restaurants, or entertainment a short walk away.

The Zagars led the fight to defeat a proposal to use the alignment of South Street for the highway, preventing destruction of the historic shopping district.

With South Street saved, Isaiah continued to create mosaics in the neighborhood – and beyond. He has been commissioned across the nation and internationally.

His work continues to this day.

PMG isn't the only visionary art environment, though it is uniquely located in an urban setting; most are in rural areas. Furthermore, proliferation of the artist's work throughout the surrounding community makes it a

standout, and reflects a characterdefining chapter in the neighborhood's history. PMG staff and volunteers are documenting these mosaics. If you have one on your property, you are urged contact them. Also, if you want to know

Welcome Back, Eddie Lang!

ddie Lang, the father of jazz guitar, has been honored with a 50 foot mural in Bella Vista at 7th and Fitzwater. Born Salvatore Massaro, Eddie Lang grew up at 7th and St. Albans and was a guitar virtuoso during the 1920s Jazz Age. Before his life was tragically cut short at 31, he was a prolific session guitarist cutting hundreds of recording with jazz greats including Bessie Smith and Bing Crosby. He also grew up playing with Joe Venuti, another South Philadelphian native and the father of jazz violin.

Richard Barnes led the effort to make the mural a reality. Barnes, a longtime Lang admirer, has been playing his music for 24 years. In 2010, he founded the first Eddie Lang Day, which is celebrated every October around Eddie Lang's birthday. Barnes approached Jane Golden, the Executive Director of Mural Arts Philadelphia, over a year ago to discuss creating a mural in Lang's honor. Barnes has

spent the past year identifying a site for the mural and getting support from the community.

Mural Arts Philadelphia selected Jared Bader to create the mural, which is a thoughtful tribute to Lang's professional legacy and Italian heritage. The mural includes some of the many artists Lang collaborated with throughout his short career. A sign reading "Okeh Records", where Lang produced most of his music, is featured in the upper center of the mural. The James Campbell School - which stood on the grounds of Cianfrani Park - is also represented. Inspired by the Italian Renaissance painter Caravaggio, Bader utilizes chiaroscuro with light streaming in from the upper right window of the painting to create dramatic contrasts among the musicians with Lang highlighted prominently in the foreground.

On October 23, the mural was officially unveiled as part of the Eddie Lang Day celebration. The event included music from

the Blackbird Society Orchestra, which Barnes leads, and speeches from Councilman Mark Squilla, City Representative Sheila Hess, Consul General of Italy in Philadelphia Andrea Canepari, Barnes, and Lang's nephew Ed Massaro.

Barnes said, "The mural immortalizes Lang's legacy and ensures that future generations will know and appreciate his legacy... and perhaps even inspire people, especially children, to learn an instrument."

How to Kill Your Street Tree

oes your street tree's shade and beauty bother you? If so, do what some people do – kill it! Here's how:

Don't water it. Especially in its first 4 years. It's like denying water to a puppy. New trees require 20 gallons a week (40 if it's really hot). So make 'hold off the hose' your motto! Don't worry about the occasional heavy rain—it doesn't help much, and anyhow, there are ways to limit its impact, as we'll see.

Let weeds grow. Weeds are notorious water hogs. When it rains, they siphon off rainwater as it filters down through the soil. The more weeds you have, the less water reaches the tree's roots. So let weeds grow!

Stay trashy. Trash and weeds go together like peanut butter and jelly. Letting trash gather in the weeds gives your street tree that "finished" look. Plus, it lets neighbors and passersby know you want your tree dead. They just may oblige you by watering your tree with their dogs. That stuff eats away at the bark like acid.

Pile on trash bags. Feed your tree liquid detergents, bleaches, and other household chemicals. To do that, place your weekly trash bag against the tree's trunk. Liquid inside the bag can then leach into the tree's soil and trickle down to the roots. The tree expects water but gets chemicals instead. LOL – joke's on the tree!

Don't loosen the tree soil. Foot traffic, car tires, loaded trash bags, and anything else that pushes down on the tree soil - helped along by relentless gravity - makes the soil hard and crusty - or "compacted." Compacted soil acts like a dam, blocking rainwater from reaching the tree's roots. Rainwater instead runs off the compacted soil and into the street, then to the sewer. So don't loosen the soil with a garden claw or other tool. Bonus: Water runoff causes sewers to overflow and send human waste into the rivers.

Leave the Gatorbag on 24/7/365. Those green bags you see on tree trunks – Gatorbags – are good for providing trees the 20 gallons of water they need each

the tree to send roots into the mulch, impeding the growth of the all-important roots below the base of the trunk. Second, burying the trunk in mulch is like burying your foot in mulch: it will rot. Bonus tip: Use red mulch – it's filled with chemicals!

week. But you can also use a Gatorbag to kill your tree. Leaving the Gatorbag on 24/7/365 will create a micro-environment between the bag and the bark where tree-damaging insects can thrive. An empty Gatorbag also acts like an umbrella that deflects rainwater from reaching the tree's soil.

Build a mulch volcano. Get creative and build a mulch volcano around the tree's trunk. You've probably seen mulch volcanoes on heavily manicured properties. They damage trees in two ways. First, a mulch volcano prompts
