

Invitation - The North West Highland Geopark is launching a business network

The Geopark is setting up a Business Partnership, allowing businesses across the whole area to work together. It is holding a series of meetings across the whole Geopark to launch the idea, and invite people to help set the objectives, and agree what would be useful to work on together

A meeting has been arranged in Scourie Village Hall at 7pm on Wednesday $14^{\rm th}$ March.

One of the Geopark's UNESCO objectives is to develop the local economy through sustainable tourism. "Sustainable" is a difficult term to define sometimes, and we take it to mean slow tourism, where people are here long enough to spend plenty of money instead of leaving a woosh noise and a trail of exhaust fumes.

We are working to develop a strong brand for the Geopark, so that people have a clear idea of what is here, how good it is and why they need to come. And when they come they know where to look, and the experience matches what they expected.

Themes already identified are:

- promoting businesses across the whole Geopark effectively
- a Geofood trail where we can promote catering establishments, accommodation providers, producers and other outlets using good local produce
- a Geoart and Geocraft trail, helping visitors find their way to studios, workshops and retail outlets
- joint lobbying on behalf of all Geopark businesses where the need arises

February Weather

A damp and windy start to the month, but with temperatures hovering around the 4 degree mark. In the middle of the month there were reports that the jet stream had reversed direction, and would bring in very cold weather from the continent. This cold spell struck at the end of the month, with temperatures staying below zero all day, but we did not get the snow that other parts have experienced. 45 miles south, Ullapool has had over 25 cm, while we barely had enough to make footprints!

The average maximum temperature was 6.5 deg C, with a high of 9.3 on 19th. The average minimum was 2 deg C, with a low of -4.3 on 28th.

Rainfall total was 74.1 mm with the wettest day being the 8th with 12.6 mm. There were 7 days where no rain was recorded

The average barometer reading was 1006, with a high of 1032 on 26^{th} and a low of 971 mB on 14^{th} .

The average wind speed was 7.6 mph, with the highest gust being 34.9 mph on 14th and 15th.

The solar radiation gradually increased through the month as the days got longer. The daily average being $24.1 \; \text{km/m}^2$
