Geopark News

Your Geopark has been successful in a bid to the Resilient Heritage Lottery Fund. This will secure Laura's job for another year and also enable us to recruit another employee to help with the workload. Meanwhile we are investigating other sources of funding to help with operating costs. Laura returns from maternity leave on 11 February. Bookings are going well for the geotours this year with the autumn one being fully booked already. This year we are having a revalidation to ensure that we have made progress since the last inspection 4 years ago and that we are still fit to be a UNESCO global geopark. Two revalidators will be coming in the summer to see for themselves what we are doing, if we are successful we will be able to keep our UNESCO status for another 4 years.

The refurbishment of the Rock Stop kitchen is going well and should be completed in time for reopening this March. Cafe assistants are needed for the coming season. Both full and part time posts are available as well as relief staff and people to cover the busy lunchtime period. We would also welcome applications from students for holiday and weekend work. January Weather

Scourie has managed to miss most of the snow that has affected other areas. And some not so distant. Schools in Durness and KLB have been closed, while Scourie remained open. There was one day when the mail couldn't get through, but not because of conditions here!

Looking at last year's records, the two January months are almost identical.

The temperature averaged 4.9 deg C, with a high of 10.0 degrees on 7th, and a low of -1.4 on 31st. Note: I think the thermometer is reading a little high, perhaps a degree, will do some check calibrations when I find my spare thermometer.

Total rainfall was 135 mm, with the wettest day on 12th with 21.6 mm. We also had 21.3 mm on 26th. There were 6 days without rain.

Sunshine. The weather station recorded 239 watts/m², an average of 7.7 per day, and a high of 16.9 on 31st. Of interest, I've just read the solar panel meter in the changing rooms and submitted the figure. I do this every 6 months, but for some reason, the last two readings didn't register. So the amount paid for the last 18 months came to nearly £750. This is around twice the electric bill for the changing rooms.

The wind blew at an average of 7 mph with a high daily average speed of 16.9 mph, and gust of 55 mph both on 7th.

The barometer averaged 1006 mB, with a high of 1036 on 2nd, and low of 982 on 30th.
