Edition 155 April Weather

April has been very dry, and quite warm for the time of year. Work progresses on the vegetable patch with potatoes planted, and a lot of seeds sown. Brassicas, grown on in the polytunnels, have been planted out along with parsley. Now need to get a succession of sowings made to make sure we have a constant supply of salads through the year. And then start weeding! Wild flowers are starting to show with the mauve flowered Lady's smock, yellow celendines, yellow King cups (marsh marigold), blue violets, and of course, pale yellow primroses. The bank on the beach road is very prominent. Common sedge, hairy woodrush, and sweet vernal grass are also in full flower, but much less obvious and often overlooked. Trees are starting to show leaves, even on the Oak and Ash trees. Remember the old saying, "Oak before Ash, you're in for a splash, Ash before Oak, you're in for a soak". I heard the first cuckoo around the middle of the month, and cabbage white butterflies are visiting the Lady's smock. The large black flies that are around just now, hanging around shady areas under trees are St Mark's Flies, totally harmless, if a little annoying. Temperatures have been a couple of degrees higher than last year, the highest was 20.5 deg C on 22nd, average temperature for the month was 9.6 deg C, and the lowest temp 1.6 deg C on 2nd.Rain has been virtually non existent with only 27.6 mm. Wettest day was 21st with

Sunshine. 2642 w/m² were recorded, with the sunniest day on 29th with 157.8. The average was 88.1, over twice the March average. The windiest day was 3rd with an average of 21.7 mph. The highest gust was on 15th with 52.6 mph, and the months average was 8.7 mph.

7.2 mm, and 15 mm fell between 1st and 4th. There were 18 days where no rain was

Tues 28th ...Guided coastal walk across Faraid head by Durness. A guided walk across beautiful Balnakeil beach, over the headland, returning through the amazing dune system. Lovely views, seabirds, sand, seashells and high dunes. Adults only. About 3k. Time: 10:30 – 12:30. Booking ref: 001795KNBV

It's your Geopark!

Following the success of the 2017 & 2018 festivals the events for 2019 are now really getting underway. The Highlife Highland Ranger team are making a major contribution to more than 100 separate events in the festival this year. Details of the Ranger and other events are available on our website nwhgeopark.com. Some of the events planned for the festival at the Rock Stop are listed below.

The NW Highlands Geopark stretches from Coigach to Tongue and 5 of Scotland's 50 Best Places to See are right here.

Rock Stop Geocentre

The Rock Stop at Unapool is open 7 days a week 10.00 am - 4.30 pm. Come and see what the geopark is all about in the free exhibition and enjoy our coffee shop, including light lunches.

Thursday 9th May 7.30pm Rock Stop, Unapool Search of a Lost Impact Crater with Dr Mike Simms. There was a giant meteorite impact 1.2 billion years ago, but just a little of this ancient deposit now survives on the coast of NW Scotland. No impact crater has yet been identified but there is a remarkable correspondence between its location, as inferred from these coastal exposures, and the position of a 40 km diameter geophysical anomaly centred on Lairg. Friday 5th July 7.30pm Rock Stop Unapool North Sutherland: A Botanical Odyssey with Ian Evans. Ian has in recent years undertaken some detailed survey work on the north coast. He will reveal some of his findings, even linking them to the soil and rock types. Entry £5

Friday 2nd August 7.30pm Rock Stop Unapool Golden Eagles and the North West Highlands Geopark with Andy Summers High Life Highland Senior Ranger for North Highlands. Andy has a particular interest in the Eagles of the area and has recorded their comings and goings over many years. Entry £5

Tuesday August 27th 2.00pm Rock Stop, Unapool Vintage Geological Maps with Alastair Mitchell.
Alastair has a passion for old maps and especially geological ones. He has a collection, which traces the development of the science in Scotland. He will have the original maps there and will talk about their significance. Entry £5

Sunday September 22nd Inchnadamph Explore Watercourses and Caves at Traligill Valley, Inchnadamph. A multi-discipline excursion with Peter Harrison leading on the geology. This valley has much to discover and interpret so come along and help do just that. Meet at the Inchnadamph carpark (NC251216) at 11.00 a.m. Distance c.6km, mainly on paths. Bring lunch.
