Team Captains are to check BAs are correctly worn on all youth players and novice players before egress onto the water  Adherence of BC canoe polo rules regarding a capsized player, see rule 60.  All participants will be able to swim 25m unaided.					
Heat Exhaustion	1	1	All Participants	Team Captains and coaches will ensure appropriate clothing is worn when playing canoe polo.  Team Captains and coaches will ensure all players drink enough water.

Shoulder dislocation	3	1	All Participants	Games are constantly under the observation of a referee.  Teams are to be reminded of the importance of a warm-up at the beginning of the season  Team Captains to ensure their teams is fully prepared before a game	
Boat to Body contact	2	3	All Participants	Canoeists are informed of the BC rules of canoe available through the SCA website  Polo explicitly forbid boat to body contact, see rule 66.  Team Captains to ensure only polo specific boats are used (foam ends)  Referees to visually check all boats have legal bumpers, see rule 48.	
Slips/Trips	2	2	All Participants  Referee's  Officials  Members of  public	Appropriate footwear should be worn when refereeing.  Safety check of the area to be used must be carried out prior to the start of the session.  Equipment must be stacked aside when not in use. Paddles must be kept inside boats or removed from the ground.	
Finger Injuries	1	2	All Participants	Compliance of rule 50.4.  Paddles must adhere to rule 104.  Referees and team captains will ensure no inappropriate jewellery, wrist bands, locker keys, ear rings and bracelets are worn

Child Protection and Vulnerable Adults	3	2	Children Vulnerable Adults	Teams will abide by SCA Child Protection and Vulnerable Adults policy.  A welfare officer will be appointed for every tournament, with the main role of ensuring the club abides by this policy.  SCA Polo Committee will have a representative who has attended a Safeguarding and Protecting Children workshop every 3 years (at least)  Enhanced CRB checks (full disclosure) will be carried out for all club volunteers and details will be kept by the club secretary						
Verbal abuse or physical attack	2	2	Referees Other officials All participants.	No verbal or physical abuse will be tolerated and should be immediately controlled by the officials.  All incidents will be reported to an official Further action by the Canoe Polo Committee will be taken if necessary						



Fire or other serious incidents	3	2	All on site	Responsibility for evacuation will remain with the centre staff.  All event organisers, participants, volunteers and spectators will follow their instructions.  Evacuation plan is available from the Pool Management.  Canoe Polo organisers to ensure that all fire exits are kept free from obstruction at all times.	
Stuck by Drone	1	1	All on site	At outdoor events drone flying may occur. Guidance from SCA Office is that permission should not be given as the risk of injury is not covered by SCA insurance and giving permission would mean that the SCA take some responsibility. An individual may choose to fly their drone and would be responsible to their own insurance, disclosure issues, licensing etc.  Evacuation plan is available from the Pool Management. Canoe Polo organisers to ensure that all fire exits are kept free from obstruction at all times.	In the event that an individual is filming using a drone at a Polo event that the organizer feels is hazardous them they may approach the pilot and if needed request the pilot to modify their behavior. If this request does not work then the Police may need to be called.

Public struck by equipment or kayaks when unloading vehicles	1	1	General public	Equipment weight maximum is approx. 12kg.  Vehicles driver will be a minimum of 17 years old.  Teams are responsible for own movements until in venue/event.

Sunburn and Dehydration	1	2	All participants Officials Referees	Shoulders to be covered as per rule 50.3  Team Captains will ensure that players apply sun cream is regularly  Team Captains will ensure all players drink enough water  Drinking Water is available at every tournament and training session the club attends.	



Poor/Low Sunlight	2	3	All participants Officials Referees	Flood Lights will be used in all games after sunset.	
Hypothermia	2	2	All participants Officials Referees	Referees must wear warm clothing/coat when refereeing in adverse weather  Team Captains will ensure all players wear appropriate thermal and windproof clothing will be worn in adverse weather.  Hot Drinks will be available if adverse weather.	
Lightning Strike	3	1	All participants Officials Referees	No one is permitted to be outside on the water during a lightning storm	
Spectators	3	1	Members of Public	Cones and tape to be used to visually highlight the edge of path
