


## Nonpartisan Contests


City, school board and judicial contests are conducted in a nonpartisan fashion, meaning candidates may not run under the banner of their political party, and voters are not told the political affiliation of the candidates on the ballot.


## Closed Primaries


Florida is a closed primary state, meaning members of each political party choose their own nominee for each office up for each party-affiliated contest. However, if after qualifying, only one political party fields candidates, then the primary election becomes universal, allowing voters of all parties to vote.

















## Petition Certification

Countywide candidates need to have 2,920 completed, valid petitions turned in by May 21. For most campaigns, between eight and 15 percent of petitions will not be valid because either the signer is not a registered voter in Seminole County, the petition isn't dated, or the information is not complete. We can review your petition form format before you begin collecting signatures, to ensure the form will be acceptable.

City candidates should contact their city clerk for information about the city's petition requirements

Loyalty Oath/Oath of Candidate/Statement of Party (Candidates w/party affiliation) (Form DS-DE 24) or (Nonpartisan contests: DS-DE 25) or (Write-in: DS-DE 24A) OR (NPA: DS-DE 24B) Full and Public Disclosure of Financial Interest (Form 6) OR Statement of Financial Interests (Form 1) · Qualifying Fee (check drawn on campaign account) OR Petition Certification from SOE · Appointment of Campaign Treasurer and Designation of Campaign Depository (Form DS-DE 9) Statement of Candidate (Form DS-DE 84) 'If not already on file for the sought position.
