The Parish Council met on Friday 13 June 2014 Councillors present were Douglas Wooles (Chairman), Penny Bean (Vice-Chairman), Brian Parkinson, David Lea, David Smith, Martin Dodd and Sally Downing. The Clerk was Nigel Knapton. District Councillor Eric Hope was also present.

Planning Applications for consideration

14/00536/FUL – Erection of replacement agricultural building for the storage of produce and housing of livestock at Buildings at Finkle Street, Sheriff Hutton for Mr Nick Leedham. **No objections as long as the height of the building was no greater than the existing building.**

14/00481/HOUSE – Erection of part two storey/part single storey extension to the west and north elevations and entrance porch to the south elevation at Nesslyn, West End, Sheriff Hutton for Mr & Mrs Smith. The Council would ask the applicant for a site visit and Ryedale DC for an extension to the deadline for comments.

Lights Out:

"The lamps are going out all over Europe, we shall not see them lit again in our life-time" Words spoken by Sir Edward Grey, Foreign Secretary in August 1914 as Britain's ultimatium to Germany was about to expire. Lights Out is a headline project of the cultural programme 14-18 NOW and is part of the Centenary commemorations of the First World War. It is an invitation to everyone in the UK to turn off their lights on 4th August between 10pm and 11pm leaving on a single light or candle for a shared moment of reflection, marking the hour that Britain entered World War 1 one hundred years ago. Candlelit gatherings at local war memorials, church services, community events are planned around the UK....if you have any ideas as to what we could do in the village to mark this time please get in touch.

Village Hall Chairman's AGM report

I am delighted to be able to say that our village hall continues in good health, both structurally and financially, due mainly to the dedication of our committee of Trustees, and their supporting groups. Special thanks are due to Caryn Douglas our treasurer, and Ian Read, Operations Group treasurer, who have put in many hours of hard work preparing the accounts. Caryn will give us a summary of our financial status shortly.

The trustees' philosophy has been that the day to day running of the hall be met by hiring charges, and any extra fundraising, such as that from the 200 club, or events organised by the Friends Group is for capital expenditure. During the past year this objective has been achieved, and our reserves are currently adequate for our needs.

Bookings over the year have remained steady.

The solar panels continue to prove their worth and have generated some £3600 during the year and given us a reduction in our electricity bills of over 50% compared to before the installation of the panels. This is all well in line with our estimated projections.

The extremely generous legacy from the estate of the late Helen David has been used to provide new state of the art toilet facilities for the disabled, which are now completed. The Trustees are immensely grateful for such generosity.

Structurally the Hall is in good overall condition.

We have budgeted for the replacement of the Granwood composite floor in the main hall and the oil boiler which will be replaced when necessary, but are currently continuing to provide sterling service after 30 years of use. We can be proud that this longevity is due to the care that has been taken in the maintenance of these items.

The administration of the Hall is overseen by four groups:

The Operations Group; The Friends Group; The Play Area Group and The Health & Safety Group. The Operations Group oversees the day to day running of the hall under the expert chairmanship of Richard Haste. The Group continues to manage the tricky balance between expenditure and income without compromising the maintenance of the hall.

The Friends Group under the expert chairmanship of Margaret Fisher, have raised over £1100 during the year, and in so doing have utilized the Hall itself for several popular village events.

The Play Area continues to provide a safe and popular facility for the village.

The Health and Safety Group's recent annual review showed that the Hall meets all sensible H and S requirements.

The Hall was subject to a random inspection by the North Yorkshire Fire & Rescue service in November of last year in view of the latest fire regulations, and the inspector's recommendations are currently being addressed.

Overall, the inspector was impressed with the quality of the hall, the way we look after it, and our risk assessment regime.

The Trustees are delighted at the success of the newly formed History Group. The archive room is now almost complete, and it is expected that the Group will be moving material in there soon.

Sadly Playgroup will be moving out of the Hall later this year. The Trustees are pleased that Playgroup has been able to use the Hall to our mutual advantage for several years, and we are sorry to see them go, not least because this group has been our main regular hirer, so their move will have a significant effect on our income. Of course this will also give us new challenges to look for new hirers.

I would like to make a special mention of the dedication of Terry Johnson who carries out regular inspections and maintenance of all electrical matters tirelessly, week after week, and without whose expert input we would be at great loss.

Finally, although after this year's AGM, the Chairmanship of the Trustees will be taken over by lan Read, who will succeed me for the next 3 years, I would like to express my sincere thanks to all my fellow Trustees and supporting groups, and the volunteers who support the hall with their work and dedication throughout the year, in maintaining a village hall to be proud of, for the people of this village.

Clifton Cycling Club

The club has been regular hirers of the Village Hall for several years now. We have received the following, to explain to readers how their events are organised.

The club organise a number of sporting events each year on the quiet roads around Sheriff Hutton. These fall into two distinct types – time trials and road races. Each has to go through an approval process and conform with requirements of a national sporting body, police and highways authorities, but the two are different – and will indeed look different if you see them happening on the day.

Time trials are events where riders are set off one at a time to complete a set distance as fast as they (safely) can. These generally involve a maximum of about forty competitors who will gather at the start, and all you'll see after that is the individual riders one at a time. We put out "Cycle Event" warning signage along the roads, and we station a marshal in a hi-viz jacket at any danger points – usually junctions where they emerge from a minor to major road. Most competitors ride out to these events, but we try to locate the start where a small number of cars can be parked without causing problems. Most of these events are on Thursday evenings from May through to August. There usually isn't a formal event HQ (other than the back of the organiser's car) as the organisation is fairly straightforward.

Road races are bunch events; a maximum of sixty competitors set off together to complete a set number of laps of a given circuit, and will usually largely stick together throughout and there will be a sprint at the finish. These events have lead cars and one following car, all with roof signs, and in addition we place warning "Cycle Event" signage along the roads. We also employ professional traffic management to control traffic at most junctions – this is done by halting traffic with "Road Closed" signage each time the bunch comes through – usually for less than a minute each time. We try to leaflet-drop all houses along the route in advance to give notice and to ask as politely as we can that cars be parked off the road where this is easily done – purely because this just makes things a further bit safer. We have an Event HQ for these events and in Sheriff Hutton we book the village hall. We send out a "start sheet" to competitors beforehand and request that they park in the provided car park if at all possible, or with consideration if they have to park on the roads – we specifically ask that driveways be left clear.

This year we ran one evening road race (on 1st May) and will be running two races (a British Cycling race and a veteran's race for over-40's) on the same day — Sunday 29th June. The veterans race will start at 10am and the BC race at 1:30pm. Each will last around two hours but all you will see is the bunch passing through once every twenty-odd minutes, with the lead and following cars and the junctions being temporarily closed. We are very keen to work alongside local communities to allow grass-roots racing to flourish; if there are any issues or concerns then please contact the organiser — either at the Event HQ on the day or by email at roadrace@cliftoncc.org

The Old Glebe Conservation Area

The conservation area of about three acres is a diverse area surrounded by hedges and trees.

The management of this area is very important to support many wild flowers and grasses. On warm sunny days butterflies and moths can be seen fluttering about.

Cutting and harvesting the grass in late July or August allows the flowers, (including one or two orchids!) and grass to reseed. Sheep then graze the flush of growth in the autumn.

This year the Conservation Trust has a problem. For the last few years the machinery (tractor, mower and hay turner) which have been borrowed are no longer available. If the grass cannot be cut and harvested the management of this area may have to change. It would be sad if the work started by Robin Wardell and others over many years is not continued.

Sheriff Hutton Pre-School Playgroup and Toddlers is a registered charity no. 1021113

AN EXCITING DEVELOPMENT

As many of you will know, there has been a playgroup in Sheriff Hutton for over forty years. Much has changed in that time although one thing has remained the same: **the commitment of Playgroup staff and committee to providing quality, affordable pre-school education for local children.** Our base, for many years now, has been the Village Hall and we are grateful to the trustees of the Hall for accommodating Playgroup and allowing us to make changes including providing outside storage and an awning, and complying with our health and safety requirements. However, it is fair to say that running a pre-school from the shared Village Hall space – although it is an excellent community venue – has presented us with increasing practical and financial challenges over the years. We are delighted to announce, therefore, that we have been granted a temporary licence to move to a self-contained, free-standing classroom at Sheriff Hutton Primary School, to open in September 2014. The classroom we will be using is spacious, very well-maintained, has access to its own toilets and hand basins, and also has an enclosed outside area for our exclusive use. In the longer term, we are seeking permission to lease the land on a redundant part of the school site – currently occupied by the electricity substation – so that we can build a permanent pre-school facility.

For Playgroup, relocation to the school site will provide a great opportunity to further develop our indoor and outdoor provision; will increase our financial stability; will enable us to offer more sessions and extend our hours to fit in with the school day as requested by many of our parents; will strengthen links with the primary school; and will further ease transition for our children. In short, we believe that this move will give us the best chance of securing the long-term future of our independently run and managed community pre-school playgroup.

How you can help:

- In the short term: money has been set aside already for the few essential alterations needed, but we are hoping to raise an additional £3,000 to enable us to make further improvements including installing a canopy in the outside area and also replacing/refreshing some of our toys and equipment. We would also be pleased to hear from anyone who thinks they could provide a good quality fridge or lockable shed
- In the long term: if we are successful in gaining permission to lease the substation land for a
 permanent pre-school facility, we will launch a major fundraising campaign. Further
 information will follow.

From September, we will provide Playgroup sessions each week during term time on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday from 9:00-12:00 (morning); 12:00-3:00pm (afternoon) or 9:00am-3:00pm (all day) with an optional After Playgroup Club from 3:00-3:20pm. Neighbourhood Watch

Following yet another attempt by persons of dubious character to do 'work' on an elderly resident's property the Police are keen to introduce the 'Nominated Neighbour Scheme' to the village as a matter of some urgency. This entails a neighbour, friend, family member, NHW coordinator or Parish Councillor to be nominated by vulnerable members of the community to act as a contact for callers at the door.

The scheme requires the nominated person to ascertain whether the unexpected caller is genuine or not. If genuine the nominated person can accompany the caller back to the vulnerable persons house (callers of ill intent tend not to bother going to the nominated address). The Police have information packs regarding the scheme and are intending to make them available shortly – if you would like a pack either for yourself, a family member or neighbour please give me the details and I'll pass them on to the Police. I know nobody likes to consider themselves vulnerable, however the types of people perpetrating these scams are well versed in their craft and have no scruples with regard to making money, and have demonstrated a high success rate locally over the past months.

Insofar as I am aware there has been little in the way of local crime in the past month, either in the rural areas or villages – presumably everyone's watching football and/or tennis instead – the only crime trend advised is that of theft of fuel from Peugeot cars. These cars have plastic fuel tanks that are easily drilled into to allow theft. The Police advise owners of these cars to be vigilant, and to park with the driver's side adjacent to a wall or other obstruction. These thefts have occurred between Malton and Scarborough, so are not an immediate concern locally, but be aware.

Another Look Back in Time

The following is a letter sent to Village News in about 1985 and, with the opening of the History Room, it seems to be timely to reprint it and give another 'snapshot' of how life was in our village over 100 years ago. The writer would have been born in about 1900.

"In 1823 the village population was recorded in the Directory of the area as 756 and a few names still survive, e.g. Attlay, Belt, Brown, Cattle, Cordukes, Groves, Harrison, Hick, Pearson and Suggitt, all names known to me in my time. Our residents include a Surgeon (who occupied Bertram House where I was born much later), two Blacksmiths, two Bricklayers, two Butchers, two Coopers, two Corn Millers, six Joiners, two Schoolmasters, six Shoemakers, five Shopkeepers, four Tailors, (including one with the wonderful name of Phineas Gultry), one Saddler, one Brewer and maltster, (whose brewery was surveyed by my father as the Excise Officer for the area), one Linen Weaver, two Carriers (to York every Wednesday and Saturday) and four Public Houses – New Inn, Pack Horse [now The Highwayman], Lord Wellington and Blacksmith's Arms [now The Castle Inn].

My family, the Wilson family – Mother, Father and my elder brother Vernon – took over Bertram House in January 1908 and the house was something of a wreck (I dare not tell you how much Father gave for it!) but as time passed it was re-roofed and cement rendered, much the same as it is today. As time passed my sister and I were born in the house but there were no such facilities as water or electricity in the village. Our drinking water came from a pump across the road and in the event of a dry summer (I recall one or two) we took our enamelled pail across bright and early before Tot Johnson (who lived opposite with brother Joe and sister) emptied the well for his thirsty pigs and other livestock. Rain water for washing etc. was channelled through guttering all around the house and buildings into five very large barrels in the 'Water Barrel Place' in our row of buildings. Eventually we enjoyed the luxury of a tap in the back kitchen, followed by all the other amenities which we now take for granted, especially electricity (the house was wired at a charge of £1 per point!).

As the Excise Officer for the area, my Father operated on horseback from home, followed by a Triumph motor-bike and sidecar and then a series of Morris cars until his Station ranged over a half-circle from Easingwold, through Helmsley and Kirkbymoorside round to Flaxton and back home – beautiful countryside to this day. On Sundays, Father and we three children walked up to Church (where we had all been Christened and Confirmed over the years) in the morning (as a little boy I used to kneel on the seat so that, for the hymns, I could see over the top of our pew behind the choir on the North side). Mother attended church in the evening with the family.

Schooling moved on to Archbishop Holgate's Grammar School in York, with a very welcome bus service replacing the horrendous cycle rides to Flaxton Station in the old days."
