Sheriff Hutton History Group

Our speaker this month was Neil Hodges. He gave us an illustrated account of his in-depth research of Bracken Hill and the surrounding area. Bracken Hill, the house, is originally Georgian, then early Victorian.

It has been more than a house over the years, including being a barracks, a pub and post office. The barracks is named in the 1901 census, and the map of 1904 refers to Sheriff Hutton barracks. In 1874 the house and row of cottages were part of a working farm. The labourers lived in the cottages. They worked until well over today's retirement age, one is recorded as being 93 years old! There is evidence of a pulley on the side of the house up to the attic, which might have been used as a grain store. The attic might also have been used as an extra room.

Certain names familiar to us recur in the census over the years such as Pearson, Metcalf, Suggitt and Harrison. A tithe = 1 tenth of the annual produce of land or labour. This was taken as tax for the support of the church and clergy. The church in return helped the poor of the parish. There was a tithe barn on Coble Lane where produce was stored. Tithe owners sometimes prepared maps for their own use to show the ownership of land.

Hawthorn hedges were used to divide fields for many years. There is evidence of this behind the house at Bracken Hill. These hedges are probably about 200 years old.

Neil had some very good slides of the tithe map of Bracken Hill and the surrounding area. Thank you Neil for a most interesting evening.

Please note: There will be no meeting in July and August, and the Monday research sessions will be closed. Thank you to everyone who has popped in to see us with information and donations. Our archives continue to grow.

Next meeting is on Tuesday 26th September at 7.30 p.m. "The historical study of the Yorkshire dialect" presented by Mathew Townend on how dialect has been studied historically. This connects with his earlier topic of our Scandinavian heritage in terms of language. This will be Mathew's second visit to us, and you can be sure of a very interesting and informative evening. Whilst we weren't lucky enough to see Roe deer or freshwater shrimps, both of which are common here, there was both white and the increasing unusual red clover as well as Yellow Rattle, Agrimony and Water Mint.

Our next visit is to Pond Head at Yearsley Wood on Sunday July 2nd. This is a good site for insects, dragonflies and butterflies as well as flora. There are no facilities but it's not too far from home and will be a morning's walk. Please meet at The Highway Inn car park at 10am if you wish to come along.

The Village I Remember

Alan Farnaby's Memories of The Farming Community

In the 1930's most people were occupied in farming or allied trades. There were eight working farms and six smallholdings within the village and thirty-seven outlying farms. Almost all were mixed farms, and it was only after the 1939/45 war that farmers began to specialise, many increasing their dairy herds because of the stability which the Milk Marketing Board brought to the industry, the milk being collected from the farm gate daily, and for the first time farmers had a regular monthly income.

Beef and arable farming also played an important role in the economy of the Parish.

Almost all the village farmers and smallholders farmed land outside the village, several had *gaits* (shares in) the Ings Pastures situated at the bottom of Carr Hill and Carr Pasture – the first field on the right when entering Carr Lane – the main access to Sheriff Hutton Carrs. All who owned the *gaits* were the joint owners of the land and each year, in turn, they acted as Pasture Master seeing that the rules were strictly adhered to i.e. that gait owners only grazed the correct number of stock between May and October each year and that fences, hedges and gates were maintained. All the cattle put in the Ings Pasture were dairy cows and they, together with animals from other farms, had to be walked twice daily to and from the fields for milking. Cows belonging to Hodgsons, Calverts, Pearsons, Hulls, Farnabys, Simpsons and Solitts could be on the move at any time mornings and evenings.

A number of smallholders had joint ownerships of small fields all arable in the 'Canadas' on the south side of Mill Lane or at 'Storey' on the Sutton road near Sheriff Hutton Bridge, and at the 'Anchor' just beyond Brickyard Farm on the Strensall road.

Pigs and poultry were kept on most holdings, eggs and dressed poultry being sold by the women folk for their housekeeping money. Many of them made butter and curd and together with the dressed poultry 'stood' York Market every Saturday, travelling on Tom Harrison's bus, putting their buckets and baskets on the roof; the West Yorkshire Bus Company followed on with the service.

Farming was very labour intensive and many farmers needed to hire in help at certain times of the year for weeding and pulling carrots which were grown to the south of the parish on the light sandy land. Much of this work was done by 'gangs' of ladies who worked for Mr Bob Goddard or Mr Bob Atlay. At potato picking times these 'gangs' were joined by schoolchildren able to earn money during their October holidays.

Extra help was available during the war years from the Land Army and the Italian and German prisoners of war who were billeted at Eden Camp, Old Malton. They wore distinctive clothing of shirts and coats having circles of different colours stitched to them making them easily recognisable.


