Parish Council

Due to Covid19 the planned Parish Council on 8th May 2020 could not take place.

The following new planning applications were received for consideration:-

20/00339/FUL Howl Beck Nurseries, Lilling Back Lane, West Lilling
Change of use and alteration of an existing agricultural building to a two bedroom dwelling for the applicant's residential use in conjunction with the sites horticultural business.

Decision - Sheriff Hutton Parish Council OBJECT to planning application 20/00339/FUL, on the following grounds:-

1. Whilst the building does exist is there any proof the building has in fact been used for an agricultural purpose, it is a very recent build, which it's use was only recently questioned by the Parish Council with Ryedale, the appearance already resembles a house, why do pigs need double glazing?
2. This building is sited in open countryside and this type of development is not supported by the Local Plan.
3. Is there proof this is a viable business to support the need to live on site? It appears more of a hobby with random opening and just a wheelbarrow of plants on display. The parking area seems to be more used as a vehicle repair area and appears to be more of a business than the nursery.
4. With regards to adding to the security of the site by being in close proximity there is already a house adjacent to the site so this shouldn't be considered as a reason to live on site. Have any of these break-ins been documented?

20/00417/HOUSE 5 Warwick Close, Sheriff Hutton

Erection of single storey rear extension following removal of existing conservatory (revised details to approval 19/01324/HOUSE dated 23.01.2020).

Decision – No Objection.

No new planning decisions or appeals were received.

Village Volunteers

The Village Volunteers have been busy. Up to two weeks before 9th May, there were 86 shops with 44 people helped, 72 phone calls with a different 44 people helped and 15 medication collections for 15 people. Other examples of help and/or activity include VE Day leaflets delivered, scones made and delivered for VE Day, Melanie's dressed up Moggy 1000 driving around on VE Day, rhubarb left at the gate for people, meals cooked and delivered, lots of face masks made, D.I.Y. support, dog-walking, gift boxes, laminating ID badges and labels for pop-up library.

Jill Anfield had the original idea to have a pop-library and Roy Thompson organised it for the bus shelter at the bottom of Coble Lane where books and DVDs could be borrowed. After two weeks, there is a regular daily pattern of putting out 12-20 newly treated books (and 10 DVDs), all wiped with anti-bacterial cloths, left standing upright for 48 hours and separately bagged and sealed (following North Yorkshire recommendations). There is a good stock of books ready to go through the routine. A number of teenage books have been age-sorted for distribution to Youth Club members. Similarly, children's books will also be distributed to that age group. Thank you to Jill and Roy.

Another consequence of the absence of the Library Service is the effect on the Book Club. The Village Volunteers successfully applied to North Yorkshire for funding so the Book Club could continue. This application was successful which is really good news.

You can keep up to date with what is happening through the Facebook page or the app.

So a huge thank you to all the Village Volunteers - lots of activity with a significant number of phone calls too. Also, lots of help offered or problems sorted that might have happened anyway but perhaps villagers felt they could ask. It feels a real community effort from a brilliant village!

And please do get in touch with your local team if you would like any shopping done, medication collected or would just appreciate a chat on the phone. There may be other things we can help with, or if we can't we can usually find someone who can!

Message from Revd. Ruth Duck

There are many pros and cons associated with computers and online facilities! The joys of being able to see people 'live', have conversations as a group, learn something new every day about the world in which we live and share in worship together are undeniable. The less enjoyable aspects for me include the exhaustion that can hit after yet another 'Zoom' meeting, the frustrations when nothing works as I expect or hope, and the rubbish that sometimes appears! However, I want to try and describe one of the many funny, delightful, and heart-warming video clips that are sometimes shared on social media.

This one started with a small child and a dog having a walk together. Who was taking who for the walk is open to debate, but the clip is called 'Best Friends, a kid, a dog and a puddle'! The little boy was holding the dog lead, and he saw a puddle, and trying to pull the dog towards it he managed to walk through the water. Looking back he decided that he would like to splash again and tried to drag the dog back, (who was as big as he was) and when the animal refused, he carefully laid down the lead and went back for several runs at the puddle. The dog? The dog just waited patiently – seemingly totally aware of what the child was doing. When the little boy had had enough of the paddling, he came back to the dog, picked up the lead again, and continued the walk.

The bond between the two was evident, and I loved the way the dog just kept patiently waiting, refusing to depart from his own course, but waiting until the little boy was ready to join him. Many of us will have been enjoying walks in recent times. Looking at the beauty, smelling the flowers, hearing the birds, and appreciating all that surrounds us can lift our spirits. Sometimes we walk alone, and at others we are able to walk with another (perhaps abiding by the social distancing rules) – or for you it may be the time to take the dog for a walk.

When I watched the video I thought about our 'walk with God', and realize that we are sometimes like the little boy trying to make God walk our way. On 28th April I received a phone call at 3 am in the morning, "call withheld", no one there? Later in the day I learned that quite a few similar calls had been received in the Village and West Lilling, some at different times, and some with persistent multiple calling if the phone was not answered, so I informed 101 who had no other reports. On 3rd May I had a report of more similar calls on that same day, some with "heavy breathing" and suggestive comments, if the call was answered, which again had been reported to 101. I am not aware of any further such calls since. Phone calls through the night can be a cause of concern, but nuisance calls can be blocked using the 1572 "Call Protect" if your phone provider is BT.

Updates from the Village Hall during Covid-19 Outbreak

The Village Hall Trustees and Operations Group both 'met' this week on Zoom and we want to update you as at 15th May. Government advice may have moved on again by the time you read this, so, for the most up-to-date information please check our website: www.sheriffhuttonvillagehall.co.uk

Play Area:

The Government advice published 11th May made it clear that playgrounds are to remain closed due to the risk of cross-infection from equipment surfaces. Therefore, we took the opportunity to undertake the ground works to level the grassed surfaces and reseed where necessary. We hope that the grass will have grown back by the time the play area may be re-opened.

Hall Grounds: The ground works project (largely funded by a grant from Ryedale District Council) includes levelling the grassed area by the trees and Village Hall sign, so that it is suitable for market stalls in future. There will also be some repairs to fencing between the car park and path and a drainage channel created to resolve (we hope) the puddle that appears across the path from the car park to the Hall main entrance whenever we get significant rain. ***Please ensure that you keep the prescribed two metre distance from anyone working in the Hall grounds.***

The Building:

While all hire activities within the Hall stopped in March, we have been undertaking deep cleaning, there have been regular security, safety and maintenance checks and servicing and maintenance work continues. We are currently considering how (and if) the Hall can be safely used whilst the current "Social Distancing" measures are in place, once such facilities may re-open.

Governance matters:

This is normally the time of year when we convene an AGM to which Villagers are invited, but that is not possible and we decided against a 'virtual AGM'. We shall hold a procedural Trustee meeting to sign off the 2019 accounts so they can be published and submitted to the Charity Commissioners, which meets our obligations under the Village Hall constitution. We will hold an open meeting once it becomes possible to do so legally and safely.

Finance:

The Hall has significant overheads to meet, regardless of whether it is in use. The solar panels are providing an income that covers part of these costs and we are able to meet the remaining costs from our reserves, but like so many organisations we will have to look at fund-raising opportunities once we are back in operation.

If all is well and we can run as planned, our simple menu will include cooked breakfasts served for the whole morning, sit in or take away sandwiches and snacks, cakes and treats to have with a hot or cold drink. Oh, mustn't forget ice creams!

If we are able to open but not run a sit down table service yet, we will be happy to offer take outs, but obviously we will be led by the latest guidance which is difficult to confirm at this time of writing. Updates will be posted on boards outside the Village Hall and on social media to help keep everyone informed.

We want to reassure you that all recommendations will be followed with regard to social distancing and hygiene standards to protect ourselves as well as customers. We look forward to seeing you in the near future, all welcome.

Sheriff Hutton Gardening Club.

Here are some gardening activities for June.

Support the taller growing herbaceous perennials to minimise wind damage and to maximise the display of flowers, use pieces of brushwood in a wigwam formation around the clumps of plants. Alternatively use canes and trellis twine. This task should be done early in the month to allow the plants to grow through and camouflage the supports.

Water and feed outdoor container plants, hanging baskets and troughs. To avoid excessive evaporation and waste of water try to do this job either early morning or in the evening, if possible.

Dead heading may seem to be a tedious task but it certainly is worthwhile as it prevents seed formation and encourages the plant to produce more flowers and for a longer period. It also improves appearances. There are exceptions to this rule, particularly with the autumn flowering perennials which may set seeds which are particularly valuable winter food for small birds.

Check plants and crops regularly for signs of impending pest and disease problems. An infestation of aphids can build up very quickly. Finger and thumb “squishing” of the first few greenfly or blackfly to arrive can help to avoid a major problem and also avoid spraying with pesticides. Do wash your hands thoroughly after a squishing session!

Outdoor varieties of tomato plants can be planted now either in the soil or in containers. If possible choose a sunny, sheltered position, cane and tie the plants and protect from slugs and snails.

Continue to earth up potatoes as necessary to protect the tubers against blight and greening.

Frost susceptible vegetables and fruits, e.g., courgette, marrow, sweet corn, runner bean, melon and pumpkin can safely be planted out now along with tender ornamentals such as dahlias and pelargoniums.

Brassica plants need to be watered and firmed in well when planting. Protection against wood pigeons, cabbage white butterfly and moths is essential. With much reduced traffic on the roads in April and May rabbits and deer are visiting our gardens, so be on guard.

Further small, successional sowings of fast growing salad plants e.g., lettuce, radish, rocket and many others in the ‘cut and come again’ category can be made. Sow the seeds in shallow drills which should be watered before sowing. Until germination occurs cover the seedbed/drills with pieces of netting to prevent birds using the area as a dust bath.

Keep mowing the lawn regularly, a cutting height of 30mm is quite short enough, particularly during hot, dry weather. Spot treat or grub out any perennial lawn weeds.

Finally, we hope that you will continue to enjoy your gardens and are reaping many benefits that gardening can bring to both mind and body. Do rest awhile on that under-used garden seat and take in the beauty of your garden, the flowers and plants. A moment to count your blessings.

CARRY ON GARDENING

Do you have minute? We all have time on our hands, so spare a moment for thinking about time itself.

We are used to having 24-hour days with an hour being 60 minutes, but man invented these divisions for his own convenience, didn't he?

Earlier in the Earth history our planet slowed down from 385 days in a year to the 365 we find familiar; (OK mustn't forget Leap years, but mankind invented those too!) and day length correspondingly grew from 23 to 24 hours in a day. A year is of course the length of time the Earth takes to orbit the Sun.

Think back to the ancient Egyptians, they defined an hour as one twelfth part of the time between dawn and dusk. So, one hour in summer was longer than one hour in winter! So, their sense of time was rather different to ours.

I hope that filled up another 5 minutes of your day. Keep safe, etc.
