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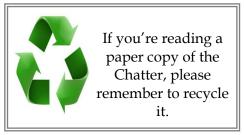

Council Update

During November, Council met twice. Below is the general overview of the topics discussed:

Infrastructure

The ice rink is set-up and ready for the season so please come out and enjoy some family skating. Due to the arrival of the snow, please remember to ensure your vehicles and recreation equipment are removed from the curb and road areas so the plow can properly clear the roads.

As a follow-up on our Wildsmart Community initiative, three Councilors (Councillor Allen, Councillor Perkins & Councillor Decore) will be attending the Mountain & Resort Town Planning Summit, which will have an information session and discussion on "Living with Wildlife". This information will assist us in developing our Wildsmart Community initiative.

Emergency Services

An Emergency Management group has been established consisting of Councillor Van Camp, Townsite Staff, Fire Chief & Deputy Chief and a representative from the Tsuut'ina Nation to update our Emergency Management Plan.

Financial

Treasurer Winograd has initiated discussions with Townsite staff, Redwood Meadows Community Association and our Fire Department to develop the 2019 Capital and Operating budgets, which will be presented to Council early 2019 for approval.

Communications

Councilor Decore continues to work on various communications with regards to the Wildsmart Community initiative and Diaper Composting initiative. He will provide updates specific to these topics in the near future.

Lease Updates

The Lease discussions are progressing towards our target date of August 2019. A Lease Communications Focus Group has been established to assist the Lease Advisory Working Group with creating and providing pertinent information related to the Lease discussions so all Sublease Holders are informed appropriately prior to the Lease vote in early 2019. For more detailed information regarding the Lease discussions, please feel free to attend our regularly scheduled Lease Information Sessions. A Lease Information Session schedule will be provided in the next Chatter.

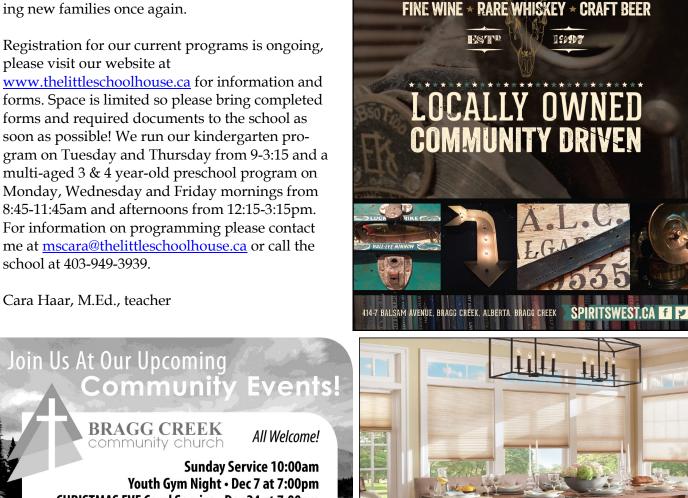

Is a new home in your future in 2019?

Is 2019 the year you will purchase a new property? How exciting! A bit of preparedness in advance will ensure a smooth process. Here are some tips to ensure you make your home purchase a stress-free success:

KNOW YOUR CREDIT SCORE. As a consumer, you can run your credit report for a minimal cost at any time. You should be aware about what is on your credit report and ensure your credit score is accurate and where it needs to be. Scores range from 300 to 900 and a best-rate mortgage is usually available to those with a score of 620 or better (well qualified or exception type products require a score of 700 or better). If your score is less than that, take steps to increase it *before* applying for a mortgage.

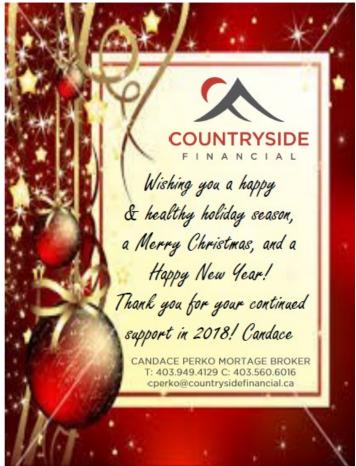
ANALYZE YOUR BUDGET AND FINANCES. Spend some time and really analyze your household monthly expenditures. If you do not have a household budget in place, you should. See how much you spend on groceries, school fees, day care, gas, entertainment, kid's sports, etc.

DEFINE EXACTLY HOW MUCH YOU CAN COMFORTABLY AFFORD. After you have evaluated your finances above, define how much is reasonable for you to spend on a mortgage payment. I always remind my clients that what works 'on paper' is not necessarily the same as your 'sleep at night factor' or what is most comfortable in your household ... only you should decide this final number.

SAVE FOR YOUR DOWN PAYMENT AND CLOSING COSTS. You must have a minimum of 5% (for purchases < \$500,000) or 10% (for amounts > \$500,000) down payment for a CMHC insured mortgage (premiums will apply); OAC. Or, you must have a minimum of 20% or greater down payment for a

Conventional mortgage; OAC. Save as much as you can for your down payment and remember there are closing costs. If you need to sell an existing home in order to have your down payment money, ensure that you have taken steps with a Realtor to sell your home in time or in advance of this new purchase. Closing costs may be a home inspection, appraisal, lawyer, property tax adjustments, etc. and you need to have cash available to pay these costs.

KNOW THE MORTGAGE PROCESS. Speak with a knowledgeable mortgage broker and get prequalified. Based on your income, your credit score, your down payment, and your existing liabilities and assets, your broker will work out how much you can spend on your new home (a broker may also help you take steps to correct any issues before making a mortgage application). Not only will you know exactly what you will qualify for, you will also learn about the different types of mortgages available to you, and at what rates and terms. A mortgage broker can also lock in a rate for 90-120 days to ensure you are protected from rate increases while you shop for your new home.

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ENLIST THE SERVICE OF A KNOWLEDGEA-BLE AND TRUSTWORTHY REALTOR. There are many real estate agents/advisors out there, and you should find one that specializes in the area you wish to purchase your home, especially when dealing with rural or lease-hold properties. And, one that has your best interests at heart. Working together, you should define what is required in your new home versus what is merely desired. Your realtor should know your purchase price limit and help you stay within that margin.

Happy Holidays!

It's an exciting time of year for adults and children alike. Houseguests, changes in routines, amazing food and decorations make for fun times. A few reminders from your friendly local first responders:

Don't drink or get high and operate a vehicle. And do not go hiking, snowshoeing, cross country skiing or fat biking either while under the influence. Not even just "a little."

Make sure your home is safe over the Christmas holidays

Use the correct type of lights that are manufactured for decoration on your Christmas tree and only turn them on when you're home to supervise. You can buy timers to help you remember.

If you enjoy having a "real" tree, be sure to keep it well watered so it doesn't become a fire hazard. When you sit down to write out your Christmas letter to Santa to give to him when Santa is in the Woods on the 16th try to remember when you last replaced your smoke detector or carbon monoxide alarm (hint: if it was before 2009, you're overdue), give yourself an early Christmas gift!

Help us get to you quickly - Think carefully about how you decorate areas around your front door (inside and out) for the holidays. It can be hard to get our equipment in/out of homes during emergencies, more so around the holidays when we have to navigate around Frosty the Snowman

When you're out shoveling your sidewalks, be sure to clear off your house number so we can easily see it! Keep your driveway cleared and passable for tall, wide emergency vehicles.

Supervise your pets carefully to ensure they aren't knocking flammable items over to get some attention AND they aren't sneaking outside to get away from all the noise.

Be proactive and post your phone number and address in a central and prominent place in your home so anyone unfamiliar with the area can call for help, if needed.

If you live alone, let a neighbor know if you are feeling unwell over the holidays so they can check-in on you.

Be a snow angel and get onto Santa's nice list– shovel your neighbour's walkway and go by and say hi if you think they are in need of some Christmas cheer.

As we reflect on the past year, our hearts are full of gratitude for each RMES member that has volunteered their time tirelessly to help whenever the call came. Time supporting RMES means time taken away from family, friends, and other commitments. Thank you to our members' support networks for sharing them so generously.

We are at the time of year where we are enjoying visits with family and friends to celebrate the holiday season. During this time more than good cheer can be spread. Influenza and colds can be passed from person to person quite easily during these gatherings.

Flu or influenza can be a serious illness. It is often confused with the common cold.

What are the differences between these two diseases?

A common cold can by caused by many different viruses. It cannot be prevented by immunization. Symptoms appear gradually. Colds are sometimes accompanied by fever and a cough, rarely extreme fatigue, chills and aches or headache. Symptoms never involve the whole body.

Influenza is caused by influenza A or B viruses. Annual immunization protects against the strains of influenza circulating that season. Symptoms involve the whole body; onset is quick with high fever that can last several days. Patients can have severe chills, aches, pains and headaches including a cough. People can experience extreme fatigue which can last several weeks. In the 2017/2018 season about 100 Albertans died due to lab-confirmed influenza and about 3000 people were admitted with lab-confirmed influenza. The influenza vaccine is not a live vaccine and contains antigens against two

influenza A and two influenza B strains. It takes 2 weeks to achieve protection. Its effectiveness varies from year to year but immunization is still the best protection. We know for sure not being immunized offers no protection. Early start of antiviral medication can lessen symptoms and shorten the time of illness by about one day. Influenza immunization may reduce the risk of complications. Care in the Creek Medical Centre keeps an ample supply of influenza vaccine is stock. We are currently accepting new patients. Drop by or call 403-949-2457 and we will be happy to immunize those 9 years and older.

Picapix Puzzle

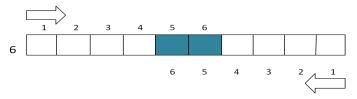
The latest Japanese logic puzzle is here! A picture will evolve as you complete the puzzle. Start with the largest numbers or combination of, colour in squares and proceed to work back and forth between columns and rows.

The three basic rules are:

- Numbers represent how many squares you colour in to form a group or block.
- Leave at least one square between these blocks.
- The sequential order of the numbers is the order of the blocks, i.e., top number for a column is the top block, and left-most number for a row is the left-most block.

The "logic count method" shown below is very useful: The clue at the left of the row is 6, so count 6 squares from the left to right and then count 6 squares from right to left.

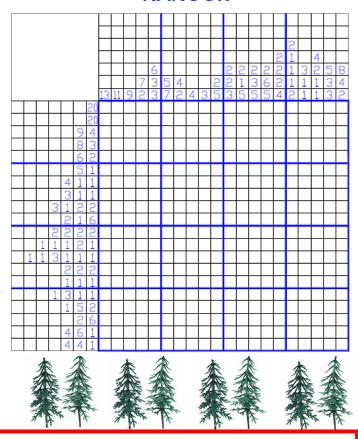
Confidently shade in the overlapping squares. This is spatial reasoning. Even one shaded square can lead to others.



This same method can be applied even when there is more than one number, remembering to allow one empty square between groups or blocks. Use a second colour for elimination of background squares. This is critical for solving. Remember – no guessing; try using your best number logic. For more information, visit http://www.learnpicapix.com.

Upstream flood, drought and fire Protection

We held another presentation on November 30, 2018, at the request of the Assistant Deputy Minister, Springbank, Alberta Transportation. There were a number of SR1 project team staff in attendance at the Stantec office, both from Alberta Transportation and from Stantec.

This time, at the suggestion of Chief Lee Crowchild during our October 26 presentation at Redwood Meadows, Mary Robinson started the presentation with a prayer.

Karin Hunter, President of the Springbank Community Association, spoke about the comparisons of McLean Creek to TriRivers to Springbank (SR1) and about all the damages from a flood that will be left behind on the Springbank land which will be irreparable and result in potential health problems, and loss of revenue from taxation, among a number of other problems.

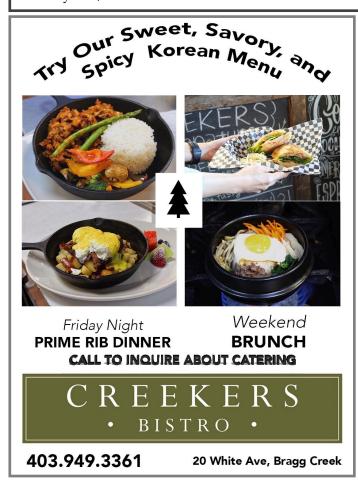
Dr. Dave Klepacki gave an in-depth presentation about the pros and cons of having a dam at McLean Creek (MC1). His presentation was thought provoking. Did you know that originally on the high risk of fires in Alberta, #1 was Slave Lake, #2 was Fort McMurry, #3 was Bragg Creek. We all know what happened to the first two, so that now #1 is Bragg Creek!

Did you know that with climate change we are now moving into an era of drought? This means there's less water flow predicted in the Elbow River, yet the City of Calgary which gets 40% of their drinking water from the Elbow River, is continuing to grow. Maybe the City of Calgary should be more worried about this gap that will occur? Maybe they should support MC1? And TriRivers at the headwaters?

Dr. Emile Gabriel explained the importance of having Elbow River water management at the headwaters of the river. He is the creator and developer of the Tri-River Joint Reservoir of Alberta proposal.

Mary Robinson explained the impact of having the recommended Elbow River flood water intake taking away her riverfront property at her ranch. This will obliterate ¾ of her ranch which has been in her family for 130 years, since 1888.

She owns and operates a first-class equestrian center where she boards and trains about 60 horses, as well as running a large cow-calf operation.

Lastly, Karen Massey showed slides to the SR1 team that they likely never had seen before of the 2013 flood in Redwood Meadows (thanks to Rob Evans, Peggy Rupert, Sharon Pegg) and in Bragg Creek (thanks to Robb and Barbara Teghtmeyer).

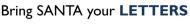
Points were covered about the need for berms, but only to protect our river banks from annual erosion. They did not fully protect us during the big flood, that's why we need upstream protection. We have evidence from a Cenovus research paper describing the catastrophic erosion that occurred on the Elbow River banks, as well as losing hole #7 of our disc golf course which was 100 yards of forest and trails. Another point made was that we were put on emergency notification to stand by for possible evacuation due to the out of control wild fire in Champion Lakes/McLean Creek area on Sunday May 27, 2018. So fire is now a real threat. Another real reason for drought and fire protection. Taking one hour for each round trip of water bombers going to Ghost Dam was too inefficient.

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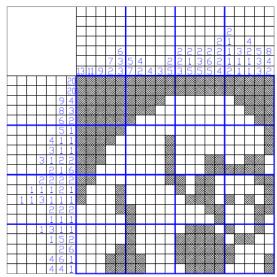
