A MESSAGE FROM REDWOOD MEADOWS MAYOR & COUNCIL

*B*y the look of things outside I'm tempted on wishing everyone 'Happy Holidays' – but somehow that seems wrong in October. Hope everyone is keeping warm and safe.

The Townsite office and community spaces are still open by appointment only, except for approved organized events such as Taekwondo. Townsite is focused on ensuring winter outdoor recreation and associated amenities are ready to help keep everyone safe and active in the coming months. This includes rink preparation and grooming both x-country and fat bike trails. Townsite is working on having the fire pit going and concession by the rink open more regularly on Saturdays to promote community engagement, so if you see the fire going feel free to drop by for a hot chocolate and snack!

There are several highlights from October, including:

- ♦ The inaugural Chili Cook-off was a big hit with many attending to view the vendor displays and sample the chili cook-off between RMCA and RMES. Special thanks to Councillor Perkins, Jennifer Illescas, RMCA and RMES.
- ♦ Our new Disc Golf course is getting a lot of attention, including from The Professional Disc Golf Association League who held a tournament Oct 24. The League has already raised \$600.00 for the Redwood Meadows Disc Golf Course Development Fund. Come check it out!
- ♦ The new fire hall sign was installed and looks great!

Road repairs from work on water distribution lines will now need to wait until the snow melts – thank you for your patience.

Of course, the biggest news is that we have a lease vote date!! Redwood Meadows Council and Tsuut'ina Chief and Council have both approved an agreement "in principle" for lease renewal in Redwood Meadows to extend the lease to 2095. Tsuut'ina citizens will have their vote December 10 and Redwood Meadows sublease holders will have our vote **December 11**.

Here's what you need to know:

- ♦ Lease Information Sessions (virtual and in-person) will be held each week starting October 28. See your leaseholder communication email or Townsite website for information on how to register.
- ♦ Formal lease packages, including financial renewal costs specific to your lot, will be sent by registered priority mail to leaseholders October 30.
- ♦ Weekly emails with key information facts regarding the lease will begin the week of October 26.
- ♦ Each leasehold must formally delegate one (1) voter per leasehold to vote. To date, 226 of 351 have completed the process. You must delegate a voter to be eligible to vote. If you have not completed your voter delegation package, contact the Townsite office immediately.
- ♦ Ballots will be sent out to those who have indicated they wish to vote by mail-in ballot. In person voting will be at Redwood House from 8am – 8pm on December 11.

TAKE NOTICE that a General Polling station will be held to conduct a Lease Ratification Vote on December 11, 2020 to determine if the Delegated Sublease Voters wish to ratify the proposed Lease Agreements for the Townsite of Redwood Meadows.

The following question will be asked of the Delegated Sublease Voters by ballot:

Do you approve the proposed Lease Agreements, as defined in the Redwood Meadows Lease Ratification Process?

General Polling Station hours will be from 8:00 am to 8:00 pm at Redwood House, 1 Manyhorses Drive, Redwood Meadows, Alberta T3Z 1A4 on December 11, 2020.

PLEASE NOTE that one (1) Sublease Holder per sublease must be delegated and registered to vote by December 11, 2020 to participate in the Lease Ratification Vote.

REDWOOD MEADOWS EMERGENCY SERVICES

With daylight saving time ending, it's a great time to check your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms.

- Test your smoke and CO alarms monthly.
- Ensure everyone in the house knows what the alarms sound like and what to do when they hear it.
- Change the batteries every six months.
- Follow manual instructions for cleaning and maintaining the alarms.



What To Do If the Alarm Sounds

1. Have an escape plan. Discuss and practice it.
2. Always feel the door to see if it is hot before opening it to escape. If the doorknob is hot, don't use that exit. Use an alternate exit.
3. Crawl on the floor. Smoke rises, so does the temperature. If you crawl on the floor, there will be less smoke and heat from the fire.
4. Meet family members at a pre-arranged spot outside the home.
5. Call 9-1-1 from a neighbour's home.
6. Never go inside (or return to) a burning building for any reason.

You can protect your family from fires! Here's a checklist to reduce the chances a fire may start in your home:

- Keep your furnace in good working order;
- Use a fireplace screen;
- Have proper ventilation for heaters and small appliances;
- Don't smoke in bed;
- Close bedroom doors overnight;
- Don't use worn out electrical wiring or run it under rugs or out windows or doors; and
- Clear away clutter!

Executive Committee

The purpose of the Executive Committee is to fulfill obligations including financial stability, good governance, transparency, strategic planning, and Board performance review. The Executive Committee is composed of the President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

Wow, autumn went away really fast and that snow showed up pretty darn quickly!

Did you know that your Community Centre is over 20 years old? In human years, that's peak performance. In a building – not so much. We have experienced some problems with our HVAC systems recently and as I type this, there is a lot of snow outside and we worry about the winter that is coming. We know that the Centre doesn't have the emergency reserves it needs to repair or replace our heating systems after the expensive repairs from the gym flood and the overwhelming revenue losses for the Centre due to Covid-19. Our revenues are down, our fundraising is limited and our expenses are rising due to the age of our building. In short, we need your help.

PICAPIX PUZZLE

A picture will evolve as you complete the puzzle. Start with the largest numbers or combination of, colour in squares and proceed to work back and forth between columns and rows.

The three basic rules are:

1. Numbers represent how many squares you colour in to form a group or block.
2. Leave at least one square between these blocks.
3. The sequential order of the numbers is the order of the blocks, i.e., top number for a column is the top, block, and left-most number for a row is the left-most block.

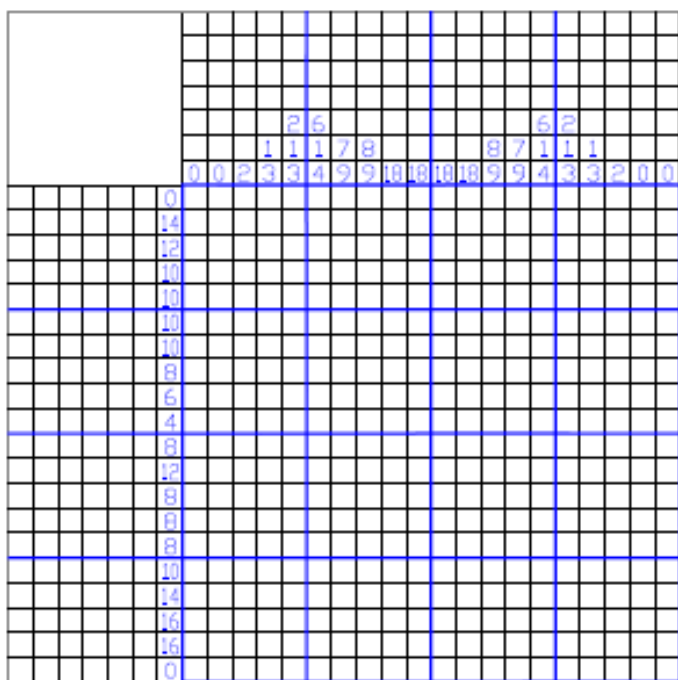
The “logic count method” shown below is very useful: The clue at the left of the row is 6, so count 6 squares from the left to right and then count 6 squares from right to left. Confidently shade in the overlapping squares.

This same method can be applied even when there is more than one number, remembering to allow one empty square between groups or blocks. Use a second colour for elimination of background squares.

SNOW STORM POSTPONES REDWOOD'S DISC GOLF CLINIC

Luckily local youth writer Matthew Cowen was still able to interview Frisbee Rob, a Frisbee World Record Holder and Disc Golf enthusiast.

Matthew: My first question to Rob was what he thought the links between Frisbee and Disc Golf are?

Rob: Frisbee is like Swimming or Track and Field, it has multiple disciplines, one of them being Disc Golf. There's also Ultimate Frisbee and Double Disc Court but there's many more.

What got you into the sport?

I was Athlete of the Year in Grade 12, but I didn't start playing frisbee until after High School when I bought a Frisbee to stay in shape. There was no Youtube or anything like that to teach me how to throw, so I taught myself, and now Frisbee is what I do full time!

What did you do to become a world record holder?

You have to know what records are out there, you can't just attempt it randomly. There's lots of planning that goes into the events, and there has to be a full crew there, making sure you follow the guidelines. I just want to push my limits and inspire others to do the same. I also get to meet some previous record-holders.

How does it feel to become a World Champion?

It feels really cool. I have thirteen World Championships in lots of different disciplines, my favourite being self-caught flight. I have five of those in a row which is really cool because every time you have to face different competitors, in different places and in different circumstances. The best thing about winning a Championship is that no one can take it away from you, unlike World Records. I love how I can handle the pressure of these events and try my best to win.

Do you play any other sports?

I made the decision a while ago that I just wanted to focus on Frisbee. The nice thing about Frisbee is that there are so many disciplines and sub-sports that if you get bored you can switch to a different kind of Frisbee. In the winter, I play Frisbee on Ice, and in the Summer I play Ultimate Frisbee or Disc Golf.

Redwood has an ice rink, would you ever be able to come here and do Frisbee on Ice?

Unfortunately, the rink at Redwood isn't big enough for me to do my long throw, my record is over 100 yards which I did on a frozen lake in Edmonton. There are age division records, so I've been trying to find kids under eighteen that want to go after the records, I would love to find some Redwood kids that would like to have a go. **Contact Frisbee Rob if you are under eighteen and want to break some records on the ice!** www.frisbeerob.com

What have you achieved in Disc Golf?

My best achievement is World Overall Disc Golf title. This summer I played ten tournaments and I won one. Disc Golf is more something I do for fun. I love Disc Golf and I promote it, but Frisbee is my passion.

NATURE CORNER—THE REDWOOD MEADOWS “REDWOODS”

When I first moved to Redwood Meadows, I was curious about the name. Whenever I think of redwoods, I imagine grand sequoias (*Sequoia sempervirens*) towering above the earth and dwarfing every other living thing in their presence. Sequoias are commonly referred to as coastal or California redwoods and I think it is not only me who visualizes these giant beauties when hearing the word *redwood*. Sequoias have a small range however, mostly on the coast in California, and are definitely not present in our woods. So, where then did Redwood Meadows derive its name?

The most likely answer came to me while walking along the river the first winter I lived here. Against the white backdrop of cloudy skies and the snow-covered ground, the bright red branches on the bushes all around me were striking in color. *Aah*, I thought to myself, *these must be the so-called redwoods that give Redwood Meadows its name*. After a quick look around, I observed that these red-branched bushes dominated the shrubby species so naturally I raced home to identify it as red osier dogwood (*Cornus sericea*).

Now, you may have noticed that all red osier dogwood bark is not the same: some is stunningly bright red, some is dull red, and other branches may appear brown or gray in color. It turns out only new growth is bright and the color fades after that. This is common for most brightly barked shrubs and is not unique to dogwoods. In summer, red osier dogwood can be identified by dark green oval-shaped leaves, white flower clusters, and bluish white round berries.

Do you ever wonder why we have so many deer in our neighbourhood in winter? Red osier dogwood is one reason. In winter, deer rely on this species' twigs and winter buds as a food source as do moose and elk. In fact, some animals consume so much of it that they have red-tinged urine. In summer, grizzly and black bears, as well as many bird species, eat the berries. While some Indigenous tribes know how to prepare these berries to make them edible, they are generally bitter and can cause vomiting in humans if eaten in large quantities. I'll personally leave those berries for the bears, thank you very much!

Discover Something Unexpected

TIPS FROM THE TRAIL—TRAIL RUNNING

I've always been built more like a rhinoceros than a gazelle, but around my late 20's I got hooked on trail running while living in Colorado. I had always loved backpacking and skiing, but hated plodding down a sidewalk or shoulder with traffic whizzing by on my left. Trail running changed all that, and now I'm in my third year of discovering the trail systems in and around Redwood Meadows. I can't believe what we get to take advantage of in our own backyards, and with the fat bike craze, I'm noticing trail systems stay groomed throughout the winter so I don't have to sweat puddles in my basement jumping around to P-90X or some other nonsense. So readers, stay out on the trails this winter, and if you need any extra cardiovascular training, run with a mask on.

A couple of safety tips based on my trail running experience over the years (I am neither a doctor or trainer, nor have I played either on TV):

- ♦ I don't understand why people put their bear spray away for the winter. There are plenty of non-bear things out in the woods in January that can seriously mess you up. Plus it's hard to make a lot of noise when you're running, so the spray is a last line of defense if I spook something.
- ♦ If you are out of cell range (or even in a small cell hole, which is very common in the trees), you could wait a long time for help if you break your leg or fall off the trail. I now go out with a SPOT unit and signal my wife every hour on the hour.
- ♦ Running vests/packs are awesome. I used to either go two hours without a drop of water, or bounce around with a daypack jiggling on my already-jiggly frame. Find a vest with sufficient space for a bottle of water, snack, light jacket, toilet paper, gaiters (these make a huge difference if you are in scree or ankle-deep snow), and SPOT unit (if out of cell range).
- ♦ I'm undecided on running spikes. They certainly would have helped when I've gone flying off an icy trail, but at times I feel like they throw off my gait and hurt my feet. For now I just choose to run like a penguin over the sketchy sections.

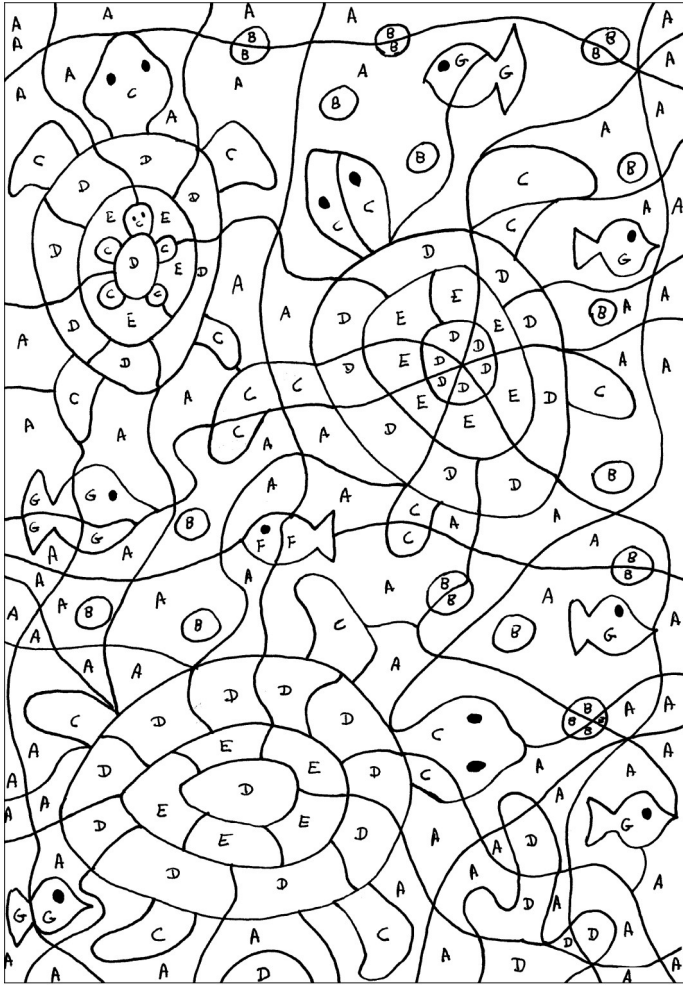

Make A Poppy With Finger Print Art

“Some of my favorite projects are for children,” says McClay, who has built all manner of pint-sized furniture, including personalized toy boxes. “I recently built a ‘mud’ kitchen for the young son of a neighbour, and it was a big hit for him and his friends this past summer.” That’s the joy of the whole venture—creating pieces that will be well used and loved.

Projects can be designed from a description or sketch, but most commissioned pieces start with a few concept pictures typically found on trendy websites like Pinterest, Wayfair or Etsy. Specific dimensions and finish preference help to finalize the design. Often, features from two or more photos are incorporated into the final design to create a very special personalized custom piece. A no-obligation quote is provided along with a schedule for completion.

“I have found the work itself to be very gratifying,” affirms McClay. “I am also so appreciative of the local support I’ve received both from local businesses and from our amazing community.” You may have seen various handcrafted Creekhouseshop pieces in homes throughout the community. TEN QUICK FACTS ON REMEMBRANCE DAY

1. Remembrance Day was first observed in 1919 throughout the British Commonwealth. It was originally called “Armistice Day” to commemorate armistice agreement that ended the First World War on Monday, November 11, 1918, at 11 a.m.—on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month.
2. From 1921 to 1930, Armistice Day was held on the Monday of the week in which November 11 fell. In 1931, Alan Neill, Member of Parliament for Comox–Alberni, introduced a bill to observe Armistice Day only on November 11. Passed by the House of Commons, the bill also changed the name to “Remembrance Day.” The first Remembrance Day was observed on November 11, 1931.
3. Every year on November 11, Canadians pause in a moment of silence to honour and remember the men and women who have served, and continue to serve Canada during times of war, conflict and peace. We remember the more than 2,300,000 Canadians who have served throughout our nation’s history and the more than 118,000 who made the ultimate sacrifice.
4. The poppy is the symbol of Remembrance Day. Replica poppies are sold by the Royal Canadian Legion to provide assistance to Veterans. Find out how to make a donation at legion.ca.
5. Remembrance Day is a federal statutory holiday in Canada. It is also a statutory holiday in three territories (Yukon, Northwest Territories and Nunavut) and in six provinces (British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland and Labrador).
6. The national ceremony is held at the National War Memorial in Ottawa. The Governor General of Canada presides over the ceremony. It is also attended by the Prime Minister, other government officials, representatives of Veterans’ organizations, diplomatic representatives, other dignitaries, Veterans as well as the general public.
7. In advance of the ceremony, long columns of Veterans, Canadian Armed Forces members, RCMP officers, and cadets march to the memorial lead by a pipe band and a colour guard. At the end of the ceremony, they march away to officially close the ceremony.
8. Some of the 54 Commonwealth member states, such as Canada, the United Kingdom and Australia, observe the tradition of Remembrance Day on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. Other nations observe a solemn day but at different dates. For example, ANZAC Day is observed in New Zealand on April 25. In South Africa, Poppy Day is marked on the Sunday that falls closest to November 11.
9. Many nations that are not members of the Commonwealth also observe Remembrance Day on November 11, including France, Belgium and Poland.
10. The United States used to commemorate Armistice Day on November 11. However, in 1954 they changed the name to Veterans Day.

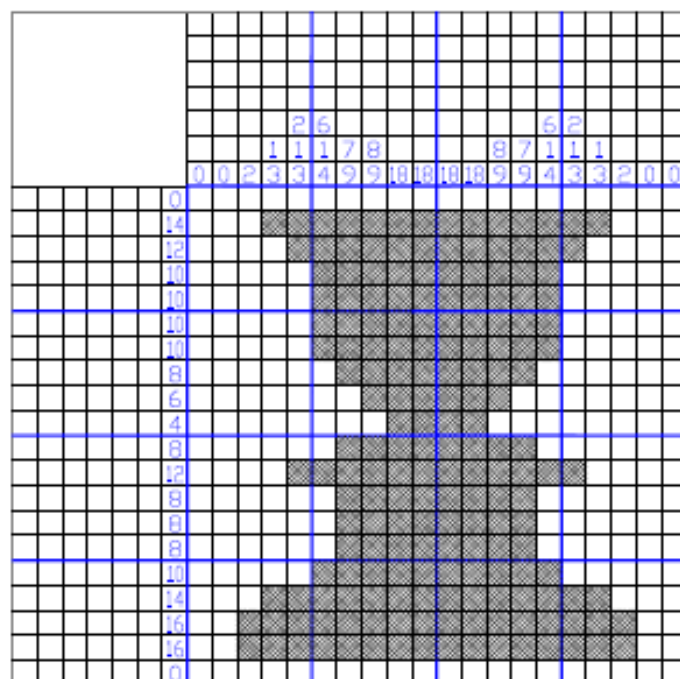
