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ORGANISATIONAL PROFILE

[Restorative Justice for All \(RJ4All\)](#) is an international institute with a mission to advance community cohesion and human rights locally, nationally and internationally. We are founded upon the restorative justice values of power sharing, fairness, equality, dignity and respect.

We redistribute power in a more equal way by delivering social justice projects, educational programmes and high-quality volunteering opportunities to the most marginalised groups of society. We are the managers of the Rotherhithe Community Centre, delivering community services to London's most marginalised communities including educational workshops, sports and environment, health and mental health as well as a community library.



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RJ4All is the leading Europe-wide restorative justice network with members from over 40 countries, as is a member of [a number of international and national alliances and campaigns](#). Our institute is a registered Vocational, Educational and Training (VET) provider, which follows [The European Credit System for Vocational Education and Training \(ECVET\)](#). We are also a Continuous Professional Development (CPD) accrediting body meaning that we can certify with CPD status training programmes, face-to-face and [e-courses](#).

We achieve our charitable aims by:

- Carrying out educational projects and information campaigns in the interest of children and young people, communities, victims and marginalised groups at the local, national and international levels.
- Providing internships to young people, those at risk of being affected by crime and marginalised groups as well as high quality volunteering opportunities involving social action
- Bringing harmed parties together (directly or indirectly) through restorative justice to negotiate solutions and restore the harm that they experienced
- Increasing public awareness of restorative justice, human rights and inter-cultural dialogue.
- Carrying out evaluations and research on restorative justice, criminal justice, human rights and equality programmes
- Building bridges between grass communities and the powerful, as well as acting as learning network between practitioners, researchers, policy makers and users of the justice system
- Increasing knowledge and pushing the boundaries of restorative justice especially in contested areas of practice (e.g. domestic violence, sexual abuse and hate crimes).
- Making restorative justice more accessible to young people, junior researchers, students, practitioners, policy makers, the public and the media.
- Influence international, regional and local policy, legislation and practice.
- Providing expert, tailored and independent advice on restorative justice, human rights, equality and criminal justice.

RJ4All is governed by a Board of non-executive directors with expertise from criminal justice and user service delivery, front-line work with marginalised groups, campaigning, academia and research (<https://www.rj4all.info/our-team>)

RJ4All is run by its Founder and Director, [Professor. Dr. Theo Gavrielides](#), an international expert in user-led research methods and social policy especially in the areas of youth, restorative justice, criminal justice and human rights. The Director is supported by an operations' team of international experts (<https://www.rj4all.info/RJ4all-team>)

RJ4All hosts at least 5 part-time interns on a monthly basis and engages at least 200 volunteers annually. RJ4All has received the Quality Label (receiving and sending) for the European Solidarity Corps and works in close collaboration with EURODESK UK.



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We are also supported by an independent [Academic and Editorial Board](#). Their membership includes some of the most prominent academics, researchers and practitioners in the areas that we cover. Within this Board, there is an Ethics Committee that reviews Ethics Applications when vulnerable individuals are involved in our work.

Working for more than 10 years in the area of equality, community cohesion, youth and justice, we have developed numerous strong partnerships with civil society, statutory and non-statutory organizations, locally, nationally and internationally. Acting as a national and European network, we share expertise and best practice among our users, partners and networks. As a membership organization, RJ4All has over 3000 registered individuals and organisations from across the UK, Europe and overseas. We communicate with our members on a bimonthly basis via e-newsletters and blogs that are written by them and the RJ4All team. RJ4All also hosts the youth-led [FRED campaign](#) which is a pan-European initiative aiming to promote the values of Freedom Respect Equality and Dignity.

Putting emphasis on the quality of our services, we are dedicated to measuring our impact on our users and the wider society. Exploiting the Theory of Change and using user-led evaluation methods, we produce high quality evidence-based outcomes that allow us to review our work and improve our approaches.

RJ4All also runs an independent, publishing arm. [RJ4All Publications](#) is an impactful publisher specialising in social sciences and the publication of cutting-edge research. We have published books on youth and justice, hate crime, human rights, gender equality, domestic violence and many more. RJ4All Publications is also the publisher of the leading international, peer reviewed [Internet Journal of Restorative Justice \(IJRJ\)](#) and the [Youth Voice Journal \(YVJ\)](#). We work with our distributors (e.g. EBSCO, British Library) to disseminate our publications to over 200,000 institutions from around the world.

KEY ACTIVITIES

As a user-led international institute, RJ4All aims to empower communities via education, and help disseminate power through the implementation of restorative justice values and practices including inter-cultural dialogue, internships, training, volunteering, workshops, and the holding of mediation, family group conferencing and circles.

We run the Rotherhithe Community Centre where local community projects and services are provided to marginalised groups including a Community Library and a Food Bank.

RJ4All has long expertise in designing and delivering projects with international impact as well as providing high quality volunteering placements from across Europe. RJ4All is well familiar with EC funded projects such as REC, Horizon and Erasmus+ especially in coordinating KA2 projects.



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One of our key aims is to increase cultural awareness especially amongst children and young people, breaking in this way the barriers that lead to division and community tensions. To this end, we hold community-led projects focusing on integration and community cohesion. Founded upon the FREDA values of Fairness, Respect, Equality, Dignity and Autonomy, RJ4All creates partnerships with local, national and international frontline, like minded organisations to instil and implement FREDA, while also leading on the evaluation and wider dissemination of project results.

On a monthly basis, we offer more than 30 volunteering opportunities and over 5 part-time internships to young people. These are structured placements that aim increase their skills and confidence levels while mitigating the risks that are facing being of being unemployed and further marginalised. We have the Quality Label for European Solidarity Corps (ESC) and abide by the ESC Charter.

RJ4All is currently the coordinator of several Erasmus KA2 projects, forming strategic partnerships in the fields of school education, youth, adult education and vocational training.

For example, [The Restoring Respect Project](#) aims to support innovation in the VET field by creating, piloting and disseminating an interactive platform and a mobile phone application tailored to the needs of migrant and refugee communities. [Chance for Change](#) aims to develop innovative, youth-led educational methods and tools to help address the root causes that lead to gender-based violence, as it impacts on young people. The [Mental Health Matters](#) project KA204 aims to enhance the skills, knowledge and experience of professionals through the use of art and restorative justice values.

RJ4All is also a partner in several REC projects covering [intersex equality](#) and [Sexual Harassment in Gaming](#).

Furthermore, RJ4All was the first organisation in the UK to start an ESC Solidarity Project! See for example our [Sailing the Mayflower to Equality & Justice](#) and our youth-led [FRED campaign!](#)

We also run a youth-led COVID19 emergency relief project. It is titled [“You are not Alone”](#) and it aims to provide mental health support to vulnerable young people as well as free food and protection equipment.

Other examples include our award-winning [Culture & Art for Unity \(CA4U\)](#), which was a children-led, community cohesion project in London. It aimed to provide educational and recreational activities to marginalised children it received the first award by the Mayor of London’s Culture Seeds. Another example is our multi-year project [“Violent Radicalisation, Restorative Justice and Human Rights”](#) as well as the Southwark Council funded [“My Voice-My Future”](#) youth-led project.



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They both aim to increase the capacity and resilience of young people and youth workers in preventing and avoiding group violence and violent youth radicalisation.

We also use sports to bring different communities together and one example is our [Watersports Youth Matters](#) project, funded by the Mayor of London as a youth-led initiative that uses watersports to divert young people from harm, while providing them with opportunities for cultural dialogue. We also run [the Sailing to Cohesion](#) with the support of the London Marathon Charitable Trust and London Sport. It brings together able and disabled young people together to sail and learn about what unites them and address disablism. We have also run several [youth clubs](#) tailored for disadvantaged youth.

Finally, we are engaged in a number of environmental projects. For example, we are the Coordinator for the Erasmus GLOCAL project which aims to create awareness about climate change and propose solutions to sustainable living. We are also a partner in the Erasmus RADIAL project which aims to help with the implementation of the sustainable green deal, developed in eco-entrepreneurship focusing on marginalised groups.

KEY PERSONNEL

[Prof. Dr. Theo Gavrielides](#) – RJ4All Founder & Director: He is an international expert in human rights, justice and youth policy and acts as an advisor to the Council of Europe, UN, EC and various governments. He is the Founder of the [IARS International Institute](#), and serves as a Visiting Professor at the University of East London. He is also an Adjunct Professor at Simon Fraser University, a Visiting Professor at Buckinghamshire New University and a Distinguished Policy Fellow at Australian National University. Previously, Professor Gavrielides was the Director of the IARS International Institute, the CEO of Race on the Agenda as well as the Human Rights Advisor of the UK Ministry of Justice. He holds a PhD in Law, a Masters in Human Rights and an LLB. He is the author of many books and peer review articles. He has project managed numerous multiyear programmes funded by the EC, UN, Big Lottery, Comic Relief etc.

Desirée Noriega – Projects Coordinator: She holds an MSc in Political Psychology as well as a BSc in Psychology. She has project managed several Erasmus+ projects, while her passion for human rights and interest in understanding the complexities of human behaviour have taken her to work and volunteer for several hospitals and schools as well as governmental and non-profit organisations internationally.

Marta Sort Creus – Youth Engagement Coordinator: Marta holds a MA in Global Ethics and Human Values, as well as a MA in Education and a BA in Philosophy. Marta has experience working in schools with children and young people, and she has volunteered for several



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international non-governmental organisations that advocate for migrants' and workers' rights.

Rita Seneca – ICT and ecourse expert: After 15 years of activity in ITC, Rita led on the comms and dissemination activities of over 100 projects (Erasmus+, REC, Equal etc) for RJ4All and various other organisations. She also has specific technical skills that include the adaptation of websites stylesheets and CMS, development and maintenance of e-learning platforms.

Yusuf Patel MBE – Radicalisation Prevent Officer: He holds an MSc in Countering Organised Crime and Terrorism as well as a BSc in Criminology and Sociology. He has extensive experience in community cohesion, interfaith relations, counter extremism, counter terrorism and radicalisation. His work has included working with governmental, civil society organisations and sitting as a Governor for two schools in London.

Thandiwe Mncina - Research Officer: She holds an MA in criminology and has volunteered at Humanitas. She has worked with youngsters who have a hard time dealing with family issues, dealing with personal problems or having a hard time adjusting in society.

Juozas Kelecius – Project Officer: Expert on criminal justice projects. He built his casework experience when working as Family Engagement Worker, later as a Case Manager in a number of Visitors' Centres in prisons. Juozas has worked with prisoners and their children as well as carers and other relatives giving them appropriate advice, guidance, learning opportunities, care and support, and helping them to improve, sustain or develop relationships with each other.

Joshua Eden – Project Officer: Joshua Eden holds a BA in Anthropology from and an MSc in Criminal Justice Policy. His research interests span from drug policy, public opinion on crime and criminal justice, and restorative justice. Joshua has worked in management in NHS primary care and has volunteered for a number of criminal justice-oriented charities.

Dr. Gunjan Sharma – Project Specialist: She is a junior doctor working in Psychiatry in South London specialising in mental health and Forensic Psychiatry. She received her medical degree from Cardiff University in 2017 and spent the next two years working in a district general hospital. She has experience of working on youth project. She has dealt with topics including suicidal ideation and attempts, self-harm, relationship difficulties, domestic violence, exam stress and bereavement.
