Message from Our <u>NEW</u> Chair of Council

While visiting the beautiful country of Scotland, home of my ancestors, I had the opportunity to visit Iona. Iona is a small island in the Inner Hebrides on the western coast of Scotland. It was a centre of Gaelic monasticism for four centuries and is today renowned for its tranquility and natural beauty. I enjoy reading material published by the Iona Community as they work for peace and social justice, the rebuilding of community and the renewal of worship. I would like to share some ideas from one of their articles called "Making the Most of Advent" in the hope that you might find some of it useful in your own Christmas celebrations.

- Celebrate St. Nicholas' Day (December 6th). St. Nicholas was a bishop in Turkey in the 4th century AD. He is the patron saint of children. He anonymously gave bags of gold to the poor. In many homes there is a tradition to have St. Nicholas mysteriously deliver a bag of golden chocolate coins to each child on the night of December 5th. If you don't have children in your home, treat yourself to a bag of golden chocolate coins anyway. Remember the story of St. Nicholas and consider who in your community you could reach out to in unexpected, but much needed ways.
- If you have friends or family who are far away this Christmas consider sending them a tea bag or a packet of hot

- chocolate in their Christmas card. Ask them to take time out on Christmas day to make a cup of tea with the promise that at the same time you will do the same. You may not be able to be together but you can share a cup of tea together while connecting by phone or email.
- Almost all of us miss someone at Christmas. Accept the losses or the distances between you. Light a candle for those you miss, or drink a toast. Sit with your memories and welcome them as a part of the Christmas experience.
- Christmas comes with a lot of expectations about happy families and coziness. Sometimes, real Christmases just don't meet the expectations of popular culture. Be as gentle with yourself as it is possible to be, and be realistic about what you can and can't expect to get out of Christmas.
- Join us for the <u>Quiet Christmas</u> Service on <u>Thursday</u>, <u>December 18th</u>, at 7:00 p.m. as Rev. Neil, Rob, and the Sanctuary Choir share with us, a very quiet, devotional and prayerful service of reflection and Worship during this Very Holy, but for some, difficult season of the year. Light refreshments follow in Gardiner Hall, and are being provided by our Congregational Care Committee.

On behalf of Erindale Church Council and myself, have a Blessed Advent Season as we await the birth of the Christ Child.

Five Oaks Women's Retreat

Seven women from Erindale attended the Fall Retreat, sponsored by Hamilton Conference UCW, at Five Oaks Centre on October 24/25. The 24 hours of the retreat were divided into four sessions, interspersed with worship, singing, meals, book review, and a short movie.

The theme was 'Love in Action' and Rev. Dr. Diane Walker was the facilitator for the sessions. She used '12 keys for Effective Living' by Dr. Kennon Callahan as her inspiration.

Each session covered several of the twelve topics: - Have a Mission, Show Compassion, Nourish Hope, Build Community, Exercise Leadership, Live Simply, Embrace Joy, Access Wisdom, Give and Receive Encouragement, Develop Creativity, Seek Wellness, Be Generous - and ended with Rev. Walker posing some questions for us to ponder and discuss. These sessions were not only thought provoking but also entertaining as Rev. Walker drew on many instances in her ministry and family life to illustrate points.

Mealtimes provided time for us to enjoy each other's company, meet up with old friends, and make new acquaintances from across the Hamilton Conference area which stretches from the Bruce Peninsula to Niagara and the Lake Erie shore.

Our spiritual needs were satisfied with Vespers and Morning Watch worship times led by members of Conference UCW Executive, and closing Communion conducted by Rev. Dr. Walker.

All seven of us enjoyed our time at Five Oaks and look forward to next year's Retreat. Perhaps some other women from the congregation will join us.

2014 Christmas Basket <u>Program</u>

"The Christmas Basket program is back, but with a few tweaks this year...... most importantly, we'll be supporting families in our community not only through The Open Door, but also through the Deacon's Cupboard. This is a very exciting way to broaden our reach in the community.

The Open Door program will operate slightly differently this year. Due to an increasing focus on privacy concerns, baskets will be delivered to the Open Door for distribution instead of directly to the families. We have a number of anonymous family profiles with family composition, number and ages of children, etc. available for sponsorship. While this won't provide the intimate family connection that you have received in the past from delivery the basket directly, the program is no less impactful for the families who receive the baskets, so do not let this change in process impact your consideration of the program this year. The other avenue we're pursuing with the Open Door this year is to sponsor individuals to attend their Christmas dinner - the cost is \$10/person and the event is a wonderful, festive dinner complete with gifts for all attendees, followed by an impromptu Nativity play - a great way to spread the gift of Christmas with the less fortunate in our community. Tax receipts will be available for all donations of \$10 or more.

We will have family profiles from the Deacon's Cupboard and this part of the program will operate as in years past with the Erindale sponsoring a family and delivering the gift basket directly to the receiving family. As we do every year, we would ask that you seriously consider supporting a less fortunate family in our community this year through our Christmas Basket

Celebrating Advent at Home

"Advent" literally means "coming." Beginning four Sundays before Christmas, the season of Advent moves us toward Bethlehem as we anticipate the coming of Jesus. We remember the prophets who pointed the way. We journey along with Mary and Joseph, shepherds and sheep, angels and wise ones hoping to find the baby who is the sign of God with us.

- Mary learns about the birth of her son. (Luke 1:26–38)
- Mary visits with her cousin Elizabeth. (Luke 1:5–25, 39–80)
- Mary and Joseph go to Bethlehem. (Luke 2:1–7)

Where are you in the story, or what part is about you? What is your favourite part of this season's celebrations? What you would bring to the baby Jesus?

The Advent season, with its traditions and rituals, gives us the opportunity to enrich our family life and our family's spiritual life. Here are some ideas your family or congregation may want to incorporate into your Advent celebration.

Make an Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath is a circle, which symbolizes the eternal because a circle has no ending and no beginning. It is made of evergreens, a symbol of eternal life. The candles around the wreath represent Jesus, the Light of the World.

Your family can use the litanies in Advent Candle Litanies (www.united-

church.ca/files/planning/seasons/advent_candle.rtf) as you light the candles on your wreath each week of Advent.

Sing Carols

St. Augustine said, "When we sing, we pray twice." Advent is a season of song. Use family mealtimes to listen to or sing Christmas carols.

Pick-a-Card Prayer Time

One of my favourite Christmas traditions is to put all the Christmas cards we receive into a basket on the dining-room table after we've read them.

After Christmas, when life is less rushed, we pull one card each day and take the time to truly cherish it and the message from its sender. Then we say a prayer of thanks for the person or family who sent the card. It is a way to truly cherish the gift of being remembered.

Christmas Stories

Each year, give your family a Christmas storybook to be read together on Christmas Day. If you are able, you might also consider giving a copy of the book to your church's library so others might enjoy the book. Here are some books to consider:

- Three Wise Women by Mary Hoffman (Frances Lincoln, 2002)

Gift Giving

In some families each person receives three gifts, a reminder of the three gifts the wise ones brought to Jesus. Consider giving three gifts to an agency in your community that helps people in need.

Rethinking Gifting

As a family, rethink gifting. Instead of asking, "What do you want for Christmas?" ask, "What do you want to give for Christmas?"

Or, consider "When I get something, I give something." Every time you receive a gift or buy something, you give something you already own away.
