

From the Desk of Don Parsons

Last week I received an email from a friend with "Some very sad news" in the subject line. It was one of those notes that takes your breath away. A relatively young, very active member of one of the congregations I have been privileged to serve, had suffered a large brain aneurism on Tuesday afternoon, and the prognosis was not good.

It just did not seem possible. The evening before she had been laughing with friends at a church gathering, and then in a matter of hours was on life-support in a major Toronto trauma centre. The church choir in which she sang, the staff with whom she volunteered, the Congregational Care Committee she coordinated, her beloved church family -- all were bewildered and struggling with grief. Sometimes "the valley of the shadow" is profoundly dark and heavy.

That seemed particularly true when the doctors gently informed the family that there was nothing further they could do. Once again I was sobered and saddened as I was confronted with the fragility and uncertainty of life. The petty concerns that I sometimes allow to consume my day were now justifiably jettisoned by the lifeand-death trauma faced by my friend and her family.

Sometimes we wonder where God is, when devastating things happen to good people. I have wondered that myself at times. And yet there is something in me that believes that when these horrendous challenges shatter our lives, God's heart is the first of all our hearts to break. God does not will sadness upon us. I believe that God grieves with us, and is in the very centre of life with us.

When we are called to face such trauma in our lives, let us place ourselves and those we love in God's holy, healing love. And let us, as best we can, hold onto what our creed affirms, that "In life, in death, in life beyond death, God is with us. We are not alone."

UCW News

All women of the church are welcome to become part of UCW. There are two units which meet on the third Tuesday each month in the McGill Room for fellowship, refreshments, and a program. Mary and Martha Circle meets at 1.15 (leader Dianne Drennan) and Friends in Faith meet at 7.30 (leader Ruth Nott). Details are printed in the bulletin prior to the meeting day.

Fellowship of the Least Coin. Sunday, October 23 will be the gathering for returning collection cans or making a donation. This international movement began in the 1950s with the idea that the least coin of one's country be put aside each day following prayer for world peace. We collect these monies on behalf of the Women's Interchurch Council of Canada which in turn sends the proceeds on to the International Committee of FLC. This Committee meets each November to prayerfully make grants to women's groups around the world.

There will be a basket in the narthex for donations. A year of our least denomination (5 cents) is \$18.25 but any amount is welcome. Envelopes will be provided for donations of \$20 or more - simply write on your church givings number to receive credit to your annual tax receipt.

UCW has decided to discontinue the sale of **MacMillan** products this year. However, if there is an item you have had in the past and especially wish to have again, please let Dianne Drennan know and we will try to accommodate you.

Cranberry Apple Crisps and United Church Calendars will be on sale later in the fall.

The Annual Frosty Festive Fare Bake Sale will take place after worship on Sunday,


