# U3A Bridge – A Guide to Playing On Line

In the current situation bridge players may wish to play on line but are unsure how to do it. This short guide outlines how to set up a table for four players and play on line.

There are a number of on line bridge sites, some free and some chargeable. This guide describes using the free site Bridge Base Online (BBO) – probably the largest site across the world. Users can go to the site as individuals and join a table but I would not recommend this as the experience can be difficult and at times unpleasant. You can finish up playing with partners and opponents from different countries and of widely different standards; players often get fed up and leave in the middle of a hand to be replaced by someone new.

This guide therefore describes setting up a table for four players which means that you must agree beforehand what time you are going to play and all four must logon to the site for that time. One player must agree to setup and manage the table as described below.

The example screens are for a Windows browser, screens for tablets will be different but the processes are the same.

Apps for IPad, Android and Kindle tablets are available from the appropriate app store and are the best interface for these devices

#### Joining BBO

1. BBO can be accessed at https:/bridgebase.com – the following page will display (you may on some browsers get messages asking to 'Allow Flash' – just confirm OK




2. Click on 'Become a Member (free) and fill in the displayed form:



- 3. Select a username for yourself can be anything as long as you can remember it, enter into username box
- 4. Enter a password in box and again in confirm password box, take a note of this.
- 5. No other details required, click on agreement box and on Register
- 6. An email will be sent by Bridgebase to confirm your email. You must read this and click on the link provided to complete your registration
- 7. If an email does not arrive check your Spam folder as emails from organisations often arrive there
- 8. It may take a while for your username to be active so you should register some time in advance of playing.
- 9. At the agreed time players should use the logon screen by entering their username and password click on 'Remember Password' and you will not have to enter these details again
- 10. Click on 'Log In'
- 11. If the player designated from your group as the Table Manager has already set up the table you will be taken directly to your seat and can start play when all players seated. If the table is not yet set up just wait and when the table is ready you will be taken to it. In this stage you are waiting in what BBO calls the Lobby.
- 12. The remainder of this guide is for use by the Table Manager in setting up a table

## Setting Up a Table

1. Login to BBO 5 or 10 minutes in advance of your agreed starting time, you will then see the following main BBO screen



2. Click on CASUAL



3. Click on START A TABLE



4. Click on START AN IMP PAIRS TABLE



5. Click on RESERVE SEATS AT YOUR TABLE



6. Enter your player names in their positions and click OK



7. Click on START TABLE - RELAXED GAME



- 8. This is the main play screen. When all players are seated the first hand will be dealt and you can start to bid and play by clicking on bids and cards when it is your turn.
- 9. During play you can type into the 'Chat' box to talk to the rest of the table, to thank partner for their hand or congratulate them on their play useful shorthands are wdp (well done partner), ty (thank you), brb (be right back) if you have to leave temporarily for phone call or comfort break)
- 10. Your score in International Match Points (IMPs) (+ or -) will appear in a window see Appendix for explanation of IMP scoring
- 11. When finished just Logoff

### **Problems**

If someone loses a connection the Table Manager can click on the 'Table' button and reserve their seat again, when they get back in they should be taken to their seat

#### Appendix – IMP Scoring

International Match Points are the most widely used method for scoring large events. When you are playing an IMPs game your score is being compared against the average of 20 or 30 other pairs also playing the same hand on-line. The difference between your score and the 'par' average score is converted to IMPs according to a scale. A few examples will suffice to show how this works.

- 1. You play in 2H and make +1 for +140 par is +110 you gain 1IMP
- 2. Same contract but you go -1 for -50 difference is now -160 you lose 4IMPs
- 3. You play and make 4S for +620, par is +170 so score +450 against par +10IMPs
- 4. Same contract but you go -1 for -100 so score -270 against par so -7IMPs
- 5. You sacrifice in 4S over opponents making 4H are doubled and lose 500, if they are vul you gain 120 for 3IMPs but if they are not vul you lose 80 for -2IMPs

As you can see the scoring rewards making your contract as against making overtricks.

The running score you see will constantly change as more on-line players play hands you have already played so changing the par.
