SIGNING IN AND OUT-- Please follow our policy of checking IN and OUT at the Office when returning to the park or leaving for an extended absence. To check in/out, all you need to do is sign the sheet on the Office counter to let us know. We will try to make the appropriate change of address in our computer system when necessary. Be sure to sign in when you return.

OFFICE HOURS—The Office switched to Seasonal Office Hours as of October 1, 2017. The Seasonal Office hours occur **October-April and are 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM**. The Office <u>will not</u> close for lunch.

DOOR CODES—Door codes were changed for the season on October 1. Contact the Office for the new codes. Doors at the Yacht Club and Auditorium will be unlocked during office hours, but you will need to use your code after hours and on weekends.

AFTER HOURS EMERGENCIES—If you see something that requires immediate attention, (i.e. broken water pipe, red light on the lift station flashing, sewer or electrical issues, etc.) and can be considered an emergency, but it is after hours that the Tropic Isles' Office is open, please call **941-721-8888**. This is the **Tropic** Isles Answering Service for after-hours emergencies. You will be connected to an actual person who will place a call to the Manager or Maintenance person on-call to handle the situation.

INFORMATION FORMS—Please make sure that you have completed an Information Form with all your important information. The Office needs your most current <u>mailing address</u> so that official notices can be mailed to the location you designate when you sign in/out. Please update your Information Form annually if you have changes in your information since last year, so that we can find you if there is an emergency at your home here. It is every resident's responsibility to do so.

OFFICE EMAILS—To contact the office via email go to <u>www.</u> <u>info@tropicisles.net</u>. Make sure the office has your email to be put on the "Email Blast" list to receive important email notices and reminders.

NOTARY SERVICE—If you need a Notary, Barbara Welch and Jodie Lawman in the Office are licensed notaries. The charge for Notary service is \$5.00.

Tropic Isles Emergency Email System ("Email Blast")

For many years, the Co-op has struggled with a quick way to communicate to all Tropic Isles residents. We are pleased to announce that a system has been put into place that will allow the Office and Secretary of the Co-op Board, the ability to instantly communicate with ALL Tropic Isles' residents—Co-op, TIPOA, and TIHOA, separately or all together.

This is how it works:

A database of all known email addresses taken out of the Tropic Isles' directory has been assembled. We have the ability to send messages to all or any segment of Tropic Isles separately. We are using a software program called "Chimp Mail". This program DOES NOT share email addresses with everyone. It DOES NOT allow the recipient to "Reply to all", and it also gives the residents the option to unsubscribe, if desired. Your privacy will thus be protected.

What should you do?

Check the directory to be certain your email address is correct. If a correction is needed or your email address is not in the directory, please see Barb or Jody in the Office if you want to be included on the emergency email list.

We understand that not everyone has an email address, so all messages will also be posted on the park bulletin boards inside the Yacht Club and Auditorium. If you know of a neighbor or friend who does not use email, please try to help keep them informed. This system will NOT replace notices that are legally required to be sent to all residents, but rather used as a quick method to keep as many residents as possible, updated on situations as they occur in the park that may affect them. This system came in very handy during Hurricane Irma, so make sure you get on the list for important information as it happens.



Cook's Corner BREAKFAST LASAGNA

(Serves 8 to 12)




Ingredients:

- 1 bag (30-oz.) frozen Southern Style hash browns or a 32-oz. bag shredded hash browns, thawed
- 3 cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese, divided
- 3 T butter
- 12 oz. thinly sliced Canadian bacon
- 1 ¹/₂ cups chopped onion
- 1 large green bell pepper, chopped
- 1 large yellow or red bell pepper, chopped
- 8 oz. sliced mushrooms
- 2 medium tomatoes, sliced (optional)
- 12 large eggs
- 2 ½ cups milk
- ½ tsp. salt
- ¹/₄ tsp. pepper

Directions:

- 1. Spread the thawed hash browns in a deep 11x14 inch lasagna or roasting pan. Season generously with salt and pepper.
- 2. Sprinkle half of the shredded cheese over the potato layer.
- 3. In a large skillet over medium heat, lightly brown the Canadian bacon slices in 2 T of butter. Set aside.
- 4. In the same skillet, sauté the onion, peppers, and mushrooms until tender. Add another tablespoon of butter.
- 5. Spoon the sautéed vegetable mixture over the cheese layer.
- 6. Top with sliced tomatoes, if using.
- 7. Arrange the slices of Canadian bacon over the vegetables, overlapping if necessary.
- 8. Top with remaining cheese.
- 9. In a medium bowl, whisk the eggs with ½ tsp. salt, ¼ tsp. pepper, and the milk. Pour over the casserole. Using a spatula, gently press all over to soak the layers with the egg mixture. Let stand for 15 minutes.
- 10. Heat oven to 350 degrees and bake for 35-45 minutes until set. Cool slightly before slicing.

Please Wear Your Pool/Hot Tub Bracelets ("Passes")



It is <u>IMPORTANT</u> for **Residents and Guests to <u>wear</u> their bracelets** at the pool/hot tub to avoid any problems. The white glow-in-the-

dark bracelets and the newer blue/green/yellow multicolored bracelets are both acceptable, but they must have the words "POOL PASS" engraved on them.

You will be asked to get your pool bracelets if you come to the pool without them. If you have not yet received your pool bracelets, please check with the Office.

Section VII of our 2014 Rules and Regulations regarding the Pool and Hot Tub/Spa states: <u>7.2 Pool and Hot Tub/Spa Passes</u>

All Residents and their Guests must display Tropic Isles "pool passes" when using the pool and hot tub/spa facilities. Each Resident will be issued 1 "pool pass". Temporary "pool passes" are available at the office for Guests. Residents must sign for the pool passes for their Guests. A proper ID is required to obtain pool passes. A fee may be charged for the replacement of lost "pool passes".

Please Remember To Shower Before Entering The Pool 🔝 🔝

Our 2014 Rules and Regulations state:



The State of Florida requires all persons using a public pool or hot tub/spa to shower immediately before entering the pool and hot tub/spa. (FS 64E- 9.008) No shampoo or soaps are permitted in the pool or hot tub/spa deck area.

Our shower at the pool is tucked behind the palm tree on the west side of the pool near the boat docks. (It is disguised as a palm tree and after a minute or so gives you a nice warm shower to remove any soaps or oils on your skin which keeps the water in the pool and spa cleaner.)

Pool Etiquette

If you enjoy spending time at the pool, please remember these few simple things:



- ALWAYS remember to wear your pool bracelet at the pool.
- ALWAYS shower before entering the pool.
- If you enjoy a beverage on the pool deck, please dispose of your cans or plastic bottles in the receptacles provided for you. Do not put them in the ashtrays. Remember NO GLASS CONTAINERS at the pool.
- If you are a smoker, please smoke in the designated "SMOKE BREAK AREA". Please put out your cigarettes in the ashtrays provided for you and do not use the deck area around the pool as your ashtray.
- Please remember to put down the pool umbrellas when you are through using them and return your noodles to their proper location.
- Use a towel to protect the chairs from sunscreen.
- Children's hours at the pool are 11 AM to 1 PM and 4 PM to 6 PM.

We all want to have an enjoyable experience down at the pool, so let's try and work together to make it that way!

If you currently store a trailer/boat in the boatyard or would like to store one there, you will need to purchase a 2018 Boatyard Parking Sticker for \$150. Boatyard Parking



Stickers are available for purchase in the Office. The OLIVE-GREEN sticker is valid for the entire year, January 1-December 31, 2018. "Reserved" parking is available for an additional \$50. Every trailer in the Boatyard must have a current 2018 sticker placed on the upright arm or tongue of the trailer and be clearly visible. The deadline for purchasing your 2018 Boatyard Sticker is January 10. To avoid paying a late fee of \$25 or having your trailer towed, purchase your 2018 Boatyard Parking Sticker for the coming year before January 10th. The Boatyard has limited storage capacity and is available on a first-come, first-served basis, so get your stickers early.

Rule Of The Month

This is a reminder that the 2014 Rules and Regulations are in effect and being enforced. All residents and their guests are expected to know and abide by these rules. Each month, I will highlight a section of the current Rules and Regulations in the hopes of increasing awareness. If you need of a copy of the 2014 Rules and Regulations, you may pick up a copy at the Office or go to <u>www.tropicisles.net</u> to view or print a copy online. <u>4.2 Landscaping</u>

Any substantial plantings and/or exterior changes must be approved in writing by Management, via the ARC. Lawns and grass areas may not be replaced with shells, rocks, or any other material without the prior written approval of Management.

<u>4.3 Trees</u>

The Association is responsible for the trimming of one palm tree in the front yard of a Unit/Lot. Responsibility for the care of all other trees and plants is the Resident's. Management, via the ARC, must give prior written approval for the planting or removal of any live trees in the Community. All permits are the responsibility of the requestor. Units/Lots must be kept free of fallen fruit, dead trees, leaves, needles, and shrubs.

4.4 Plantings

No shrubs, trees, or flowers shall be planted so that they extend onto adjoining Units/Lots.

4.5 Prohibited Plants

Any plants from the Florida Exotic Pest Plan Council Invasive Plant List (FLEPPC) shall not be allowed in the Community. This list includes, but is not limited to, Punk, Paper Bark, Melaleuca, Leucadendron, Cajuput, all members of the Rubber Tree family, including Banyan, Cuban Laurel, Weeping Laurel, Australian Pines, Norfolk Pines, all members of the Willow family, Bottlebrush, Brazilian Pepper, Fiscus, all members of the Sword Fern family, Agave (Century plant), and Laurel Oak. This restriction includes any other plants that may be added to the list of plants specifically prohibited by the Management of the Association. The Management reserves the right to remove any restricted plants from the Community. Check the following website for further information: <u>www.fleppc.org/list</u>.

4.6 Fencing

Fencing of yards is prohibited. Other materials which are used as a fence, border, or barrier are not permitted without written permission from the ARC.



Florida Friendly Pollinators

Here are some facts and information I learned at a seminar I attended at the University of Florida Manatee County Extension on 17th Street in Palmetto.

We currently have 20 million people in Florida with 1000 more coming in every day. These people are using lots of water with Florida having the highest irrigation rate in the USA. Facts support that less than 1% of all water on earth is drinkable. This same water is being used for watering lawns to the tune of 33 gallons/minute from a standard hose. The water running down our streets is our drinking water, except for a few areas in the park. There are things we can do to save water and make the water we do have--safe. The water table is low in our area and any pesticides we use seep into our drinking water. Here are some things we can do:

- Use native plants.
- Plant drought tolerant plants.
- Use ¾" FLORA mulch (Florida friendly).
- Decrease use of pesticides and fertilizer.
- Check your landscaping companies for use of systemic fertilizers. (They are not good.)
- Use a 10 feet barrier of native plants up to the water, not grass.
- Use slow release fertilizers. A good organic fertilizer is Thurcide.
- Do not rake your leaves.
- The IPM system is best for pests because it is natural.
- Check position of down spouts and direct them to plants.

Native plants are the best for Florida since once they are established, they do not need watering. Some of the common ones are:

- Native honeysuckle vines
- Wild coffee
- Gaillardia
- Beach sunflower
- Purple coneflower
- Black eyed Susan
- Salvia
- Bee balm
- Coral nymph
- Blood berry bush
- Fire bush
- Red fire spike
- Powder puff shrub
- Kings mantle (large shrub)
- Yellow elder (small tree)
- Coontie
- Jatropha
- Sable palm
- Walters Viburnum

We also want to encourage our pollinators who love native plants and blooms. They pollinate 75% of the world's food and include bees, moths, bats, and hummingbirds many of which come out at twilight and at night. What kills pollinators? These products do:

- Bonide
- Safari
- Hi Yield
- Criterion
- Bayer advanced hb

Native nurseries will also recommend the best products for us to use in maintaining our landscapes. **REMEMBER to always get permission from the Tropic Isles ARC Committee for any major landscaping projects.**

They are there at your service and if they can't do it for you, they can recommend someone who can. We all want the same thing-- a safe and attractive retirement home and community.

ARC Committee Meetings

As of January 1, 2018, the ARC Committee Meetings will be held on **Wednesdays** at 9:30 in the Yacht Club Pretty Room twice a month on the second and fourth Wednesday of the month. The new ARC Committee Chairman is Tom Hennessy. The ARC request process for any changes to your home or lot remains the same. Contact the Office for an ARC request form.

When Is ARC Approval Needed?

(Clip and Save)

ARC approval is needed for any work that is done on the outside of your home or lot. This list is NOT intended to be all inclusive, but can be clipped and saved for future reference. The 2014 Rule is listed in parenthesis () after the item. Refer to your copy of the 2014 Rules and Regulations for more detail.

- Installation of a dwelling (3.1)
- Installation of utility buildings, steps, porches, canopies, and other exterior accessories (3.5, 3.6)
- Exterior painting (3.11)
- Landscaping and exterior changes (4.2)
- Planting or removal of trees (4.3)
- Barriers or borders (4.6)
- Storage on exposed areas (4.7)
- Applying driveway sealers or stains (4.11)
- Installing antennas, satellite dishes, and other external receivers (4.13)
- Installation, expansion, modification of docks, davits, lifts (9.1)
- Number of docks and placement (9.2)
- Use of docks and slips (9.3)
- Entitlement to a dock/slip (9.4)
- Dock size (9.6)
- Maintenance of docks (9.8)

Rule 3.5 (second paragraph) states "If it is determined that the Resident did not receive permission PRIOR to the installation or renovation, the Management has the right to demand the removal of said renovation or addition until approval is given." When in doubt as to whether something needs ARC approval, check with the Manager and read your 2014 Rules and Regulations. It is better to be safe than sorry.

The ARC procedure is as follows:

- Fill out an ARC application and submit it to the office. Make sure to include diagrams, drawings, or photos as needed. You must provide a copy of all required permits to the office.
- You will be notified when your request is placed on the agenda for an ARC meeting. You may attend that meeting.
- After the meeting, you will be notified, by phone or in writing, as to whether your request is approved or denied.
- You can appeal the decision to the Board of Directors if you so choose.
- 5. BOTH THE ARC APPLICATION AND THE CITY PERMIT NEED TO BE POSTED ON THE FRONT OF THE HOME BEFORE THE WORK CAN BEGIN.

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Architectural Guidelines For Installation Of New Homes In Tropic Isles

The purpose of these Guidelines is to help expedite the approval and installation of your new home in Tropic Isles. Most of these guidelines are in place because they are already required by our own governing documents and/or other pertinent documents and ordinances put in place by various governmental authorities. We want to help you work as seamlessly as possible through that maze of requirements. Knowledge of the requirements and pre-planning are key to a pleasant and successful experience. The ARC (Architectural Review Committee) is in place to help you navigate through this and to assure the overall quality of the aesthetics in Tropic Isles. The ARC is your advocate in this process. Consult your Tropic Isles governing documents for more details. All of the requirements may not necessarily be listed with the basic guidelines covered here.

- ► An ARC request for a new home must include the factory specs and drawings for the home, the elevation certificate, elevation drawing, surveyed site plan with overheard drawing and floorplan, the ground/drainage plan, the carport/garage and shed detail, the driveway detail, the deck/porch/lanai plan including the colors and materials of all siding, bricks, gutters, soffits, etc.
- Original plan must include the landscaping plan.
- If not already in place, the front yard must include one palm tree (to be approved by Management.)
- Drainage from the unit gutters shall be landscaped to not allow water to enter the adjacent lot. All units shall have roof gutter and downspouts. Direct drainage to the bay via tile lines will be allowed if approved and properly permitted by the appropriate municipal agencies. Otherwise, all lots must have positive drainage to the street. The engineered/surveyed drainage plan will accompany all New Home ARC Requests.
- Water access connections to the unit shall be placed underground and include an approved backflow valve.
- ➤ The electric meter box and disconnect switch shall be located no further from the unit than two feet and its location will be clearly indicated on the engineered/surveyed construction plans.
- The electrical connection/meter box must be installed as near to the new home as possible and still meet all building codes. The buyer is responsible for this expense as part of the set-up of a new home.
- ➤ The plan must show the exact location of the AC unit and the gas (container) and electrical connections, including the elevation from the ground level.
- Maximum consideration shall be given to the location of the AC unit as it may affect the adjacent neighbor's peace and tranquility. Location of existing homes' bedrooms and outdoor leisure areas should be considered. ARC/Management will make every reasonable attempt to notify the owners of the two adjacent lots of the installation of the new home and the location of the AC unit and exterior elements of the new site plan. Notification will, at a minimum, include a telephone call, an email, USPS, and a sign in the yard of the new home *(continued on page 25)*

- **Architectural Guidelines** (continued from page 24) indicating that a new home is being installed on this lot. ALL shareholders are always invited to attend the ARC meetings.
- The front of the home generally lines up along the street side with existing homes. Some variation may be allowed for aesthetic and code requirements.
- Under no circumstances can the home be closer than 5 feet from the lot line as determined by ARC/Management.
- Plans must show the distance to the lot line on all four sides and the distance to the adjacent structures, street, and seawall.
- ▶ Homes must be a minimum of 10' from adjacent homes.
- ▶ If there is a canal, seawall, rip-rap, etc., the back of the home can be no closer to the seawall than 10 feet.
- > Nothing may touch, cross over, or affix to the seawall.
- Utilities such as water, sewer connections, (sewer clean-outs may not be underneath the home), electrical, AC, or propane gas must be located near the back third of the unit as far away from the street and living spaces of the neighbors as possible. ARC/Management will have final authority.
- The horizontal siding shall not extend to the ground. Brick, decorative block or other materials as approved by the ARC shall be used on the bottom skirting of the unit. The height of the decorative skirting shall be equal to at least three rows of brick. Other reasonable alternative designs will be considered by the ARC/Management on a case-by-case basis. The walls must have hydrostatic relief vents (flow through). The vents must be at least 1"/square foot of floor space on two opposite walls. Vents must be within 12" of grade.
- Silt fence must be in place during every phase of construction and especially at the end of each day until the CO is issued and the landscaping is in place. This is the responsibility of the owner.
- Damage to any adjacent structures, streets, seawall, landscaping etc. is the responsibility of the new owner. The Co-op will seek damages from the owner. The owner may have recourse against the contractor(s).
- North/South/East/West must be shown on all pages of all site plans.
- Pre-planning with ARC/Management will help to prevent misunderstandings and delays in the construction of your new home. Ask questions, take notes!
- There MUST be a pre-construction meeting with the builder, the site manager, the lot owner, Tropic Isles manager, and at least two ARC Committee members to go over the plans/site BEFORE ARC approvals and governmental permits are issued. The date and time of this meeting will be recorded in the ARC record.

We hope that the installation of your new home at Tropic Isles is one of the most pleasant and memorable events in your life as you near, or enter retirement. The motto of our staff is "Try to find a way to say YES!" Please let us know if there is anything we can do throughout this process to make it better for you and those who come after you.

Tropic Isles Docks In Disrepair?

RULES AND REGULATIONS 2014, SECTION IX, PAGES 18-20, COVER THE DOCKS. SEE THE SECTIONS BELOW THAT APPLY.

- 9.1 Installation or Modification of Docks, Davits, and Lifts Installation of new docks, davits, and lifts; and the expansion, or modifications to those existing, is not permitted without the prior written approval of Management, via the ARC, and permits from all required entities. This includes, but is not limited to, the City of Palmetto, Manatee County, and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). The installation of docks, davits, or lifts will not be approved without detailed drawings. Canopies and other overhead protection are not permitted.
- 9.6 Dock and Boat Size Limitations
 - Docks may be a maximum of 100 square feet and must have prior approval of Management, via the ARC.
 - Docks must observe the ten (10) foot setback requirements on each side of the Unit/Lot lines.
 - Boats must be docked completely within the Unit/Lot lines.
 - Boats and docks cannot occupy more than 25% of the width of the canal as measured from the waterside of the seawall.
 - In addition to these Rules and Regulations, all governmental laws and regulations must be adhered to regarding boats and docks.
- 9.8 Maintenance of Docks

Docks must be kept structurally sound and maintained to the satisfaction of the Association. Painting of docks with preservative types of paint, stain, or other products must be approved by Management, via the ARC.

DOCKS ARE A LIABILITY TO THE CO OP, NOT JUST THE SHARE OWN-ER, WHEN THEY NEED TO BE REBUILT/REPAIRED. SOME MAY HAVE BEEN BUILT WITHOUT ARC PERMISSION OR A PERMIT FROM THE CITY. WHEN THE CO-OP FINDS THOSE AND IF THE SHARE OWNER DOES NOT FIX THE ISSUE, THE PARK WILL MAKE THE REPAIR AND BILL THE SHARE OWNER FOR THE COST. PLEASE CONTACT THE ARC COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN WITH QUESTIONS.

Thinking of renting out your dock?

Please remember this rule that applies to personal dock rental. 9.5 <u>Sub-leasing of Docks</u>

Docks may be sub-let to Co-op and TIPOA Residents only. A copy of the lease agreement and/or registration must be submitted to the Co-op Office.

~~Safety First~~ **GOLF CARTS VS BICYCLES AND PEDESTRIANS**

Please remember that golf carts must follow the same "rules of the road" as cars and other motor vehi- 🔚



cles. Golf carts need to stay on their side of the street, stop at all stop signs, and proceed into an intersection after carefully looking both ways. There have been way too many "near misses" on our streets involving bicycles and pedestrians with drivers not following the "rules of the road". Pedestrians and bicycles have the right-of-way. Remember also that according to our 2014 Rules and Regulations and state law, golf carts are not to be operated by children under the age of 16. (See Rule 10.8 below.) Please follow the "rules of the road" and the posted speed limits on our Tropic Isles' streets for the safety of all of our residents.

10.3 Age Restriction to Operate Golf Carts

According to state law, golf carts are not to be operated by children under the age of 16. The operation of golf carts must comply with state laws and local ordinances.

SPEED LIMITS



The speed limit in the park is 15 mph, although it is not posted on most streets. On Bimini Dr. the speed

limit is 20 mph. Please check your speed as you travel throughout the park. There are people riding bicycles and walking, so please slow down, especially at corners and at stop signs, where people may not be visible until you turn the corner. Then it is too late. Golf carts must also abide by the rules in the park. The speed limit on 28th Ave. W. is posted as 25 mph. Many people speed down 28th Ave. and create an unsafe situation for walkers, bikers, and people walking their dogs along that street. Please drive safely, observe the speed limits, and SLOW DOWN!



STOP SIGNS

For the safety of our residents and guests, obey all the STOP SIGNS! Please STOP at every sign and proceed with care. There have been some near misses of pedestrians, bikers, and vehicles and we are asking for your co-operation to avoid any serious problems there. It such a little thing to ask, for something so important! After all, IT IS THE LAW!



PEDESTRIANS VS VEHICLES

When walking on 28th Ave., please remember to walk facing traffic. According



to Florida state law, pedestrians must walk facing oncoming traffic on the same side of the road as the oncoming traffic. Also, you should get as far to the side of the road as possible to provide additional space between you and oncoming cars. It is important to see the vehicles that are approaching you for your own safety. This gives you the best chance to see traffic approaching closest to you and take evasive action when needed. When bicycling, you must ride on the right side of the road (going in the same direction as automobile traffic).

In the early morning hours and in the evening when it's dark, please remember to be safe while walking on our streets. If you are walking your dog wear light-colored or reflective clothing AND CARRY A FLASHLIGHT! If driving a golf cart or riding a bike, lights are needed. When driving, be attentive to pedestrians and bikers. Obey our park speed limits! SLOW DOWN!

AARP SMART DRIVER COURSE!

The AARP Smart Driver Course will be presented by an AARP certified instructor on Feb. 12th -13th from 1:00 PM to 4:00 PM (a 2 day, 6-hour long



course). It will be held in the Yacht Club, main room. The cost is \$15 for AARP members or \$20 for non-members. Completion of the course could save you money on your auto insurance premiums for the next 3 years. Ask your insurance agent how much you can save. The course was given in Tropic Isles 3 years ago with several residents attending. Topics that will be covered include: proven driving methods to help keep you and your loved ones safe on the road; a review of your knowledge of rules of the road; new traffic laws; and much, much more. 


The Red Hatters collected needed items for Veterans with their Red, White, and Blue Christmas Tree this year. Thanks to everyone who donated for this worthy cause.
