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Backdale latest...

Here is a statement issued today (23rd October) by John Lomas, director of strategy & development for the Peak District National Park Authority:

"On 28 July 2008 the National Park Authority and the Secretary of State were granted permission to appeal against Justice Sullivan's High Court decision given in March this year. Sullivan's decision had effectively allowed significant extraction of limestone from Backdale to continue.

"The Authority has been pressing for the Court of Appeal hearing to be held in December, whereas those acting for Bleaklow Industries Limited had requested a delay until after 1 April 2009. We have now been advised that there are now no available dates in the Court of Appeal until February, and the case has now been set for 10/11 February 2009."

Alternative report on behalf of the 'eight milers'

We all had a splendid day. Thank you to everyone who helped and to the walkers who were so generous. Special thanks for the excellent marshalling at difficult road crossings, always there when needed.

As the (eight mile) leader of a proposed walk and having passed the age when I felt the need to prove anything much I gathered my flock of eleven souls together and explained that we were going to take it steady, enjoy the sunshine and savour our beautiful countryside. I aimed to get back at about 2pm, in good time for pie, peas & music.

I was a bit surprised to find that I had lost two of my party by the time we reached the cattle grid on Moor Road. How can you get lost on Moor Road in broad daylight? The two "mispers" signed in at the Crispin before going home so all was well but.......?

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Farming Notes

It's not yet Christmas and we are already thinking about spring as we have just had next year's fertilizer delivered. It comes in 600kg bags that we can handle with our trailer and loader. Local farm worker and lorry driver, Ellis Oldfield and his Jack Russell Pip, deliver it from Immingham docks to the farm.

As you can see, Ellis is a hardy soul and seems to dress for summer whatever the time of year! We need fertilizer to grow grass for a heavier siage crop and keep lush grass growing throughout the summer for the dairy cows.

Last year we paid £179 per ton but this year farmers have had a price shock with the price escalating to £410. Even as a small dairy farm such as ours, it means that an extra £5000 has to be found. This increase, together with the rising prices of cattle feed and fuel, has made it a difficult summer. As nitrogen is linked to energy, recent falls in the price of oil should start to bring prices down.

I hope so or else, Ellis will need more than Pip the Jack Russell, to protect his valuable load.

Public Questions and Comments

Godfrey Frankland said that the cricket club had no objections to the proposed fence around the play area but what about the rest of the ground which is also used by large numbers of young children. He was concerned that fencing off just the playground could give out a wrong message about dogs on the cricket field. He also pointed out that it would result in an increase in mowing costs.

The Chairman said that he and Councillor Mrs Barton would be deckaring a prejudicial interest in the planning application for further extraction of fluorspar at Arthurton West and would not be taking part in the discussion. However, under the terms of the Code of Practice adopted by the council, they do have the right to speak during Public Questions and Comments. He then went on to give his interpretation of the application and his opinion as to whether it should be approved or not. Councillor Mrs Barton





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said that there was serious fly tipping taking place at the site.

The Chairman then opened the meeting at 7.45pm.

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Xmas - the true meaning of Christmas!

My Dear Friends,

Back in the late 1940s CS Lewis gave a radio broadcast on the true meaning of Christmas. He was earning a name as a controversial speaker and in line with his reputation he commented on the increasing commercialisation of the festival and its secularisation. He called on real Christians to put Christ back into Christmas. He named the commercial and secular version "Xmas", and ever since, among certain Christians, the word Xmas has been anathema.

Of course Christmas is the folk festival par excellence: it is the festival which is most popular. Behind the 19th Century German embellishments – Christmas trees and Santa Claus – and the sentimentalism of Charles Dickens, there is the more ancient holly and ivy (not to mention the mistletoe) and the Roman festival of Saturnalia with its midwinter merrymaking as the shortest day arrives and the darkness is at its deepest. It is all part of the appeal of Christmas when carol services and midnight mass draws crowds.

"Why don't they come in the rest of the year?" moan zealous and insecure church people, and some clergy cannot resist the temptation to nag their Christmas congregations about this. It is all part of the mentality of "them and us" which wants the Church to consist only of "real" Christians. This is not a new issue. There have always been those who have wanted a pure version of Christianity with no blurred edges. They have wanted people to be either in or out and have enjoyed being able to condemn those they have classified as outside, as they congratulate themselves on being in. Perhaps instead we should take the lead from

the shepherds in the nativity story who said, "Let us now go and see this thing which has come to pass." After all, despite all the commercialism, secularisation (and sentimentalism) of Christmas, what people seem to be seeking is precisely the light that Christ came to bring to our world And never mind if people do this only fitfully.

There is a story about a rabbi who survived the Nazi concentration camps. He was asked if he thought Hitler was in the very deepest hell. "No" he replied. "Why not? Doesn't he deserve such punishment?" they asked him. "Yes" he said, "But I don't believe in a God like that."

The God we believe in, who revealed himself in Jesus, reaches out to us. He does not condemn; he welcomes. We may worship him only fitfully as, occasionally, we glimpse the light of Christ, but that should not be treated as worthless. Our enjoyment of Christmas, in fact, points to the very mystery of God's love. We should rejoice and enjoy it all. Merry Xmas!

DECEMBER IN THE GARDEN

<u>Lawns</u>:- Dig over areas to be seeded in the spring. Clean and overhaul machines and equipment.

<u>Sweetpeas</u>:- Cover frames with matting after frosts to avoid rapid thawing of autumn seedlings.

<u>Dahlias</u>:- Continue checking stored tubers for signs of rot, treat as needed.

Roses:- Prepare established beds for winter, shortening long growths to 2.5 feet (75cms) to stop wind loosening plants. Complete new planting if conditions allow. Collect and burn fallen leaves which show signs of black spot and disease.

Herbaceous Plants:- Continue tidying borders and digging between plants. Order seeds and plants for spring sowing and planting.

Chrysanthemums:- Firm ground around over wintering plants lifted by frost. Under glass – take cuttings of large exhibition varieties. Keep stools of garden varieties cool and not too wet. Fruit-Continue pruning and planting in suitable weather. Spray all fruit bushes and trees with winter wash when dormant.

<u>Vegetables</u>:- Continue winter digging leaving ground rough. Prepare site for next year's runner beans. Under glass lift rhubarb and chicory for forcing.

Trees & shrubs:- Plant deciduous trees and shrubs in mild weather. Firm soil around the root. Tie branches of young conifers together with sacking to prevent heavy snow breaking them down.

General tasks:- Check tuber, corms, onions and other dormant bulbous plants and stored roots and fruits before severe frosts. Provide adequate protection. Beware of mice, trap or poison them. Lag outdoor water pipes and taps.
