27 mile walk raises £900 for Sport Relief

A group of 9 walkers (aka The Peak Plodders) set off from The Cross on Longstone green at 06:40 on Saturday 19th March to walk John Merrill's White Peak Challenge walk, originally thought to be 25 miles but re-measured, using sophisticated GPS equipment, at almost 2 miles further. Just what we needed!

11 hours and 5 minutes later, 8 of them arrived back for an evening's entertainment in the Crispin who provided some well-deserved food as the walkers rested aching feet and bones.

With an initial target of raising £500 (inspired by Jo Brand's wonderful Sport Relief effort of walking from Hull to Liverpool at 20 miles a day for 7 consecutive days) the total ended up at a superb £900 due to some very generous locals, family and friends. Thanks to everyone who donated, helping to make the day a genuine success.

All monies have already been paid in with at least 50% going to UK causes and the rest being spent on some of the world's poorest families and communities. Considering that just £20 will provide medication for 100 children with malaria in Uganda, our total will make a real difference and that's exactly why we did it.

Letter from a Parishioner

I am writing this letter to try and provide some clarity about the role of the Parish Council regarding some on-going issues and to hopefully point residents in the right direction when it comes to dealing with these issues or making complaints.

1. Dog fouling. Dog fouling is irresponsible, anti-social, highly unpleasant and also potentially dangerous, especially to our children. Dog owners who's dog fouls in a public place or designated area have a legal responsibility to clear up the mess, bag it and bin it, there is NO excuse – you can use any bin even your own!

Derbyshire Dales District Council are the enforcing authority. You can report an instance of dog fouling by using this link on their website: http://www. derbyshiredales.gov.uk/environmentand-waste/roads/street-care-andcleaning/dog-fouling

Your Parish Council (PC) has and will continue to inform and actively encourage the proper disposal of dog waste throughout the Parish.

2. Parking on verges (and pavements). We've probably all done it at some time but it causes obstruction, unsightly damage to verges, and can be potentially hazardous. The problem is not an easy one to solve and solving it in one place normally just moves it somewhere else! In common law 'The public has no legal right to park vehicles on the highway', that includes the verges, pavements and the road itself! The authority responsible for keeping the highway clear and free from obstructions is Derbyshire County Council (DCC) however they are unlikely to take action! If the parking is considered to be potentially hazardous then it should be reported to the police on 101.

Your Parish Council has and will continue to lobby the authority as can you as an individual.

3. Speeding vehicles. Vehicles exceeding the 30mph speed through the village or driving excessively fast for the road conditions are of concern. The introduction of 20mph speed limits on residential streets is being considered by DCC following the results of a recent consultation; the priority for implementation being based on road casualty statistics! Schemes that aren't driven by casualty reduction statistics will only be considered where "The Parish/Town Council supports the scheme and

is willing to contribute financially towards the implementation costs". This will have to be considered by the PC as and when the scheme moves on. Whether the implementation of a 'signed only' 20mph speed limit will stop those who chose to ignore the current 30mph limit (research shows not!) will have to be seen? However, your Parish Council has and will continue to address the problem of speeding vehicles and is currently looking into the Community Speed Watch Scheme (funding and volunteers will be needed). If you see an apparently speeding vehicle I would encourage you to take note of the registration number (perhaps covertly) and report it to the police, at the very least it will have been logged. Please understand that your Parish Council has very limited powers of enforcement but does try to do what it feels is best for the community - we will never please everybody! A lot of work is done on concerns and issues outside of committee which is not

On the evening of 13th April, a cookery demonstration was given by Chef, Greg Robinson at The White Lion. A very appreciative audience of members and friends was entertained by Greg who delivered a programme of great tasting food using vegetables, such as squash, courgette, green beans, fennel, Jerusalem artichokes, celeriac, carrots, onion and garlic.

At the age of thirteen Greg declared he wanted to be a chef and thus found himself as an unpaid trainee at a large restaurant in Nairobi, though not eating sea-food, he found his daily tasks were just that, preparing prawns and other shell fish. Not put off and knowing the training is long hours needing stamina with not much time to oneself, it has paved the way to success and Greg lives with his lovely family in the village promoting healthy eating and delicious recipes.

He began with a pizza using a simple base with a courgette topping. His homemade base consists of tomatoes, onions and garlic cooked with a little vegetable stock and reduced to about half the volume. To this he adds cherry tomatoes to give a sweeter taste. It was possible to cook the pizza, though the kitchen was very busy, and all enjoyed a slice which was 'yummy'. Next were onion barjees made with flour and spices, swiftly made and cooked for us. His demonstration included the preparation of squash and what parts to use for soups etc., and an easy way to chop onion and its varied uses. He made beautiful hollandaise sauce with such energetic whisking served on gently cooked green beans, the sauce was velvety and delicious. Jerusalem artichokes were just peeled and placed

in a pan ready for cooking and celeriac was peeled, sliced, squeezed in a cloth to remove the moisture, which could be then eaten raw in salads or an ingredient in rosti and coleslaw. Fennel was sliced, the tops being used as a garnish and the bulb cooked, and served in a sauce with fish, a lovely delicate flavour and great eaten raw in salads. A desert using puff pastry and apple - the apple cut in slices and placed in water – drained and placed on the pastry with one edge folded over the apple and then turned and rolled up forming a rosette ready for the oven - wonderful. As a finale he produced a light and very tasty sorbet using sugar syrup and cider from apples grown in the village.

Kitchen equipment - he recommends the silicon spoon spatulas and a Spiralizer for making ribbons of carrot for example perfect for garnishes or soups. And it is good to know he uses local ingredients wherever possible and supports the village shop.

Thumbs up to Greg for providing a splendid evening with ideas to take home – it was enjoyed by everyone, informative, accomplished and lots of humour – a great recipe with excellent ingredients.

Thank you Greg, we hope you will find the opportunity to give another demonstration when your busy life permits.

Proposed Cuts to Subsidised Bus Services.

Following the article in Under the Edge last month a couple of residents contacted our local MP, the Rt Hon Patrick McLoughlin concerning the proposed cuts.

Liz McDonald posted a copy of UTE to Patrick McLoughlin asking for his comments and Su Woollen sent the following email:

"As minister for transport you must be aware of the need for public transport in the countryside. Due to government cuts in grants to local authorities Derbyshire County Council are looking at stopping all subsidies on local buses. Bus companies will not run unsubsidised routes which, I am sure you are aware is most of the routes in the Derbyshire Dales. This will have a devastating effect on the lives of the many older people who live here. Dentists, Doctors, Hairdressers will be affected, and shopping, all require a trip to Bakewell or Tideswell. Local buses to Buxton, Derby, Chesterfield and Sheffield are not all subsidised but if we can't get to them their passenger numbers will be affected. Numerous small village communities will be affected. We may be small in number but not everyone drives or has access to a car.

The pensioners I have spoken to would be willing to pay half fare to keep our buses.

I find it hard to comprehend the balance between spending billions on consultation fees for the HS2 and cutting council grants so we lose our local bus service.

Su Woollen, non driver."

His response was the same to both Liz and Su, and, as follows:

"Thank you for contacting me about Derbyshire County Council's current consultation on bus services. I do understand how important these services are and I have always been a particularly strong supporter of community buses.

It is important to make clear that the Council has not yet made a decision; not all bus services are affected and alternatives are being considered. I have seen Demand Responsive Transport (DRT) services work very well in other parts of Britain; it may well be that in some local areas, this and the proposed Door-to-door Plus could actually offer a better service, particularly for the most vulnerable, who would still be able to travel free of charge. I think the Council should be providing more information about these alternatives, because it would help people to make a better informed contribution. It is important for local residents to take part in the consultation, and is particularly vital in rural areas such as Derbyshire Dales whose needs are often overlooked by County Offices. I urged it to do so as soon as possible but I regret to say the Council has so far refused to do so.

I enclose more information about funding, to which I would like to add that whilst I appreciate your concern about keeping bus services, Derbyshire County Council is responsible for providing these services. It should not use lack of central funding as an excuse when it continues to waste money, including subsidising trade union staff, translating documents into foreign languages and using a London-based PR consultancy.

The 'enclosed information about funding' referred to above is as follows:

"Thank you for your email regarding the future of local bus services in the Dales.

Firstly may I assure you that the Government recognises the importance of public transport for both the sustainability and independence of communities. As the representative of Derbyshire Dales I know how important affordable, accessible transport is for constituents and I fully recognise the extra pressures placed on local authorities throughout the country to provide services in more isolated areas.

There is no doubt that the funding settlement for local authorities has been tough, but the level of funding was set to be sufficient to enable local authorities to deliver effective local services whilst ensuring that they do not set excessive council tax increases for residents. However, the Government is also keen to give local authorities more say over how government funding to support bus services should be spent locally.

That is why, since January 2014, the Government has devolved £40 million of the £250 million Bus Service Operator Grant (BSOG) payments to local authorities outside London to support bus services, including almost £900,000 to Derbyshire County Council. Moreover, this funding is being ring-fenced for 2016-17 to ensure that it is still used to support bus services, but within that it will be for each authority, including Derbyshire, to decide how to use it.

The Government is also encouraging local authorities, operators and local communities to work in partnership to decide how best to provide access to services for residents. We are eager to play an active role in highlighting different initiatives and helping share experiences.

Last year, my Department launched the £7.6 million Total Transport pilot scheme across England to explore how councils, the NHS and other agencies can work together to commission transport services more effectively. This can avoid duplication of commissioned services and, importantly, achieve overall cost efficiencies. The thirty-seven pilot schemes will run for two years and I am pleased to say that Derbyshire is one of the participating councils, having received £164,900 of funding. Ultimately, however, it is for local authorities, working in partnership with their communities, to identify the right transport solutions that meet the economic and environmental challenges faced in their areas and deliver the greatest benefits for their residents.

Farming Notes May 2016

Dairy farmers' incomes continue to be squeezed with our processing dairy company now paying, from over 30p per litre 18 months ago, down to around 17p per litre for our milk this month. 90% of the milk we produce is purchased by Meadow Foods, a Cheshire milk processor that is now at the bottom of the milk price league table. We are classed as a small producer as we only have 70 dairy cows and so no other dairy processing company will give us a contract. They would rather buy from large farms with hundreds, if not thousands, of cows where they can fill up the milk tanker in just one visit.

This predicament has been caused by a combination of factors – overproduction by many farms adding hundreds of cows to their herds, the end of milk quotas and shrinking export markets. It can be a depressing time working long hours seven days a week and nothing to show for it. With little sign of any great improvement in the near future, a major decision will have to be made about carrying on with milking or not. It would be very hard to stop the milk production that has been carried on here for hundreds of years, to sell your cows which would be worth very little now that hundreds of farmers are selling up and flooding the market with animals or to send many good cows for slaughter. One bright side of the business is selling milk from the door to our many loyal supporting customers. After milking cows for nearly 55 years, I would like to take things easier, the milking parlour is in need of major investment and with little hope for a small family dairy farm, it looks as though we might leave dairy farming sometime in the future. We have been planning for that day, building up a beef suckler cow herd, along with the Charolais herd and other projects, to try to keep the farm viable. We hope to keep on bottling some milk for our customers. Cath says that change can sometimes be good, opening up new opportunities. I look forward to it!





Roses - Spray with Roseclear or similar product to control pests and diseases. **Dahlias** - Plant out young plants when danger of frost has passed, stake and label each plant.

Sweet Peas - Hoe around plants, mulch in dry weather, tie in Cordons as they grow.

Chrysanthemums - Plant out flowering varieties in the garden, also Poms, scatter Slug bait

Herbaceous - Control weeds by hoeing between plants, stake tall plants such as Delphiniums and water newly planted beds.

Flowers from seed - Make sowing of Hardy and Half Hardy annuals when risk of frost has passed. Sow Hardy Biennials in drills in nursery bed.

Lawns - Apply lawn fertiliser and continue regular mowing, apply weedkiller and fungicides for disease control.

Vegetables - Cover Potatoes if frost is forecast, prepare site for planting Marrows, make sowings of Summer Spinach, salad crops, Beetroot and French beans.

Fruit - Control pests when seen, feed and water all fruit if swelling. Tie up new shoots on Blackberries and Loganberries. Control weeds around trees and bushes in cultivated ground. Protect Strawberry fruit. Scatter Slug bait.

Trees and Shrubs - Plant out shrubs that are tender when young, e.g. Fuschia, Arbutus, Choisys and Hydrangeas and keep watered until well established. Remove dead wood and thin shoots from Forsythias to keep in shape. **General tasks** - Spray Roses, fruit bushes and Broad beans against Aphids and



Caterpillars.
