Here are five important tips to consider when choosing cabinetry:

1. MAKE SURE YOUR CABINETS SUIT YOUR HOME

Every house was built with specific style references. Whether your home is a Mid-Century Modern, Victorian, Craftsman, Tudor, Ranch, Dutch Colonial, or Queen Anne, each style has conventions that should not be ignored. Look at the details from every aspect of the house and consider how they can relate to your cabinetry. How

open are the rooms? Is there crown or base molding? What does the exterior of the house look like? What style are your windows and doors? Looking at the overall aesthetic of your home is important when choosing the best cabinetry style and finish for your space.

2. CONSIDER PROPORTIONS CAREFULLY

As important as the details are, considering the proportions is even more crucial. You may make eclectic design choices for the style of cabinetry, but whatever you do, you must observe the proportions of the house. Each house adheres to a strict set of proportions which instantly tell a trained eye when the house was built. Deviating from these proportions will be immediately apparent to

a design professional, and even untrained eyes can sense that something is off. Don't put 36" upper cabinets into a kitchen with a low ceiling just because that's the standard size the cabinets come in or butt new cabinets right up against the wall to cram in extra storage. 3. THINK OF CABINETRY AS FURNITURE

In Germany, it's common practice to take your kitchen cabinetry and countertops with you when you move into a new home because they're seen as furniture. People buy very high-end, long-lasting cabinetry and counters and keep them forever, passing them down for generations. At the turn of the 20th Century, it was very uncommon to

see built-in cabinets or islands in a kitchen. Freestanding Hoosier-style cabinets and islands with ornate millwork details and legs were much more common. While modern American homeowners might prefer built-in cabinets, choosing high quality cabinets will still improve the overall beauty and longevity of your home.

4. OPEN KITCHENS ARE OVERRATED

The enduring trend of open kitchens is much like the overused open office plan: they've been used for far too long, and they don't work for everyone. Many people who cook actually tend to prefer closed spaces, even if they aren't fully aware of it. You don't want guests to see the mess you're making, the piled up dishes in the sink, how much butter you folded into that soup, the spots of tomato sauce on your kitchen floor, or your reliance on too many canned ingredients. Even restaurants with open kitchens often have hidden prep kitchens, and most restaurants

don't have the kitchen visible at all. There is a line between showmanship and comfort that needs to be observed, and intelligent cabinetry design will address this. Sacrificing storage and privacy to have an open kitchen often isn't worth it. If you really desire an open feel, consider opting for open-front cabinetry with an interesting wallpaper or paint color to make the room feel as if it's transitioning seamlessly into the walls, while also giving you a nice room accent and plenty of storage.

MID-RANGE CABINETRY IS A WASTE OF MONEY

Cabinetry is available in different grades from inexpensive modular stock cabinetry to semi-custom cabinetry to high-end fully custom cabinetry. IKEA and other economical pressboard cabinets can be a great choice for certain projects as they provide a range of options for configuration and finish while being very budget-friendly. The step up from that is semi-custom cabinetry. Semi-custom cabinets are essentially stock cabinets that have the

option of changing certain dimensions and details. Semicustom cabinets are made with economy-grade materials, but require time and budget for a designer to make sure the details are perfect, and this leads to a big expense for an end result that is not appreciably different from stock cabinets. Perhaps stock cabinets are suitable for your project, or perhaps full-custom cabinets are the way to go, but don't mess around with the in-between.
