We were participating in something that hadn'thappened since 1925. We were present at the 1<sup>st</sup> conference of the new structure of the United Church. I think that future gatherings will be


smoother, just for having had the experience of this one.

Thirty people from across Oxford came to listen and to see their many photos documenting their travels. Kathleen Welch offers the following personal reflection on their presentation.



Because this was a guided tour, they were able to experience life in Palestine, with the safety net of not being Palestinian.

While we assume that there have been struggles and conflict over this land for thousands of years, the reality is quite different. In response to the persecution of Jews in Europe, the United Nations decided in 1948 to create a homeland – Israel. What the United Nations failed to take into account was that there were already people living there.

At the end of the presentation, I personally had an overwhelming sense of how much I don't know and a nagging question of whether my ignorance was deliberate on my part.

My heart hurts to hear the stories of institutionalized brutality carried out against the

treatment of the First Nations peoples is glaringly obvious. The Palestinian people are being marginalized and limited to small tracts of land and the Israeli settlers are relentlessly pushing at those borders, demanding more and more land.

In addition, each year the Israeli military arrests and prosecutes around 700 Palestinian children. And we hear NOTHING about this on our mainstream media. These Human Rights violations qo unchallenged by the rest of the world. Mark had a supply of postcards from No Way to Treat A Child Canada, a project of the Defense for Children International PALESTINE, supported by the United Church of Canada. Mark also encouraged those present to continue to support the boycott of and products any all originating Israeli in the settlements in the occupied territories. In doing so, we can contribute toward creating a just peace between Israelis and Palestinians.

(Note: Keyhole represents the prison that Palestinians, particularly the refugee population, feel. Many refugees have kept the keys to the houses from which they were evicted in 1948 or 1967, as a symbol of hope for peace.)

### "But we have always done it (or understood it or preached it) that way."

What do you do with **new information** about the gospel when you no longer have a congregation to share it with. . .? I am talking about new insights, for ex ample those from Borg and Crossan's book, "The Last Week." (Not new to many of you since the book was published in 2006.)



In the "Friday" chapter of the book, the Greek word for thief, referring to the two thieves

crucified with Jesus, is described by B and C as a general term for bandit often used describe **querrilla rebels**. crucifixion was never used to punish common thieves, but reserved for those suspected of committing against the state, Rome, on that Friday, was getting rid of three rebels, all wanting the same thing, freedom for their people. Jesus lived for the marginalized, now he was to die with them. Now the three on Calvary's hill were bonded together by cause and by suffering, even though they represented radically different kingdoms: the two freedom fighters representing the kingdom of power and violence; Jesus embodying God's kingdom of suffering love. It is enough to make you weep.

Also, Borg and Crossan suggest that word "ransom" used in Mark's gospel can mean "liberation", a theological shift. And just a few weeks ago, in her sermon on Wisdom, Jane Van Patter stated that recent scholarship indicates that the word

"fear" in the phrase "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom." can also mean awe or adoration. Of course!

What do I do when I have always preached it one way but now I would preach it another. It's almost enough to call me again to the preaching side of the pulpit; almost enough to wish I were 28 and not 82 and again in ministry on the four-point charge on Newfoundland's west coast. Almost.

### Oxford United Refugee Sponsorship (OURS) update for June

By this time many of the congregations will have been visited by members of the Oxford United Refugee Sponsorship Committee known as OURS.

On June 2<sup>nd</sup> their **Annual meeting was** held at St. David's. A review of their income and expenses was presented.

The financial campaign launched 5 years ago resulted in \$ 67,027.29. The cost of the settlement of the Mira family in Ingersoll was \$39.345.29. The amount that has been set aside for the Mebrahtu family is \$15,000. The originally required for the Temnewu family was \$12,782, which is held in trust. Because of a new funding formula by the Canadian Government in addition to one of the children now being 22 years old, the required amount has increased to \$21,530. On May 8, approximately \$8,800 remained to be raised, for the Temnewu family.

To contribute, send cheques to St, David's United Church. Cheques should be made out to St. David's United Church with the words "Refugee Fund" in the memo space on the cheque.

Currently, Khartoum, Sudan is in political chaos. Habte Zekarias, in London, who is the cousin of Freweini Mebrahtu (pictured above), tells us she is at present unable to leave her residence because of the danger. There have been two violent attempts to take over the government, with 40 people murdered in the last week. All government



offices are closed.

People are being shot in the streets.

It is our hope and prayer that the Canadian

representatives working with Freweini and her family will do all that is possible to ensure a safe and successful outcome.
