FOOD FOR THE SOUL

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A Vineyard Story

One of the things that makes an old preacher's day is **discovering new**

meaning in old texts. That happened to me recently when I re-discovered theologian Ched Myers on You Tube.

I chose Myers' Bible study on the gospel of Mark's parable of the terrible tenants. (12:1-12) It will be familiar. A man buys a vineyard and puts tenant farmers in charge. When the owner sends a servant to collect the percentage of the harvest, they beat the servant. The next servant meets the same fate as does the next. Finally, the owner sends his own son and the tenants say, "If we kill him the vineyard will be ours." They do just that. But instead of inheriting the vineyard, it is taken from them and given to other tenants.

Myers says this is not about Old Testament prophets being beaten and Jesus, as the son, being crucified. It is about tenants wanting to be owners. It is a parable about not being good stewards (tenants). In Jesus' time it was about the Jewish faith. The scribes and the pharisees had not nurtured that veritable vineyard of faith stories. They had become self appointed owners.

Today, the vineyard is the earth. We have not been good stewards. The result is an environmental crisis. "Take care of it or it will be taken from you." we hear this parable say. It is, as it was then, a matter of life and death. Adding to that is the sobering fact that unless we act differently, there will be little of this vineyard left for the next generation of tenants – our great grandchildren. GW

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WATERSHED MEETING BY ANTLER RIVER

"The Word became flesh and blood and moved into the neighbourhood (or the 'hood) (John 1:14 The Message)," noted Antler River Watershed Regional Council President, Joyce Payne, in her opening remarks at the first semi-annual Regional Council meeting held on Saturday Nov. 2 at the W.I.S.H. Centre in Chatham. Joyce offered this verse as our Theme - as we experience new opportunities to be the Church in a new way.

Approximately 200 Regional Council representatives gathered Neighbourhood, including some dozen **Oxford** representatives of congregations. After opening worship and Communion, and a lively game of Regional Council Jeopardy featuring our own Doug Peck and Pam Wilcox, we then spent much of the meeting time discussing and voting on several proposals. In time, minutes should be available on the Antler River Watershed Regional Council (ARWRC) website (https://arwrcucc.ca/).

The following proposals passed (with only minor changes to the above workbook): the procedure for electing General Council Commissioners to the 44th General Council July 21-25 in Calgary AB; the management of restricted and unrestricted funds sent to

ARWRC from presbyteries and Conference; the operating budget for 2020.

In the remaining time, we were introduced to the ARWRC commission chairs who gave a brief overview of their mandates and Rev. Lynne Allin provided an update on the Covenant of Mutual Commitment, Accountability Support between a community of faith and ARWRC (pages 19-21 in Workbook). One of the challenges that each Commission faces is learning who is willing to be trained and to help with particular tasks across the Region e.g. being a Pastoral Charge Supervisor, assisting communities of faith with their search for ministry personnel, advising on property issues etc.

Be sure to check out the new ARWRC website (https://arwrcucc.ca/). There are many new documents, handbooks, and guidelines which have been newly developed to offer pathways for communities of faith on a variety of topics.

It was exciting and comforting to renew old Conference and Presbytery acquaintances and to meet new people who have taken on the representative's role. We look forward to gathering again in Port Elgin on the last weekend in May 2020.

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Christian Theology after Christendom

Doug Hall, a native of Oxford County, is the most well-known Canadian theologian as well as an internationally recognized theologian for his work on Contextual Theology, the Theology of the Cross, and Stewardship. He describes Christendom as the time of the Church, since Constantine, enjoying proximity to power and serving that power rather than God on a foundation of Theology of Glory/Triumphalism rather than the Cross. There has never been a more important time to be church. While I have read that Christendom has been dying for several centuries, my soul often aches both being part of that changing church and world in which we live. It was our hunger to explore faith without the church as we know it that led us (Dave and me) to register for the November Colloquium in Montreal 'Engaging the Thought of Douglas John Hall'. (A book of the lectures presented by speakers will be published in the summer of 2020.)

Of the seven Graduate papers presented the first day, I was especially interested in the paper of practical theology by Elizabeth Fisher from Emmanuel College called 'One Story of Suffering' bringing together theory and story. While we have 'mastered' the earth, we struggle to master our emotions rather than be partners with them. Our own stories of struggle can help us find God in our suffering always orienting us toward love.

Of the twelve papers presented by the speakers over the next two days, the most uncommon was by Deanna Thompson 'The Gospel of irresolution Thinking Along with Douglas John Hall about Cross,

Theology and not yet Resurrection.' Deanna is а 10-year survivor metastasized breast cancer and spoke about the relationship of trauma (where suffering remains) to our illness whether mental or physical. The auestion of 'how do I live' with the irresolution of illness is addressed in the Theology of the Cross of which Resurrection is a chapter within. The need to practice lament together in public worship. Sixty percent of the 150 Psalms are lament/grief/trauma of the religious experience of God's absence which lasts more than a moment.

At the close, Doug reflected on the need for critical awareness and compassion as we face our own spiritual and intellectual struggle. He offered three themes.

- 1. The church should be a zone of truth.
- 2. Theology of the Cross is not a doctrine of atonement.
- 3. The suffering of the Christian church is consistent with the suffering of Christ on the cross. How are we to unlearn Christendom? The possibilities of the 'small'.

Doug remains grateful for the tradition of the Christian faith.

At 92 years of age, the Colloquium honoured Doug for his humility, his thinking prowess and his realism and truth telling. 


