FOOD FOR THE SOUL



As we address **the many changes afoot** (new decade, personal and pastoral relationships, new leadership and

meaning and puropose), encouragement is vital. Last sermons are distinct and critical as they embolden faithful decision making for the ministry entrusted to us. Rev Sydney Elias' last sermon at Norwich UC on December 29 named 4 things to keep in mind:

- Never Base Your Decision On Desperation. Desperation is not the same as necessity.
- 2. Know That The Popular And Easy Do Not Necessarily Equate To The Good And Right.
- 3. Seek God's Guidance. God guides, he is not a dictator.
- 4. Don't Ever Treat Any Decision As Final. Always be open to what God is doing.

Even as God has called us to work for a more just and caring world...the personal dimension of God's call and the wonder should be remembered.

When the angel of God proclaimed the birth of Jesus to the shepherds...there was also a deeply personal aspect as well – "To **you** is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord. ¹²This will be a sign for **you**: **you** will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." (Luke 2: 10-12)

Preachers, Poets and Story Tellers.



Preaching is part education and part motivation within a context

of story telling. It is often both a joy and a struggle; a struggle with the text, a struggle with the vision of God's new community in the face of the reality of a different world in and around us. As we know, our faith comes from an oral tradition. Often it was only written down when the oral tradition was threatened.

The Psalms are an example of Hebrew poetry originally spoken out loud in the temple before a gathered audience.

I was reminded of this format when I heard of **the rise in popularity of what is called Slam Poetry**. It is poetry that is performed – read aloud before those gathered for worship.

A number of years ago Taylor Mali, a teacher, recited at a "Slam" gathering, a three minute poem called "What Teachers Make". (If you are tempted to look it up, it comes or should come with a strong language warning.) The poem, on you tube, "went viral" as they say. To Mali's surprise, students who had heard the poem began to tell him that because of that poem they had decided to go into teaching. He kept track of the letters and emails indicating their decisions. He stopped counting when in 2012 the number reached one thousand.

Its an example among many that **the spoken word has not lost its power.** For discouraged preachers, poets and other story tellers it's a word of hope.


herself grounded. She punctuated her words with her sense of humour,





February -Black History Month

We don't have to look far in Oxford County for stories of Black History. As we know, the area of Otterville and Ingersoll was one of the last stops on the Underground Railroad. This safe haven was just one of many provided and promoted by the Quakers.

Slavery existed in Canada for just over 200 years, ending in 1834. Unfortunately, racism lingered for well over another 100 years in our communities.



What a surprise it was for us to discover the restored African Methodist Episcopal Cemetary just north of Otterville. We

have been there several times and always come away with a feeling that this is a sacred place. We envision the clapboard church built in 1856 that once stood on the cemetery grounds. On one of our visits we met a local historian who said that after the black community had left the area, all but one of the original gravestones had been taken and put in cement foundations when local barns were being built. The short distance between the small stone markers now indicating the graves, suggests that many of the deaths were children.

While members of this black community were welcomed, racial preiudice was felt. There restaurants where they could not get a meal. They could not ride the stage on Old Stage Road just because of their skin colour. Baseball teams up to the mid 1930's were segregated. Ralph (Rabbit) Marshal of Ingersoll and John Lewis of Woodstock played on a black team in Chatham in 1915. Charlie Kelly, a black soldier from Ingersoll, got to play on a Canadian army integrated team in England during WWI.

So there is much to think about in this month designated to remember and honour the contribution of those of African decent. It also serves to remind us of our history of racism and alert us to any racism that may still exist.
